Congratulations Graduates

H-D graduates challenged to live with profound love and courage

Family and friends of the 70 Hillsboro-Deering graduates gathered under the tent Friday evening for Commencement Exercises.

Irena Rose and Emily Wilkens reflected on their four years at HDHS and welcomed all to the ceremony.

In her opening remarks, outgoing SAU Superintendent Patricia Parenteau quoted Jane Goodall who said, "What you do makes a difference, and you have to decide what kind of difference you want to make."

Valedictorian Lucas Woods compared his high school experience to a hotel under renovation. "We've been waiting for the time we can finally finish improving ourselves enough to get past inspection," he said. "At least that's what graduation feels like."

In his commencement assess, teacher Noah Denslow challenged the graduates to "Live with profound love and courage... go big... and take risks."

Vote on revised H-D Teacher's Contract set for July 12th

The H-D Deliberative Session lasted only 12 minutes with less than a dozen people in the audience and only one person asking questions. The question on the ballot on July 12 will be to accept the new teachers' contract which was defeated in March.

The Union and the School Board have renegotiated the contract which will lower the proposed increase from 2.5% to

2% and increase the amount that teachers contribute to their health insurance.

They are also proposing that the "Evergreen clause" that has existed for many years be eliminated.

The ballot voting for Hillsboro voters will be held on July 12 at the H-D Middle School from 7am-7pm, and for Deering voters at the Deering Town Hall from 8am-7pm.

Three parcels under review for new New London Police Station

New London's Police Station Review Committee has been meeting since mid November of 2021, initially reviewing 32 properties which might fit the purpose.

In January the Committee eliminated 23 of those as not sufficiently meeting the needs. Of the nine remaining properties, six of the owners had no desire to sell to the town.

Henniker Community School receives a much-needed energy makeover

Henniker Community School (HCS) has had a much-needed energy makeover. The work included a rather diverse group of individual projects, and it was managed by Energy Efficiency Investments (EEI) of Merrimack, New Hampshire, which did much of the work itself. One of the important projects was a rooftop solar array, installed by 603 Solar of Exeter, New Hampshire.

Keith McBrien, Business Development Specialist at EEI called the company an "energy performance contractor." The goal of the company is to reduce the energy use and carbon footprint of a business or organization without increasing its costs. He said, "We worked to help with the school to replace aging equipment with highly energy efficient and renewable energy options to help reduce the energy usage costs of the school."

The work done at HCS was not a simple upgrade. Among the things that EEI did was to replace three roofs. One was a rubber membrane roof that was 25 years old and was replaced by a new rubber membrane. The second was an asphalt roof that was at the end of its life, and the third was a slate roof that was installed in the 1930s. The latter two roofs were replaced with asphalt shingles. In addition, the insulation for the building was upgraded.

EEI replaced the HVAC equipment with variable refrigerant flow heat pumps from Daikin. At the same time, the oil-burning heating system for

the school was replaced with one that burns propane. McBrien explained that there were areas in the school, particularly the cafeteria and gymnasium, where propane was considered appropriate.

The fluorescent lighting at HCS was replaced by new LED lights from Phillips. In a school, this is an important upgrade.

McBrien said that EEI works to reduce energy costs of operating the building enough to cover the costs of upgrading the existing system. In the case of HCS, the work included some upgrades that were not addressed in the system being replaced, but which were considered important. All classrooms are now heated with heat pumps, making it possible to add improvements in air quality greatly with increased circulation. This is especially important in an age of Covid-19.

One important addition to HCS was installation of a solar array. The decision to install the array dates back to May 2020, when voters in the town of Henniker approved installation of a roof-mounted solar array on school buildings. The cost was expected to be

slightly less than \$295,000. The solar array was to be just part of a needed upgrade for energy efficiency.


The array was designed, engineered and is now monitored by 603 Solar while the physical installation, inspection and commissioning was performed by Adams Energy of Canterbury, NH.

The array at HCS is impressive. It is expected that the solar array will generate about 115,000 kilowatthours (kWh) of electricity each year, equivalent to reducing greenhouse gas emissions of 81.5 metric tons. According to Keith McBrien, this is sufficient to offset about half of the school's electricity use. It has a total of 250 Hanwha Q.Peak Duo 400-watt solar modules. These are tied to two 43.2 kWh Solar Edge three-phase string inverters. The array is set up on a ballast block racking system from Ecolibrium Solar on four flat roof areas.

Zach Haithcock of 603 Solar said, "We love working with schools and municipalities to realize their renewable energy goals. Not only are they really fun projects to work on, but they also raise awareness in the area regarding renewable energy. When you see your local school or town hall install solar, it really gets people's attention and motivates them to look into it for themselves!"

Haithcock said 603 Solar and EEI had worked together before when the Newmarket, NH fire department had similar work done using similar equipment.

