In addition to Tim McComish's donation note above, Alan Brown donated \$9,000 to the Azalea Park Fund to provide a railing on the steps and a bench.

The Henniker Rotary Club donated \$800 to provide lighting and improve electrical service at the Angela Robinson Bandstand. David Eilenberger of Blue Sky irrigation has offered to donate and install an irrigation system for the little league ballfield behind the town hall.

The Board was very appreciative but needs to have the Henniker Town Administrator check into the cost of maintaining the system before accepting.

The Board accepted the resignations of four town employees: Nadine Scholes resigned a Minute Taker, Wendy Baker resigned as Executive Assistant/Land Use Coordinator, Kelly Henley resigned as Deputy Finance Director and Jesse Colby resigned as a Police Officer.

New Boston Space Force officers fatal shooting justified

An Air Force review board said a security officer was justified in shooting and killing a man at the New Boston Space Force station in May.

The board said Michael Foley, 33, of Massachusetts, approached the station's gate with a knife and gun while making threatening gestures toward a contracted police officer.

Lockwood Hills security officer Peter White shot and killed Foley on May 13. New Boston police officer Shane Morton assisted in the incident. The investigation showed Foley had a gas can and propane tank in his vehicle. The New Hampshire Attorney General's office is conducting a separate investigation, which is set to conclude in September.

The New England Run for the Fallen stops in Henniker this Saturday

The New England Run for the Fallen is a special event to call attention to and honor the men and women who have recently died in military service to America.



A team of more than 20 members from the public throughout New England will embark on a 143 plus mile journey to honor every New England service member who died as a result of serving during the War on Terror and in support of Operation Iraq Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation New Dawn.

Each mile of the Route will be dedicated to a fallen hero. The run starts at Cushman Park in Bernardston, Massachusetts to McClary Park, Kittery Point, Maine. They run through MA, VT, NH and ME, 140+ miles honoring

over 531 fallen heros.

Post 78 will be participating in the NE Run for the Fallen as it passes through Henniker. They will make a brief stop at the junction of Routes 202/9 and Old West Hopkinton Road where they will greet the Gold Star Family of Henniker Native, Sgt. Russell Durgin. They will arrive at approximately at 9:45am. If you can attend please park in the lot where the storage facility is or the grass area between the highway. Remembering Jeremy Charron - 25th Anniversary

With the demands of "Defund the police" resonating in so many American cities, we proudly reprint this 1997 tribute penned by our son Grant in remembrance of Jeremy Charron and in appreciation of all our Hometown Heroes. LDB

I remember the sound of bagpipes echoing off the walls of the gym.

This was where I had gym class when we moved into the new high school halfway through my junior year, where I practiced with the baseball team when the fields were still too muddy, and where I once filled in for Chris Lantagne in the musty mascot suit. The banners from Hillsboro-Deering High School's few championships hung red and white, and below them police officers from across the state, and the country, were gathered to pay respect to a fallen officer most had never known.

On the morning of Aug. 24, 1997, Jeremy Charron was 24 years old. The former Marine was just starting his law enforcement career, so he was the low man on the Epsom Police Department's four-member force.

That's why he drew the early Saturday morning shift the day after returning from the funerals of New Hampshire State Police troopers Scott Phillips and Leslie Lord, two of the four people murdered earlier that week in a shooting spree that began in Colebrook.

At 5 a.m., Charron went to check on a car parked on the side of the road in which two men were sleeping. It would have been routine, except when you're standing on the Thin Blue Line, there are no routine calls.

Charron knocked on the driver's window. The driver shot and killed him.

Jeremy's death devastated Hillsborough, the small town where we both grew up. Following so closely on the heels of the four murders up north, it was a body blow for all of New Hampshire.



A week after gathering in the North Country, many of the same police officers traveled to Hillsborough for Jeremy Charron's funeral.

There is nothing like a police funeral. The blend of sorrow and pride is both depressing and inspiring. Hundreds of men and women in different uniforms, in shades of blue, gray, and green, stand side by side to honor a fallen colleague, and then return to duty to face the same risks.

But there's also a town gathering to lay one of its children to rest, and to support the Charron family, part of Hillsborough's foundation.

The local community and the law enforcement community had each lost a brave young man, with years of service ahead of him.

I would wish that we never had to live through another such experience, but that would be futile. Police officers risk their lives every time they put on their uniforms. Merrimack High School graduate Ashley Guindon was shot and killed during her first day on the job with the Prince William County Police Department in Virginia last year.

Charron was the first of three members of his 1996 police academy class to be killed in the line of duty.

