State Fire Marshal Honored

Warner's Sean Toomey receives prestigious Ethics Award

Sean Toomey of Warner, the State Fire Marshal of New Hampshire, has been



named the recipient of the 26th annual New Hampshire Construction Industry Ethics Award.

The award honors the "individual, business or organization that, through words and deeds, best

demonstrates a commitment to upholding the highest ethical standards in construction." Toomey is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire. He earned his Master's degree in Fire Protection Engineering from Worcester Polytechnic Institute. He then began employment with SFC Engineering Partnership, Inc., where he worked as a consulting engineer for seven years prior to joining the Concord Fire Department as the Assistant Life Safety Officer in 2005. He served the Concord Fire Department for 13 years and progressed to Deputy Fire Chief. In 2018, he became the Deputy State Fire Marshal, and in June 2021 he was confirmed by the Governor and Executive Council as State Fire Marshal.

Antrim residents suing over Antrim Wind Sound levels

A group of eight Antrim residents have filed suit against the state's Site Evaluation Committee, claiming the committee changed interpretation of the rules around noise limitations on the Antrim Wind project. The petitioners are asking the Merrimack Superior Court to find that the SEC violated state law by failing to adopt rules "that address health and safety impacts."

The focus of the complaint is how the

sound is measured. The wind farm is limited to 38 decibels at any residence in the evening hours.

Antrim Wind Energy has submitted reports to the SEC indicating it is meeting that standard, when the sound is averaged over the course of an hour. The petitioners say the SEC's rules do not allow for readings to be averaged, and there are moments when the sound peaks well above the limit.

A true New Hampshire icon, Jim Gaskell died on June 05, 2022. Many

knew Jim, but few knew the amazing path he traveled in his 95 years.


Jim was a WWII veteran and served as clerk to Senator S. Bridges (R) N.H., he

Reckless driving leads to three car accident in Bradford

On May 27, 2022 at around 3:00 p.m. the Bradford Police Department. Bradford Fire Department and the Bradford Rescue Squad responded to a motor vehicle accident in front of the Lumber Barn located in Bradford, NH. The accident was a head on collision between two vehicles with a third vehicle sustaining moderate front-end damage. Due to the severity of the crash and injuries to those involved, the Warner Fire Department, Henniker Fire Department, Henniker Ambulance, New London Ambulance and New London Fire Department were also called in to assist. DHART was requested but cancelled.

Through on scene investigation and eye witness statements, it was learned that a 2009 Mitsubishi Lancer being operated by Joseph Tierney of Goffstown was traveling northbound on Route 114 passing another vehicle in a no passing zone when it struck a 2013 Toyota Highlander operated by Stephanie Willett of Bradford head on.



Fortunately, there were no fatalities.

The driver of the vehicle being passed, Steven Boyce of Peterborough, was unable to avoid the collision in front of him and his vehicle, a 2015 Honda Crosstour, sustained moderate front end damage.

Tierney and a juvenile passenger of the other vehicle were both transported for serious, life-threatening injuries. Willett and a second juvenile passenger were taken for treatment. Boyce and his passenger were treated on scene for minor injuries.

The investigation is still ongoing. Speed and reckless driving appear to be a determining factor in the cause of the crash. Anyone with information about this crash is asked to call Chief Edward Shaughnessy at the Bradford Police Department at 603-938-2522.

WHAT IS ORAL PSORIASIS?



Most folks think of psoriasis as a skin problem that shows up on spots that everyone can see, like your elbows, knees, and scalp. But symptoms of this disease may happen in places you don't expect, like inside your mouth.

When that occurs, it's called oral psoriasis. It's not a serious medical problem, but it may be uncomfortable. And it can be a struggle to get the right diagnosis. Why? It's so rare that

most doctors have never seen it before, and some aren't sure it even exists.

What Are the Symptoms?

It can be hard to tell if you have oral psoriasis. The symptoms are often mild and come and go quickly. And doctors don't even agree on what all the symptoms are. But in general, experts think that while signs can appear in different spots in your mouth, they're most common on the inside of your cheeks.

You might notice patches of red skin with yellow or white edges; sores; peeling skin on the gums; blisters with pus (pustules); pain or burning, especially when eating spicy foods; changes in how things taste. Oral psoriasis may be linked with other conditions, like fissured tongue — grooves or trenches on your tongue; geographic tongue — red patches on your tongue that look like islands on a map; or swollen or infected gums.

People who have oral psoriasis tend to have symptoms on their skin too, such as thick, scaly patches. The symptoms in your mouth will probably get better or worse along with the symptoms on your skin. So if psoriasis symptoms show up in your mouth, you're likely to have skin flare-ups, too.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



According to new research in the *Journal of Osteopathic Medicine*, some common medications, including widely used blood thinners and hormones, are often derived from animal byproducts and prescribed without consulting the patient about their beliefs. Heparinoids are a class of medication primarily derived from pigs. These drugs are routinely used as a blood thinner to prevent blood clots and are given in many settings, including following surgery, a heart attack, or to prevent the further development of clots. Also

common are conjugated estrogens, which may be used to treat moderate to severe hot flashes and other symptoms of menopause. They are equine-derived hormones. Another example: there are no completely animal-free oral thyroid hormones on the market. According to the study many religions discourage the use of products derived from animals when not required to save human life: Jewish and Muslim leaders agree that the use of products derived from pigs — normally prohibited by both religions — are acceptable only when needed to protect human life. The Hindu Council of Australia does not consider bovine products, including medications derived from cows, acceptable. Sikh leaders and leaders of the Hindu Vaishnav sect object to the use of medication or surgical dressing derived from animal sources, which is waived in emergency situations or in routine treatment where no alternative exists. Many Buddhists of the Theravada sect and Christians of the Seventh Day Adventist sect who practice vegetarianism as part of their faith may individually reject animal-derived medical products. Leaders of the Jehovah's Witness sect emphasized that adherents to this faith would reject blood-derived products.

The US Food and Drug Administration has approved Qelbree for the treatment of attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) in patients aged 6 to 17 years, making it the first novel nonstimulant approved for ADHD in a decade. Capsules can be swallowed whole or their contents can be sprinkled onto food.

Five area Rescue Crews and NH Fish & Game rescue injured hiker

Newbury Fire Rescue was dispatched to a call for an injured hiker on the Monadnock Sunapee Greenway trail, south of Lake Solitude on Mount Sunapee.

The hiker had a cell phone and was able to provide information on his injuries to the responders. It was determined that the best way to reach the party was from the Sun Bowl area of Mount Sunapee. All of the trails to the hiker's location were rocky and narrow and based on the hiker's injuries and distance down the trail that he would have to be carried, additional help would be needed.

New London Dispatch contacted the mutual aid departments and updated the commander on the response status. New Hampshire Fish and Game was notified and sent several officers as well as activating the Upper Valley Wilderness Response Team. The initial rescue teams hiked the trails to the injured hiker's location and provided first aid upon reach-

ing the person. Additional rescuers carrying a Stokes basket reached the location and placed the hiker in the basket to carry him back up the trail to the staging area. The time to get the responders to the patient and to hike out with him was over six hours. The individual was evaluated by the New London Ambulance paramedics and transported to the hospital.




