Burned to the Ground

Fire ravages Greenfield's Kennebec Lumber Company

Fresh from their Annual BBQ, crews from the Greenfield Fire Department responded to a multi-alarm fire at a sawmill in Greenfield on Saturday.

The fire started around 1:20 p.m. at Kennebec Lumber Company on Sawmill Road, according to Southwest Mutual Fire Aid.

Before it was over, about twenty towns assisted, either fighting the fire, or covering other stations.

Photos and video from the scene showed flames and a large plume of smoke coming from what appeared to be a pile of sawdust and wood pieces, which spread to the main building. The New Hampshire Department of Transportation said Sawmill Road, which is also NH Route 31, was closed in the area of the fire.

A witness told WMUR that he and his family were leaving a Greenfield Fire Department fundraising barbecue when they saw the smoke in the distance, and said they arrived before firefighters did.

"It was very large flames and it was spreading pretty quickly and the smoke, like we saw it from probably a mile away," he reported. Kennebec Lumber has said it will be sending a management team to the facility and would develop an action plan for those affected.

The company also thanked the local first responders for their work. The fire was brought under control Saturday evening, and no injuries were reported.

DWI driver faces multiple charges after ramming Peterborough cruiser

Peterborough Police Department was assisting a motorist with a broken-down motor vehicle on Dublin Road (AKA State Route 101) in the area of the Shaw's supermarket, when an eastbound sedan travelling at a high rate of speed struck the roundabout, traveled up and over the roundabout, and narrowly collided into the rear of Byam's cruiser as it continued eastbound past the cruiser.

Francestown celebrates a day long 250th Anniversary activities

Francestown celebrated its 250th anniversary with a full day of festivities including a grand parade.

To begin the celebrations, New Boston's Artillery Co. fired its Molly Stark cannon, which was captured from the British at the Battle of Bennington, Vt., by Gen. John Stark on Aug. 16, 1777, followed by a ringing of the Meeting House bells.

The Parade down Main Street, Stewart and Carol Brock in period dress as John Wentworth, NH's governor when Francestown was incorporated, and his wife Frances Wentworth Deering, for whom Francestown is named.

The procession included the New Hampshire chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, a fife and drum band and children in period dress.

Arriving at the town Meeting House, John Wentworth, (Brock) recited the town's Charter from June 25, 1772.

The afternoon featured children's

games, pony rides, a petting zoo and an ice cream social.

fashion show and a roast pig dinner on the Town Common, capped off with a costumed dance party, and fireworks.

Supplementing testosterone significantly reduces heart attacks and strokes in men with unnaturally low levels of the hormone, according to new research presented at the European Association of Urology congress. The ten-year study involved over 800 men from Germany and Qatar with testosterone deficiency, whose family history, blood pressure, cholesterol levels, diabetes or weight put them at high risk of heart attack or stroke. Only men with testosterone levels below normal, who also displayed symp-

toms of low testosterone, such as low mood, decreased appetite, depression, erectile dysfunction, loss of libido or weight gain, were included in the research. Just over half of the men opted for long-term testosterone replacement therapy, enabling the researchers to compare this group to those whose condition was left untreated. All the men were encouraged to make lifestyle changes, in terms of diet, alcohol, smoking and exercise, to improve their cardiovascular health.

Most seizure medications carry a life-and-death warning: Taking this drug may increase suicide risk. Now researchers have discovered that the warning does not apply to many antiseizure drugs. A new analysis published in JAMA Neurology has revealed no evidence for increased suicide risk from recently developed antiseizure medications. Despite the lack of data, all anti-seizure medications carry the warning from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). In 2008, the FDA analyzed results from nearly 200 clinical trials that assessed the efficacy of many drugs including 11 anti-seizure medications. The danalysis revealed that compared with placebo, anti-seizure medications nearly doubled suicide risk among patients being treated for epilepsy, psychiatric disorders, and other diseases including chronic pain. The FDA concluded that anti-seizure medications increase suicide risk. However, subsequent analyses did not find the same results. Yet, as a result of the FDA study, all anti-seizure medications approved since 2008 carry a warning for suicidality.



DOWNSIZING IS HARD



Do people lose the ability to manage the thousands of possessions in an average household? Does this become an obstacle to moving to a safer neighborhood, nearer to family members or into assisted living?

"Everyone we talked to firmly believes this," says University of Kansas gerontologist David J. Ekerdt, "geriatricians, social workers, estate sellers, retirement com-

munity directors and family members."

Why is it so hard to get rid of stuff? Ekerdt and his colleagues are finding several reasons. It is really tough physical labor to take apart a household and box it up or dispose of it, of course, but before that comes the cognitive work of sorting and planning the move and the wrenching emotional process of releasing things that define and express us.

You will need family members who can help by giving your possessions a good home and relieving you of deciding how to dispose of them, Ekerdt advises. "And not just special things, but mundane possessions like the products under your sink or in your medicine cabinet."

Ekerdt explains "We're not saying that there is anything wrong with having things or even a lot of things, but there does come a time in many of our lives when we can't deal with them anymore and we ultimately do become prisoners of our space and stuff."
