Another Select Board Vacancy

Meleny Nagy abruptly resigns after public confrontation

Newly elected Hillsborough Selectwoman Meleny Nagy abruptly resigned and walked out of last Wednesday's Select Board meeting after being confronted by resident Riche Colcombe, who accused Nagy of using her position to threaten her.

The incident actually began during a prior Select Board meeting when it was announced that Nagy's Rose Garden Hands LLC had been awarded the bid to paint the Heritage Museum. Someone asked if that was a reputable company to which Colcombe interjected, "NO."

Following the meeting Nagy sent an email to Colcombe, defending her company by saying, in part, that "if I do lose clients - I will file a defamation case against you."


There followed an exchange of emails between the two in which Colcombe claimed her comment was a joke, but concluded saying, "I'm wondering if you as a Select woman are retaliating against me." She then followed by bringing this accusation to Wednesday's open meeting.

Colcombe's resentment dates back even further. Coincidentally, Nagy was appointed to fill a vacancy occurring when two former Select Board members resigned after repeated personal attacks. At the time both women applied for the job and the Board chose Iris Campbell and Nagy over Colcombe.

When The Messenger praised the appointment as "a breath of fresh air" Colcombe sent a blistering email chastising us for "endorsing a Democrat, an Activist and a CRT believer as part of our governing body in Hillsborough. Please take some time to look into Meleny's background and current motives," she wrote.

Proposed Weare Rental Housing Ordinance draws opposition

The Weare Select Board recently held the first of two public hearings planned for public comment and testimony on the proposed draft rental housing ordinance.

Neal Kurk provided the Board with a handout and outlined these concerns as A) Technical Considerations and B) Policy Considerations, citing several problems in each. Kurk ended by stating that in essence this is big government for a small town and we don't need it. Warren Davis doesn't believe this ordinance is necessary. It is going to create greater costs for the tenants as well as the real estate owners.

Tom Flaherty echoed some of the comments that were made previously and was curious as to why all of a sudden we are passing an ordinance, which seems like overkill.

Peter Bailey stated that he is a little disappointed when he sees an ordinance start out with the words "collect fees and impose fines." He doesn't think that's what the Town of Weare is all about. Craig Francisco, Chairman of the Planning Board stated that the Board seems to be taking all the heat so he's going to try to help out a little bit. People have come to the Planning Board over the past 3-4 years complaining about rentals. The Planning Board said they tried to get a zoning ordinance to cover this situation, but Town Counsel thought it would be better to go through the Board of Selectmen versus an amendment.

John Nikias, East Shore Drive, said in August it will be 40 years since he moved in as a full-time resident. He has come to the town before and nothing seems to happen.

Peter Bailey feels the Board is barking up the wrong tree.

Fox concluded, saying, "This is not Weare. This is not America. We are going down a slippery slope. You start knocking on people's doors telling them what they can and can't do in their home, that's a slippery slope."

Chairman Hippler thanked everyone for coming out and said the Board would review this and make changes as we see fit and work with the Planning Board as well. There will be another public hearing scheduled and we will try and have Town Counsel present to answer any legal questions that might come up.

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High speed chase ends in Hillsboro accident

On August 2nd, a Hillsboro Police Officer attempted to stop a vehicle in which they had observed a male driving, that

was known by police to have a suspended driver's license, as a habitual offender in NH. Initially, the vehicle started to yield to the blue lights and sirens, however it then took off at a high rate of speed on W. Main Street. The vehicle continued onto Route 9 Eastbound before the driver attempted to reverse direction and go down the on ramp from Antrim Road the wrong way. In the course of reversing directions the vehicle

drove directly at an unmarked Hillsboro Police cruiser, striking the cruiser and causing significant damage to both vehicles. The operator of the vehicle then attempted to flee the area on foot, however he was apprehended a short distance later by the officers involved in the pursuit. The operator was arrested and transported to Concord Hospital for evaluation and then to the Hillsboro County House of Corrections on a variety of felony charges. A passenger in the suspect's vehicle was also transported to Concord Hospital for injuries as well as a Hillsboro Officer who suffered minor injuries in the crash. The investigation is ongoing with the assistance of the NH State Police. The arrested operator is identified as 25 year old Edward Esty of Hillsboro, NH.



Alex Murphy, 26, was driving a 2017 Subaru Crosstrek on Goodell Road in Antrim at a high rate of speed and collided with a stone wall causing the vehicle to roll over and come to final rest approximately 200 feet from the initial point of impact. Boulders from the impact with the stone wall were sent airborne and struck the residence. The driver was ejected from the vehicle and was transported to Concord Hospital with serious bodily injuries and he was later arrested for Driving While Intoxicated.

