

John Stark students at Model UN

Stark students attend online thru Clark University

Eleven John Stark Regional High School students participated in a Virtual Model UN Conference through Clark University on Saturday, March 26, in the school library. All of the students were a part of the online General Assembly discussing innovation in the fight to end climate change.

To prepare for the conference, students researched their country's stance on the issue as well as how their country is impacted or could be impacted by climate change. At the General Assembly, there were about 50 other countries represented by students from various schools on the East Coast. Clark University's Model UN conference was a hybrid conference so schools had the option of either attending virtually or in person.

This was the first Model UN Conference for John Stark this year. To prepare, they learned the rules of parliamentary procedure and applied that knowledge to the conference.

Many of the John Stark students made speeches to the committee and were signatories on potential resolutions (working papers). They also worked in small groups in breakout rooms with students from other schools.

In the end, they voted and passed a resolution that offered many ways to help with the issue of climate change. Among the issues discussed was the need for developed countries to help developing countries with climate change. John Stark Social Studies teacher Jessica Regal is the Model UN Club's Advisor.

Neighbors heard the crash and called 911, while bystanders flagged down a Goffstown officer who attempted to render medical aid while awaiting Goffstown Fire and EMS. Despite the efforts of the officer and Goffstown Fire, the Driscoll died at the scene.


Goffstown teenage killer pleads guilty to murder, faces 37 years

Jaiden Ciruzzi, the Goffstown boy who was 16 when he shot and killed a Manchester high school student during an illegal drug deal in 2017, appeared in court Monday and pleaded guilty to the crime. Ciruzzi, who is now 20, pleaded guilty to second-degree murder in exchange for prosecutors asking for a prison sentence of no more than 37 years when he returns to Hillsborough County Superior Court in June for sentencing. Ciruzzi admitted to shooting and killing Ian Jewell, 18, in a hardware store parking lot in Goffstown. He was certified to stand trial as an adult and faced both firstand second degree murder charges.

Prosecutors will drop the firstdegree murder charge once the deal is finalized. The killing took place on November 19, 2017, at a hardware store parking lot in Goffstown. Ciruzzi lived in Goffstown and attended high school there.

Less than one in 10 commercially insured patients in the United States who broke a hip, a major complication of osteoporosis, receive any osteoporosis medi-cation within two calendar quarters of their fracture, according to a study presented at ENDO 2021, the Endocrine Society's annual meeting. Medical associations recommend osteoporosis evaluation and treatment after a hip fracture. Osteoporosis medications, also called bone-directed or bone-modifying drugs, prevent bones

from getting weaker by slowing the natural breakdown of bone or by stimulating new bone to form. Some 54 million Americans — primarily - have osteoporosis or are at risk of the bone-weakening disease, putting them at increased danger of broken bones, according to the Hormone Health Network. Each year, more than 300,000 older adults nationwide sustain a hip fracture requiring hospitalization, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Anabolic androgenic steroids (AAS), a synthetic version of the male sex hormone testosterone, are sometimes used as a medical treatment for hormone imbalance. But the vast majority of AAS is used to enhance athletic performance or build muscle because, when paired with strength training AAS use increases muscle mass and strength. Its use is known to have many side effects, ranging from acne to heart problems to increased aggression. A new study now suggests that AAS can also have deleterious effects on the brain, causing it to age prematurely. The report appears in Biological Psychiatry: Cognitive Neuroscience and Neuroimaging. Because AAS are administered at much higher doses than those naturally found in the body, they could have a harmful impact on the brain, particularly over a long period of use. Previous studies have shown that AAS users performed worse on cognitive tests than non-users.

PEOPLE WITH SEVERE GUM DISEASE MAY BE TWICE AS LIKELY TO HAVE INCREASED BLOOD PRESSURE



Adults with periodontitis, a severe gum infection, may be significantly more likely to have higher blood pressure compared to individuals who had healthy gums, according to new research. Previous studies have found an association between hypertension and periodontitis. Research confirming the details of this association, however, is scarce. Periodontitis is an infection of the gum tissues that hold teeth in place that can lead to progressive inflammation, bone or tooth loss. Prevention and

treatment of periodontitis is cost effective and can lead to reduction of systemic markers of inflammation as well as improvement in function of the endothelium (thin membrane lining the inside of the heart and blood vessels).

The study included 250 adults with generalized, severe periodontitis (50% of teeth measured with gum infection) and a control group of 250 adults who did not have severe gum disease, all of whom were otherwise healthy and had no other chronic health conditions. The researchers found that a diagnosis of gum disease was associated with higher odds of hypertension, independent of common cardiovascular risk factors. Individuals with gum disease were twice as likely to have high systolic blood pressure values compared to people with healthy gums (14% and 7%, respectively). Researchers also found:

The presence of active gum inflammation (identified by bleeding gums) was associated with higher systolic blood pressure. Participants with periodontitis exhibited increased glucose, LDL ("bad" cholesterol), hsCRP and white blood cell levels, and lower HDL ("good" cholesterol) levels compared to those in the control group.

Nearly 50% of participants with gum disease and 42% of the control group had blood pressure values for a diagnosis of hypertension.



Conservation Commission briefs Select Board

Peter Beblowski of the Antrim Conservation Commission attended the Board of Selectmen's recent meeting to update with the Board and new Town Administrator Russell McAllister on the commission's past work and future plans. He noted that they had removed several invasive species, including some around the library and the Grapevine properties. They are concerned about the Burning Bushes at the end of Town Hall and are planning on removing them and replacing them with blueberry bushes. He also spoke about the 20 acres adjacent to the Fire Department. As everyone would rather not see trailhead parking at the fire station, the commission is working on a right-of-way off Buttercup Lane. As it is on the other side of the river, a small footbridge using existing abutments would have to be constructed to allow moderate and low impact activities such as hiking. Selectman Davis volunteered to look more closely at the deeds around this right-of-way. The long-range plan is to have hiking trails and new recreational opportunities to extend throughout the town. Peter also expressed thanks to Jim Plourde for removing the beaver dam under the Gregg Lake Bridge. allowing the loons to nest and protecting the road from flooding and erosion. As there are many long and short term projects that need to be addressed, the Board agreed to have a workshop to determine how to efficiently identify and plan them. Other groups who may be affected, such as CIP, will be invited to attend.






