She spoke passionately about how much U.S. and worldwide support has meant to her countrymen.

Pipa reflected on how lucky she was, as her husband and children were alive, while many of her friends have lost family members at the hands of the Russian Army.

State Senator John Reagan presented her with a proclamation honoring her as she fights for the freedom of her country, and she fights for freedom of everyone!

Later in the evening she attended a Concert for Ukraine Refugees at St. Anselm College's Dana Center with Queen Flash, a Queen Tribute band. The ticket money after expenses will go to The Blessed Virgin Mary Catholic Ukraine Church in Manchester, NH that will be sent to Ukraine to help women and children refugees.

Bar Harbor donates \$3,000 to New London's Philbrick-Cricenti Bog boardwalk

Bar Harbor Bank & Trust recently donated \$3,000 to the New London Conservation Commission to support the organization's efforts to improve the safety of the Philbrick-Cricenti Bog boardwalk. For phase 1 of the project, the commission upgraded the first 350 feet of the boardwalk from wooden planks to an all-weather, anti-slip, aluminum walkway. The funds from the Bank will be used for phase 2 of the project, which will extend the walkway to the floating bog mat.

The bog is home to a variety of flora and fauna and several species of birds including the eastern towhee, a species that has been in strong decline in New Hampshire.

Francestown Board considers Scoby Pond problems

Quick response by Weare & State Police prevents possible suicide

On August 6th, 2022 at 0955 hours the Weare Police Department received a report of a possible suicide at Mountain Road. Officers from the Weare Police Department and troopers from the New Hampshire State Police responded to the scene.

The suspect, a 60 year-old white male had barricaded himself in a second-floor bedroom. With the consent of the owner and after having no contact with the suspect, officers were able to break a window using bean bag rounds and then deploy a drone to observe inside the room.

The drone operator observed movement in the room and then the suspect fired two rounds from a shotgun before walking to the front door and surrendering.

There were no injuries during the incident and the suspect was transported to Catholic Medical Center for a psychological evaluation. The suspect was charged with two counts Reckless Conduct with a Firearm. We would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone that New Hampshire has implemented the 988 system, the new three-digit dialing, texting, and chat code for people experiencing a suicidal, mental health or substance misuse-related crisis. This system provides immediate assistance for people who need mental health support.

Hopkinton man arrested on drug charges

Christopher D. Parker, 39, of Carriage Lane in Hopkinton was arrested on felony possession of a controlled drug, stalking, and breach of bail charges. Officers were sent to Storrs Street, under the Loudon Road bridge, for an overdose. When they arrived, they found a woman, known to police from prior contacts, on the ground with other people around her. One of those people, a woman, had a domestic violence protective order against Parker, who was also there. The woman on the ground was revived and rejected medical treatment. Officers, however, spoke with Parker and the woman and double-checked the protective order, which was active. Parker was then arrested. During a search, he was accused of possessing a clear plastic bag with a tan-like powder consistent with fentanyl-heroin in his pocket, and a felony charge was added. Parker was held on preventive detention.

84 unit Hillsborough Workforce Housing Project sent for peer review


application on file by August 31st.

Hanson replaces Davis on Antrim Board

the Antrim Select Board Monday, having been sworn in to serve out the term of Tom Davis who recently resigned. Resident Susan Ellis presented a petition asking the Board to do something about excessive speeding on Summer and Jameson Streets. Installing raised crosswalks and/or electronic speed signs were suggested. The Board will look into it. Al Gould informed the Board that

Geological Survey reports Deering earthquake The United States Geological Survey reported an

The United States Geological Survey reported an earthquake in Deering last Saturday, centered at the West Deering Airport. The 2.3 magnitude earthquake shook Deering around 8:05 p.m. A police dispatcher representing Deering, Antrim, Bennington, Hillsboro and Washington said they received calls about homes shaking. No damage has been reported. The strongest earthquake in modern history in New Hampshire was in 1940. The 5.6-magnitude quake damaged chimneys and plaster walls.

ORAL HEALTH IN AMERICA: PART I



Despite important advances in the understanding and treatment of oral diseases and conditions, many people in the U.S. still have chronic oral health problems and lack of access to care, according to a report by the National Institutes of Health. Oral Health in America: Advances and Challenges, is a follow-up to the seminal 2000 Oral Health in America: A Report of the Surgeon General. The new report, which is intended to provide a road map on

<u>Dr. Esin Narli</u> how to improve the nation's oral health, draws primarily on information from public research and evidence-based practices and was compiled and reviewed by NIH's National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research (NIDCR) and a large, diverse, multi-disciplinary team of more than 400 experts.

The report updates the findings of the 2000 publication and highlights the national importance of oral health and its relationship to overall health. It also focuses on new scientific and technological knowledge — as well as innovations in health care delivery — that offer promising new directions for improving oral health care and creating greater equity in oral health across communities. Achieving that equity is an ongoing challenge for many who struggle to obtain dental insurance and access to affordable care.

"This is a very significant report," said NIH Acting Director Lawrence A. Tabak, D.D.S., Ph.D. "It is the most comprehensive assessment of oral health currently available in the United States and it shows, unequivocally, that oral health plays a central role in overall health. Yet millions of Americans still do not have access to routine and preventative oral care."

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One of the two most prescribed anti-seizure medications may increase the risk of fractures for children with epilepsy, a study published in *Epilepsia* found. The paper examined the effects of levetiracetam and oxcarbazepine, two common anti-seizure medications, on bone fragility of children between the ages of four and 13. Researchers found that levetiracetam was not related to fractures, but oxcarbazepine was associated with a higher risk of fracture for children with epilepsy.

Finerenone reduces the risk of cardiovascular morbidity and mortality in patients with mild-to-moderate kidney disease and type 2 diabetes. That's the finding of late-breaking research published in the *New England Journal of Medicine*. Diabetic kidney disease develops in approximately 40% of patients with diabetes and is the leading cause of chronic kidney disease worldwide. Some patients progress to endstage renal disease, but most die from cardiovascular diseases and infections before needing kidney replacement therapy.

Women ages 70 and older and men ages 20-49 were more likely to have uncontrolled hypertension despite taking blood pressure-lowering medications, according to new research presented at the American Heart Association's Hypertension Scientific Sessions 2021. The meeting is the premier scientific exchange focused on recent advances in basic and clinical research on high blood pressure and its relationship to cardiac and kidney disease, stroke, obesity and genetics. According to the American Heart Association, nearly half of adults in the U.S. have high blood pressure, which increases their risk for heart attack, stroke, kidney disease and many other health conditions, including severe complications from COVID-19.

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A new plaque on the Black Heritage Trail honors Richard Potter.

Black Heritage Trail honors Richard Potter

On August 7th a Black Heritage Trail plaque was placed in Andover to honor the village's namesake, Richard Potter. Potter, who lived from 1783 to 1835, was one of America's first celebrities, a status he earned by traveling the country performing magic and ventriloquism. That he was a Black man who performed in every state makes his story that much more remarkable. Born the son of an enslaved woman in Massachusetts, Potter was performing in circuses and learning the magic trade in England by his early teens. By 1811, he was performing on his own back in the United States. According to the Andover Historical Society, "Richard had often performed at Benjamin Thompson's tavern in Andover and liked the area and the people. He purchased a 175-acre farm in 1814 and built a home that became a showplace. The neighborhood soon became known as 'Potter's Place." The Historical Society has also preserved the site where Potter and his wife, Sally, are buried, near the old depot, which serves as the Society's headquarters and museum. It's also a hub on the Northern Rail Trail, popular with cyclers.
