A True Hero Among Us 1980's Freedom Fighter feted at Henniker gathering

David Tille hosted another eclectic gathering at his Henniker home on Saturday. A large group of local residents rubbed elbows with three former U.S. Senators, a former Congressman, two former U.S. Ambassadors and a dozen N.H. officials.

They gathered to honor Lech Wałęsa, Polish statesman, dissident, and Nobel Peace Prize laureate, who served as the President of Poland between 1990 and 1995, who had earlier received an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters Degree at New England College's Commencement.

A shipyard electrician by trade, Wałęsa became the leader of the Solidarity movement, and led a successful pro-democratic effort which in 1989 ended the Communist rule in Poland and ushered in the end of the Cold War.

After winning the 1990 election, Wałęsa

became the first democratically elected President of Poland since 1926 and the first-ever Polish President elected in popular vote.

In addition to the Nobel Peace Prize, Wałęsa has received hundreds of prizes, honors and awards from many countries of the world. He was named the Time Person of the Year (1981) and one of Time's 100 most important people of the 20th century (1999). In addition to NEC's, he has received over forty honorary degrees, including from Harvard University and Columbia University, as well as dozens of the highest state orders, including: the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the Knight Grand Cross of the British Order of the Bath, and the French Grand Cross of Legion of Honour. In 1989, Wałesa was the first foreign non-head of state to address the Joint Meeting of the U.S. Congress.

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

H-D School Board wants to retain most of expected \$2 million surplus

After a public hearing, the HD School Board discussed and voted to use all the money that was left in the paving account (about \$31,000) and enough from the HVAC trust fund to finish the first floor of the Elementary School. The HVAC account had approximately \$150,000 and the quotes came in just over \$83,000. Depleting the accounts was in line with what was discussed at the last Deliberative Session this past Spring. The Board also discussed with Business Administrator Mary Henry the general budget. Ms. Henry stated that it looks like they'll have a surplus of nearly \$2 million dollars and suggested that only a portion of that be given back to the Towns to defray taxes. The argument being that while there is extra money this year, holding a larger portion of the surplus would help future budgets and not have roller coaster swings with the tax rates. No action was taken, but will be discussed in more depth in the future.

It was announced that the date for the next Deliberative Session for the warrant article regarding the teachers' contracts will be June 14 and the ballot voting will be on July 12. The Board presented the new agreed-upon contract that will be presented. The major difference between the contract presented last Spring is a .5 % in teachers' salaries (from 2.5 to 2%).



Stark seniors reflect on where they have been and where they are headed

As they look forward to graduation in just a few weeks—a milestone that was not assured for all of them just months ago—four John Stark students shared with school board members about where they've been and where they are headed for their future careers. Sophie Hebert came to John Stark from Manchester as a transfer student in her sophomore year and arrived with only enough credits to be a freshman.

"When I was little, I was a good student and did well in school. But then I got involved with the wrong group of people in Manchester. I made mistakes, skipped school, and failed the second semester of my freshman year," Sophie explained.

In an effort to give Sophie a fresh start, her mom moved the family to Weare in 2019. "It wasn't easy. The kids were different, but as I got to know them and saw that they always attended classes, I realized that they valued their education. It opened my eyes and I got my head going in the right direction," she explained.

Just as Sophie was making friends and getting settled at John Stark, Covid hit. The challenges of Covid and remote learning left Sophie being less successful than she'd hoped. By the end of her sophomore year, she'd managed only to accumulate just 2.5 credits. "When I saw my report card that June, I was devastated. I was so disappointed that I'd let myself down again," she said.

Sophie turned her devastation and

disappointment into a commitment to be successful in her junior year and to push herself to graduate with her class, the Class of 2022. She developed a plan, and with a full schedule, she also enrolled in online recovery coursework, took advantage of John Stark classroom support, and Flex Block. Her plan began to work. She earned 8.5 credits toward graduation in her junior year.