Hillsboro-Deering School Board discusses staff vacancies and goals

The Hillsboro-Deering School Board held a brief meeting Monday evening. Alex Luhtjarv thanked the Board and voters of Hillsboro and Deering for supporting the revised teacher's contract.

Superintendent Dr. Jennifer Crawford informed the Board that many of the staff vacancies have been filled but a few remain at each of the three schools.

Resident Riche Colcombe came prepared to discuss several topics with the Board. Her first item was a challenge to the Business Administrator's financial report at the last meeting. communicate with the public and have more effective board meetings."

We offer the same to Meleny Nagy.




Join Newbury Fire & Rescue at 9/11 Memorial Service


First responders from several Kearsarge area towns have been invited to participate in a 9/11 Memorial Service at the Newbury Fire and Rescue grounds, Route 103. The event will be held at 11 am on Sunday, September 11, 2022 and everyone is invited to join the commemoration.

NITROUS OXIDE



Q: What is nitrous oxide?

A: In a dental setting, nitrous oxide is one of the tools the dentist has to use as a sedative or anti-anxiety agent. It is a gas — a compound of nitrogen and oxygen. Nitrous oxide is in the category of a "conscious sedation," meaning that the patient is awake

and conscious during the procedure and can respond to directions and questions from the dentist.

Nitrous oxide is known popularly as "laughing gas" since it puts the patient in a mood that is giddy, even euphoric, while the procedure is underway. Any pain that is associated with the procedure will be more bearable and it's not uncommon to sense that time is passing more quickly.

The gas is administered through a nose mask and is safe for patients of any age. It is one of the more common sedatives that dentists use. Among its other benefits is that it has few unpleasant side effects, and it wears off guickly. The gas, by the way, was first used in a dental procedure — a tooth extraction — in 1844 by a Connecticut dentist named Horace Wells. Talk with your dentist about whether you are a candidate for nitrous oxide.

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Lonely, older adults are nearly twice as likely to use opioids to ease pain and two-and-a-half times more likely to use sedatives and anti-anxiety medications, putting themselves at risk for drug dependency, impaired atten-tion, falls and other accidents, and further cognitive impairment, according to a recent study. The study found that just over half of 6,000 respondents in a nationally representative survey of seniors living independently were not lonely, while 40 percent were moderately lonely, and 7 percent

were highly lonely. The proportion of seniors in each group who had prescriptions for opioids and anti-anxiety medications and sedatives, which included drugs like Valium, Xanax, BuSpar and Ambien, correlated with their degree of loneliness, according to the study, which was published in JAMA Internal Medicine.

Hospitalized patients with COVID-19 who received the rheumatoid arthritis drug baricitinib, in combination with the standard of care including corticosteroids, died less often than those receiving only the standard of care, according to a study released recently in The Lancet Respiratory Medicine.

Surgeons can ease their patients' pain from common operations without prescribing opioids, and avoid the possibility of starting someone on a path to long-term use, a new study published in the Annals of Surgery suggests. Treating post-surgery pain with non-opioid pain medications such as ibuprofen or acetaminophen didn't lead to higher pain levels or more serious issues during recovery, and didn't dampen patients' satisfaction with their care, according to new results from a study of more than 22,000 patients who had one of seven common operations at 70 hospitals.

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

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

History Alive events at Hillsborough Center

To celebrate the 250th celebration of our town, several news things have been added to the reenactments and colonial village life. At Jones Road, three new events are added. In the large tent, we'll have a silent auction that runs all of Saturday (as Hillsboro used to have several famous antique auctioneers). The results of the silent auction will be announced at 5PM that evening. Marek Bennett will lead a workshop on Comics and Cartoon form of illustrating history of the civil war. He has written three comic books based on the diary of Colby Freeman of Henniker who served in the Civil War. Come enjoy making comics yourself. We will end the first day with a square dance called by Susan Hunt accompanied by two NH musicians. She is known for helping all ages enjoy dancing. There also will be new vendors/exhibits of Civil War quilts, and cooking demos of sutlers who accompanied the soldiers.

The theme this year is Travelling through 250 years. New Hampshire musicians will be performing throughout the two days, everything from classical music, to folk music of different centuries by Jeff Warner, Steve Schuch, and Fortunes Favor, to the Vermont Jazz sextet.

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


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