WHAT'S THE TREATMENT FOR ORAL PSORIASIS?



Many people with oral psoriasis don't need treatment because they're not bothered by it. But if it hurts, you can start with some simple steps:

- Rinse your mouth with a mixture of lukewarm water and salt.
- Don't eat spicy foods when symptoms are acting up.
- If you smoke, stop.

If those home remedies aren't enough, talk to your doctor. Other options include:

- Mouth rinses that lower acidity in your mouth and help with pain
- Medicines you can put on the sore areas in your mouth, such as steroids
- Pills or capsules (like cyclosporine) for severe symptoms
- If you take medications by mouth for skin psoriasis, they should also help with your oral symptoms.

For now, there's a lot we don't know about who gets oral psoriasis and how to treat it. We don't even know how many people have it. And experts think that in part, that's because dermatologists who treat psoriasis don't usually check inside people's mouths.

So if you have psoriasis on your skin and notice symptoms in your mouth, tell your doctor. It's the fastest way you'll get the treatment you need. And you may actually help your doctor better understand this unusual condition.

To figure out what's causing your symptoms, your doctor may ask you questions about your medical history (and your family's); take a small sample of skin from inside your mouth to check under a microscope; or do genetic tests. Your doctor will also want to rule out other conditions that cause similar symptoms, like candida infection; leukoplakia; lichen planus; Reiter's syndrome; and problems caused by smoking, dentures that don't fit well, and other issues.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Researchers have published a paper in the *Frontiers of Nutrition*, concerning depression during the COVID-19 pandemic. Within a one-month period at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, the researchers write that there was a reported 34.1 percent increase in prescriptions for anti-anxiety medications, an 18.6 percent increase in antidepressant prescriptions, and a 14.8 percent increase in common anti-insomnia drugs including pre-

scribed anti-insomnia medications in the United States.

A study published in the *Annals of Internal Medicine* has determined that large doses of vitamin D supplements were no better at preventing falls in people age 70 and older than a low dose. Preliminary studies show that vitamin D may increase muscle strength and improve balance, but the new study finds that vitamin D supplement doses of 2,000 and 4,000 IU/day appeared to increase the risk of falls compared with 1,000 IU/day, a relatively common dose for a pure vitamin D supplement. In addition, serious falls and falls with hospitalization occurred more frequently in persons assigned to 1,000 or more IU/day compared with those assigned to 200 IU/day.

New research presented at this year's European Congress of Clinical Microbiology & Infectious Diseases (ECCMID) shows that aspirin can reduce the risk of serious cardiovascular events such as ischemic stroke and myocardial infarction (MI - heart attack) in patients with pneumonia. Serious cardiovascular complications are common in cases of pneumonia and are strongly associated with long-term mortality. This study looked at whether aspirin could reduce the risk of ischemic stroke (stroke caused by blockage of blood vessels, representing some 80% of strokes) and heart attack, and if the drug could have a preventive role to play in primary care settings.

Bradford wins Preservation Alliance Award

Prior to this week's Select Board meeting. Chair Marlene Fryler and Board members Mel Pfeifle and Beth Downs accepted a 2022 Achievement Award from the NH Preservation Society for the restoration of the Bement Bridge and support abutments. Beginning in 2011-2012, the Town of Bradford applied for a grant to help restore the bridge, and since then have been working toward that goal. The final cost was approximately \$1.6 million, with 80% being paid from State and Federal funds. Because it is only one lane wide, drivers must be courteous, but it saves miles of driving for the people who use it. "The Alliance has been giving awards for outstanding preservation projects for over 30 years and the criteria include the project's degree of innovation, quality of work, the extent of challenges and accomplishment, and the level of support for the project," stated Nick Mitchell of the Alliance. Select Board Chair Freyler accepted the plague on behalf of the Town and noted that there was much support from the entire town for this project.

In addition, furniture, flooring, and carpeting release off-gases and contribute different sorts of indoor pollutants that may cause health problems if proper ventilation is not practiced. By: Joyce Bosse It is very important to allow fresh air into your home

to replace the stale air. This includes opening windows periodically and running ceiling or stand-alone fans to circulate the air. Circulating fresh air is especially important when new products, materials or furniture are present in the home. Homeowners can also employ specialized ventilation equipment to increase the airflow and change of air.

The kitchen and bathroom are home to activities that create a lot of humidity and moisture. It is very important to utilize an exhaust fan during and after bathing or cooking. Remember to run these fans long enough to remove the excess moisture from your house.

If your home does not have an exhaust fan, open a window to remove the excess moisture. Drastic changes in temperature from one day to the next may produce additional moisture that may become problematic, so be sure to use air conditioning, dehumidification, and exhaust fans to limit the effect of the temperature differentials.