Her goal for this, her senior year? Earn all the credits necessary to graduate and with grades she is proud of. Sophie earned 4 credits in the first semester and is working on 6 more credits now. Graduation is on her horizon. She has applied to NHTI for the fall in their dual admission program with an intent to graduate from Keene State.

"I've learned to never give up. Everyone is capable of a bright future," exclaimed Sophie Hebert.

Nate Nichols always had a plan. He knew he wanted to be a police officer or firefighter. What he couldn't figure out was how high school was going to help him meet that goal and admits to not making school a priority. That all changed, however, when in his sophomore year, he attended a College and Career Fair at school. "At that fair, I was able to explore pathways and career fields suitable to me. I became passionate and loved school because I could see how it would help me meet my career goal," he said.

Lex Scourby, a 1975 NEC graduate, and now Chairman of the Board of Trustees, reflected on his personal journey, urging graduates to be true to themselves.


Graduate student Cameo Bixby-Clemonds and undergraduate Connor Dunn recalled their journeys over the last several years.

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

HOW COVID-19 CAN AFFECT YOUR MOUTH



A lost or altered sense of taste, dry mouth and sores are common among COVID-19 patients and those symptoms may last long after others disappear, Brazilian researchers report. Nearly 4 in 10 COVID patients experience impaired taste or total loss of taste, but dry mouth affects even more — up to 43%, according to their broad review of more than 180 published studies.

Lor. Esin Narii The review looked at oral health symptoms in nearly 65,000 COVID patients around the world — with some predictable and also some surprising results. "Regarding COVID-19 patients specifically, the important message is to maintain healthy oral health habits during their illness if they are able to do so," said Dr. Edmond Hewlett, a spokesman for the American Dental Association who reviewed the findings. "Dry mouth significantly increases the risk for tooth decay, so brushing twice a day with a fluoridated toothpaste, flossing once a day, limiting snacking, and avoiding sugary foods and drinks are the best ways to maintain their oral health."

By now, most people are aware that loss of smell and taste are key symptoms of infection with the SARS-CoV-2 virus. But the research review by a team led by University of Brasilia researcher E.N.S. Guerra identified a number of variations on that theme.

Folks with COVID can have a reduced sense of taste (hypogueusia); a distorted sense of taste, in which everything tastes sweet, sour, bitter or metallic (dysgeusia); or a total loss of all taste (ageusia), according to the study.

Some COVID patients also reported lesions on or under their tongue or along the gums and sides of the mouth, the study found.

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TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A recent study published in the *Canadian Medical Association Journal* (CMAJ) lists five facts to know about antihistamines: 1) Antihistamines are among the most commonly and incorrectly used medicines worldwide. Antihistamines are best used to relieve symptoms of hay fever and outbreaks of hives, but not for asthma, eczema, coughs or insomnia. 2) First-generation antihistamines are associated with substantial and sometimes fatal side effects. Antihis-

substantial and sometimes fatal side effects. Antinistamines with diphenhydramine, chlorpheniramine or hydroxyzine are first-generation antihistamines that can cause drowsiness and affect cognitive functions such as school performance. Overdosing can cause death and they are potentially dangerous for both young and older people. 3) Newer antihistamines are safer, as affordable and as effective as first-generation antihistamines. Later-generation antihistamines are proven to be more effective and last longer with less side-effects like drowsiness. 4) Antihistamines should not be used instead of epinephrine to treat anaphylaxis. Oral drugs can be used together with epinephrine injections to treat anaphylactic reactions, but they are not a substitute. 5) Most antihistamines are safe to use during pregnancy and breastfeeding. Medical research has shown that antihistamines at standard doses do not harm fetuses during pregnancy and may be used during breastfeeding. They are also safe for children to use.

A recently published study finds that long-term aspirin use before a diagnosis of colorectal cancer (CRC) may be associated with lower colorectal cancer specific mortality. The report that appears in *JNCI: The Journal of the National Cancer Institute*, suggests that the findings for pre-diagnosis aspirin use might help reduce CRC mortality in the overall population by limiting metastatic spread of colorectal tumors before diagnosis. Preventing distant metastases leads to fewer deaths from colorectal cancer.

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

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
