EDies Board honors Henniker Community School

The NH Excellence in Education (EDies) Board has announced that the Henniker Community School has been selected as the 2022 NH K-8 School of Excellence.

EDies Chairman Ken Darsney and a large contingent from the Department of Education presented the award to a surprised assembly at the school on Tuesday morning. The NH Excellence in Education Awards Program recognized NH schools and individuals who meet high standards of excellence. The award for outstanding elementary, middle and secondary schools

is determined by criteria developed by the Board and applied by selection committees composed of experienced educators and community leaders.

Henniker Community School was selected in part because of its deeply-rooted community spirit and curriculum-based events such as the Third Grade History Walk and Ambassadors of Kindness Program. It was also honored for individual student goal setting and programming to support each student. The 2022 Awards Ceremony takes place June 4th in Manchester.

New Fees & other changes at Weare's Transfer Station

Weare Public Works Director Benji Knapp presented the Select Board with a revised Fee schedule for the Transfer Station. The largest increases would be for furniture \$10, and mattresses \$15. Currently the facility has 127 pieces of furniture, of which 30-40 are mattresses which are the most expensive to dispose of. The Board unanimously adopted the new schedule to be effective on May 14th. Knapp also suggested that the Board

consider charging for transfer station stickers when vehicles are registered and to require clear, rather than black disposal bags to encourage increased recycling of cans, generating additional funds for the town. The Board took it under advisement for adoption in 4-6 weeks after a public hearing. In other business, the Board agreed to reopen the tennis courts as of May 21st with new signage advising to play at your own risk.

H-D Board announced two new principals and a new teachers' contract

The Hillsboro-Deering School Board met on Tuesday, May 3rd and appointed Robin Whitney Hillsboro-Deering Lower Elementary School Principal and Craig Roach Hillsboro-Deering Upper Elementary School Principal, both effective July 1, 2022.

Ms. Whitney and Mr. Roach are both experienced school administrators who are excited to begin working with the students, families, and staff at H-DES.

Ms. Whitney and Mr. Roach bring tremendous, complementary assets to Hillsboro-Deering Elementary School that will support the growth and development of students and continued implementation of the SAU 34 Strategic Plan.

The Hillsboro-Deering School Board and the Hillsboro-Deering Federation of Teachers have reached a contract agreement to put before the voters in a special ballot voting session on July 12, 2022.

This new agreement provides a

strong framework for the continued advancement of the district, while acknowledging the current financial constraints of the community. The new agreement maintains the increased employee contribution to health insurance, reduces the proposed cost of living increases, and does not include any evergreen provisions.



New London Inn nominated for Business for the Arts Awards


Newbury's iconic Town Administrator Dennis Pavlicek to retire

Dennis Pavlicek, Newbury's long serving Town Administrator expects to retire in 2023, three decades after a tragedy shook this small town to its core.

In 1993, Pavlicek was working at the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration in Concord, when a frustrated taxpayer opened fire in the Newbury Town Hall, killing two female town employees, and injuring the then Town Administrator Carol Hockmeyer before dying from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Pavlicek and multiple other DRA employees began working at the town offices who were trying to get back on their feet. Once accomplished, Pavlicek returned to the DRA. Upon learning that the Administrator position would be opening up, he immediately applied and was hired.

Although he has decided that he will retire next winter, he expects to help with the search for his replacement.

Awaiting trial for DWI, 2nd causes accident

Erica Murphy, 39, of Manchester, was charged with driving under the influence following the incident in Mer-

rimack. A State Trooper was sitting inside his cruiser, which was positioned in the right breakdown lane on the northbound side of the highway, when Murphy proceeded to drive her Ford Edge into the breakdown lane and strike the rear of the trooper's cruiser. Murphy was out on bail from two prior felony arrests. Murphy was arrested in January in Weare on a charge



of driving while impaired. Prosecutors said a search warrant uncovered seven bags of suspected heroin, more than \$1,000 in cash and a used syringe. Murphy was released on bail the same day. Murphy was arrested again in March, and the affidavit in that case says she was impaired. Prosecutors said a search warrant revealed suspected heroin, a scale and cash. The prosecutor requested she be held in jail in March, but the judge denied it. Murphy was out on bail the next day. She is currently being held in preventative detention on charges related to the crash.

Franklin man arrested as habitual offender

Daniel T. Bain, 36, of West High Street in Franklin has been indicted on a felony operating as a habitual offender charge. He was accused by police of driving on East Bow Street in Franklin on February 5 after being certified as a habitual offender by the NH DMV.

Contoocook man for felony drug possession

Samuel Chase, 23, of Pinewood Drive in Contoocook was arrested on a felony possession of a narcotic drug charge, cocaine and fentanyl mix, on Route 106 in Loudon on November 8, 2021. According to the indictment, Chase has been previously convicted of drug possession in Merrimack County Superior Court.

Hopkinton's Houston Barn added to the NH Register of Historic Places

The New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources is pleased to announce that the State Historical Resources Council has added five properties, including Hopkinton's Houston Barn to the New Hampshire State Register of Historic Places, six weeks after town voters spent \$875,000 to repair it.

Located in the outskirts of Hopkinton's Contoocook Village, the gambrel-roofed Houston Barn (circa 1912) was once part of a 115-acre farm that originally had chickens, sheep and Angus beef but focused on dairy



production starting in the mid-twentieth century; T.C. Houston milk was the first in town to be delivered doorto-door. Today, the farm's former hay and corn fields have been converted to sports playing fields, hiking trails, a playground and a dog park. Being named to the state Register of Historic Places carries no financial or regulatory reward but has at least one major benefit: It makes sites eligible for grants from the New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Investment Program and funding from some other sources. It imposes no restrictions on usage by the owner.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN DURING MY DENTAL CHECKUP?