Manchester officer Michael Briggs was shot and killed by Michael Addison in 2006 while responding to a domestic disturbance. Addison remains the only inmate on New Hampshire's death row.

Part-time Brentwood officer Stephen Arkell was ambushed while responding to an argument between Michael Nolan and his father, Walter, in 2014.

There are no routine calls.

On the grounds of the Legislative Office Building in Concord, there's a granite

star etched into the landscape, with a pillar topped with a metal cauldron and gold-leafed bronze flame. When I worked for the state Senate, I could see the New Hampshire Law Enforcement Officer's Memorial from my office. That's where I'd watch the annual ceremony honoring New Hampshire police officers killed in the line of duty.

When it was built in 1995, the memorial had 39 names carved into its granite walls. There are now 48.

If you've never seen it, you should. That's one way to remember Jeremy Charron's legacy.

Or you could remember that when you wake up tomorrow morning, a rookie police officer in your town is on a patrol that is never routine.

I remember the sound of bagpipes echoing off the walls of the gym.

Henniker Town Office's computers hacked

On August 8th suspicious email activity was discovered on Henniker's computers and reported immediately to Mirador IT, the town's contracted information technology contractor. A fraudulent email was sent from the Henniker Town Administrator's official henniker.org email address. The email account was temporarily suspended and reactivated with enhanced security. Primex cybersecurity specialists have been deployed to work with the town and its IT company to conduct a forensic investigation. This is an open investigation and appropriate details will be made available when ready. All henniker.org email accounts have had 2-factor authentication security enabled. Employees will be encouraged to participate in cybersecurity training. People who received the email should delete it immediately. If people have questions and concerns, they should contact the Town Administrator.

Deering delays finishing Town Hall residing

Town Administrator Julius Peel presented to the Select Board the Harwood proposal for Town Hall Residing. Peel was asked what the Bid Process was and inquired why there was only one bid there. He explained that typical bid processes require at least three bids but that the town hall siding project had already received bids back in 2020 and recommended that they utilize the same contractor to continue the project. Roy Watson and Bill Whisman expressed that there is no harm in the process of inquiring with other contractors. The board agreed and asked that Peel receive two more quotes and then approach the board on this matter when they have been obtained.



The Hopkinton Rotary Club was pleased to have Alex Turek, Executive Director of the Granite YMCA, who informed the club about the great programming they offer.

Weare Select Board delays action to improve police communication system

State Representative Leah Cushman briefed the Weare Select Board on several recent legislative actions that could effect the town.

Resident Heleen Kurk expressed her displeasure at the disrespect the Board showed to Deputy Town Clerk Jane Murchie, who recently resigned. Apparently Murchie discovered that recent hires were making about \$3.00/hr more than she was and requested a raise. The Board offered her only a 1.00/hr raise, so she resigned.

Kurk was also upset that nothing has been done to make the repairs needed to reopen the Town Hall for use by civic groups. Tom Clow agreed and pointed out that \$20,000 remained in the Mildred Hall Trust, specifically earmarked for that purpose.

Librarian Clay Kris discussed the repairs needed to the grounds and chimney at the Library and the Board promised a quick response.

Police Chief Christopher Moore



State Representative Leah Cushman briefed the Select Board.

and Sgt. Brandon Montplaisr urged the Board to take immediate steps to upgrade and improve the Department's antiquated radio dispatch service. The Sgt. stressed that it was a major officer safety issue. He cited last week's response to a potential suicide at which shots were fired and he could not communicate with fellow officers or dispatch. The Board declined to take any action and deferred further discussion until next Tuesday.

In this week's paper we remember and honor the death of two young police officers who died: Jeremy Charron (page 3) and Sean Powers (page 8).

In sharp contrast the ridiculous demands to "Defund The Police," the untimely death of these fine officers proves the fact that police officers put their lives on the line daily and that there are no routine calls.

Rather than "Defund," we must guarantee that our departments are sufficiently funded to provide the equipment, systems and support our brave officers need to perform their duties effectively and SAFELY.

That makes the procrastination of the Weare Select Board so questionable.

After last week's potential suicide

attempt at which shots were fired, Sgt. Brandon Montplaisir reported that he could not contact fellow officers or dispatch for assistance. More astonishing is the fact that the inadequacies and inefficiencies of this antiquated system have been known and discussed sine 2014.

At last Monday's meeting the Sgt., joined by Chief Moore pleaded with the Select Board to begin soliciting improvements to the system, which if approved will take another year to install.

The Board has scheduled a special meeting with the officers on Tuesday, August 23rd. Recognizing that the solution may be complex and expensive, we urge the Board to DO YOUR JOB, and ensure officer safety.

Youth Sports E-Board Volunteers needed

BNSYS is looking for volunteers to join the EBoard. This board is what keeps BNSYS going year after year. We are coming to a point where several board members have young children nearing the age out period with BNSYS sports. The board consists of the following spots:

PRESIDENT - oversees all activities, runs monthly meeting and keeps things organized. Time commitment is about 3-4 hours a month.

VICE PRESIDENT - Currently vacant. Assists the President and all directors in picking up slack where needed.

SECRETARY - Takes minutes/notes at monthly meeting and emails out to the board. Time commitment is about 2 hours a month.

TREASURER - Keeps track of finances via Quickbooks to include monthly purchases of food, equipment and incoming registrations; then hands off to our accountant who does our yearly taxes and 501C3 paperwork. Time commitment is about 3-4 hours a month.

BASEBALL/SOFTBALL/SOCCER/WRESTLING **DIRECTORS** - Looks over registrations and creates teams if more than one. Assigns coaches for each team based off parental volunteer requests. Time commitment varies depending on in season/off season. Off season is basically attendance at monthly meeting and checking emails for league updates. In season is 3-4 hours a month until established.

FIELD DIRECTOR - Field director oversees fields, maintenance and equipment. Currently fields are moved via contract services. Coaches/Directors now line and paint their own fields. Initial striping is done by director if possible to create a baseline for others to follow. Occasional drag of infields is required to maintain their appearance. Time commitment is about 3-4 hours a month during spring/summer/fall and not much during the winter.

EQUIPMENT DIRECTOR - Orders all needed equipment and uniforms based off request from sports directors/coaches and board approval. Time commitment varies depending on season and need for equipment. Requires attendance at monthly meeting and ordering of equipment can be done around your schedule from your computer.

FUNDRAISING DIRECTOR - Stocks snack shack for upcoming seasons and runs the in season fund-raisers. Time commitment is about 3-4 hours a month during spring/fall/winter.

The newly issued report Oral Health in America: Advances and Challenges, provides a comprehensive snapshot of oral health in America, including an examination of oral health across the lifespan and a look at the impact the issue has on communities and the economy. Major take-aways from the report include:

Healthy behaviors can improve and maintain an individual's oral health, but these behaviors are also shaped by social and economic conditions.

Oral and medical conditions often share common risk factors, and just as medical conditions and their treatments can influence oral health, so can oral conditions and their treatments affect other health issues

Substance misuse and mental health conditions negatively affect the oral health of many. Group disparities around oral health, identified 20 years ago, have not been adequately addressed, and greater efforts are needed to tackle both the social and commercial determinants that create these inequities and the systemic biases that

The COVID-19 pandemic emerged while the report was being written. The science around SARS-CoV-2 continues to come into focus in real time, and, although data were only starting to surface about the oral implications of the disease, the authors included a preliminary analysis of it to assess initial impacts.

The authors identify the need to improve access to care by developing a more diverse oral health care workforce, addressing the rising cost of dental education, expanding insurance coverage, and improving the overall affordability of care.

High blood pressure is the world's leading killer but poor rates of blood pressure control remain common. A new strategy where patients are started on a pill containing four medicines, each at a quarter of their usual doses, has been shown to be much more effective in getting blood pressure under control, compared to the common practice of monotherapy, where treatment commences with just one drug. The first large-scale, randomized controlled clinical trial of this novel

combination blood pressure medication brought blood pressure under control in 80 percent of participants in 12 weeks, compared to 60 percent in the control group who nonetheless had access to the best patient care. Traditionally, doctors have started with one drug and then follow up to consider adding or changing treatment — but this strategy is often not successful in practice and blood pressure control rates have remained stubbornly low for decades. The results of the study were published in The Lancet.

Early pre-term births may be dramatically decreased with docosahexaenoic acid (DHA) supplements, with a dose of 1,000 mg more effective for pregnant women with low DHA levels than the 200 mg found in some prenatal supplements, according to a study published in EClinicalMedicine. Early pre-term birth, defined as birth before 34 weeks gestation, is a serious public health issue because these births result in the highest risk of infant mortality and child disability. Overall, women who received the higher dose had fewer early pre-term births. Of special significance is that participants with low DHA levels at enrollment had half the rate of early pre-term birth (2.0% compared to 4.1%) when they were given a supplement of 1,000 mg compared with those given a 200 mg supplement during the last half of pregnancy. Because pre-term birth is associated with such negative outcomes and high health care costs, having an option for women to prevent pre-term birth reliably and inexpensively is significant.