It can be intimidating to go to the dentist, and this fear is what keeps a lot of people from visiting regularly. Knowing what will happen during your dental checkup might make it a little easier to make an appointment and get into that reclining chair.

At your checkup, your dentist will:

 Perform a thorough examination of your mouth, teeth, and gums

- Ask questions about your overall health and any dental issues you've had since your last appointment
- Ask questions about what you eat and your tobacco or alcohol use
- Advise you on ways to improve your oral hygiene and general teethcleaning habits
- Recommend treatment or other measures for dental problems, if necessary

At the end of the appointment, your dentist should suggest a date for your next visit. It might be sooner than six months, and it might be further out. Your dentist will take into account your current oral health and risk of developing problems when scheduling your next checkup.

How Often Should I Go to the Dentist?

There's no one-size-fits-all answer to this question. When deciding on a dental checkup routine, there are many things to keep in mind. Factors that affect how often you need to see the dentist include:

Lifestyle. If you drink or smoke often, you may need to see the dentist more frequently. Studies show that people who drink alcohol have a three times higher rate of permanent tooth loss than the national average in the United States, and tobacco usage is linked to common oral diseases.

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TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



More patients than previously reported may experience hearing symptoms such as hearing loss or muffled hearing from a new treatment for thyroid eye disease, teprotumumab (Tepezza), according to a small study presented virtually at ENDO 2021, the Endocrine Society's annual meeting. Teprotumumab, approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration in January 2020, is the first and only drug to be approved for thyroid eve

disease. The treatment has shown significant improvement in abnormal protrusion of the eyes (proptosis), double vision, soft tissue inflammation and quality of life. In two clinical trials conducted prior to FDA approval of the drug, otologic symptoms were reported in 10 percent of patients. The new study found the rate could be as high as 65 percent. Thyroid eye disease is an autoimmune disease in which the eye muscles and fatty tissue behind the eye become inflamed. Symptoms can include dry, watery, red or bulging eyes, a "stare," double vision, difficulty closing the eyes, and problems with vision. It is primarily associated with an overactive thyroid gland due to Graves' disease.

An analysis published in the *Journal of the American Geriatrics Society* indicates that while adults aged 75 years and older do not benefit from taking aspirin to prevent cardiovascular disease, many do so on a regular basis. Also, although statins are known to help prevent heart problems in older adults who have experienced a cardiovascular event, many of these individuals do not take a statin. The analysis included data on 11,392 U.S. adults aged 50 years and older who were surveyed from 2011 to 2018. Investigators found that more than half of participants took aspirin or a statin.

ConVal 8, Pembroke 5: Taylor Renna broke open Pembroke's scoring with a triple to spark the Spartan bats, but it wasn't enough to top the Cougars.

Hopkinton 8, Bishop Brady 3: The Hawks broke open a 2-1 game with four runs in the fifth inning and two more in the sixth.

BASEBALL

Pembroke 5, ConVal 4: ConVal took an early lead with a two-run homer in the first inning and led, 4-2, in the seventh, but the Spartans took a 5-4 lead. ConVal threatened in the final half-inning, leaving the tying run on third.

Hopkinton 7, Mascenic 6: The Hawks and Vikings got rained out in Cooperstown, so they drove back to New Ipswich and Mascenic jumped out to a 6-1 lead on their home field. The Hawks scored four runs in the sixth and two in the seventh to earn a tough come-from-behind win.

Bishop Brady 10, Hopkinton 8: The Giants scored five runs in the bottom of the third to jump out to a 6-1 lead, but Hopkinton answered with five runs of its own in the top of the fifth to tie the game, 6-6. Brady scored three runs in the bottom half of the frame to take a 9-6 lead and held off a Hawk rally in the seventh.

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Hopkinton & Henniker respond to accident

Hopkinton and Henniker firefighters and EMTs, as well as New Hampshire State Police, were sent to a rollover crash on Interstate 89 on Sunday. Near Mile Marker 9.8, around 11 p.m., witnesses called 911 about a rollover crash with a person entrapped as well as a person ejected from the vehicle just south of Exit 6 on the southbound side. The first arriving firefighters found the vehicle, on its roof, in the median. Firefighters began removing the driver from the vehicle while state police confirmed the passenger was thrown and began searching for them, according to dispatch. Around 11:15 p.m., the battalion commander requested a trauma alert at Concord Hospital for a man in his 40s with multiple injuries who was removed from the vehicle. Henniker EMTs took the man to the hospital while the others continued to search for the passenger. At just past 11:30 p.m., dispatch said Henniker units were clearing the crash while Hopkinton firefighters staved to work on the recovery.

Antrim man & Greenfield woman injured

An Antrim man was taken to the hospital after the crash near the Bennington town line around 1:45 p.m. The two vehicles involved were a Chevy Equinox and Nissan SUV. The Chevy – driven by an Antrim man, whose name was not disclosed by police because the investigation is still open – was driving northbound and crossed over the center line. The Nissan – driven by a Greenfield woman, whose name was also not disclosed — was traveling in the southbound lane when her SUV flipped on its side, trapping her in. She remained conscious, but had to be rescued from the vehicle, according to Patrolman Hunter. He said rescue personnel called a helicopter from Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center, but canceled it when the driver opted to be taken for medical treatment by ambulance. The Antrim man has "severe chest trauma," Sgt. Blake said, and his condition is considered life-threatening. The Greenfield woman had minor, non life-threatening injuries.
