Sexual assault charges dismissed Judge finds defendant "not mentally fit for trial"

Charges against Dale Cole, 69, of Ayer, Mass., accused of sexually as-



saulting a child at a Hancock campground in 2009 have been dismissed after a judge determined the man was not mentally competent to stand trial. Cole had faced

three counts of aggravated felonious sexual assault of a victim under 13 and a misdemeanor charge of endangering the welfare of a child.

Judge David Anderson dismissed those charges without prejudice following a competency hearing and a mutual agreement by the defense and prosecution that Cole was not mentally fit for trial, according to court records.

At the time of Cole's arrest in 2018, the police said the victim, who knew Cole, told police the assaults happened over a period of time in 2009 at a campground in the town. Cole groomed the child by showing pornographic movies and offering cigarettes in exchange for sexual acts, police said.

A judge granted Hancock police a warrant. Cole was previously convicted of purchase or possession of child pornography in 2010 and indecent assault and battery on a child under 14 in 1984, according to a listing on the Sex Offender Registry Board in Massachusetts.

Dispute between Weare neighbors returns to Superior Court

A long-running dispute between Weare neighbors, dating back to 2018, over the legality of a massive "accessory building" on a residential lot in Weare goes back to court on Wednesday.

This is the second time the Hillsborough County Superior Court will hear the matter, which involves a two-story, 40-by-60foot garage on the Quaker Street property owned by Gil Duquette.

Neighbor Travis Corcoran believes the garage violates setback provisions in the town's zoning code, an issue he raised with Duquette in 2018.

The town has filed court papers denying that it did anything wrong in issuing the variance.

Corcoran has twice prevailed on the matter. In 2018, he convinced town officials to issue a cease-anddesist order instructing Duquette to stop plans for the building because it violated town setback, and a judge ruled in his favor when he went to court to enforce that order. Last year, Weare voters at town meeting rejected a town-backed item that would have legalized the structure.

Duquette built it anyway, and in May 2021, the Zoning Board issued an after-the-fact variance allowing the structure.

Town of Hillsborough's "Long Term Projects" continue to languish

The Hillsborough Select Board recently discussed the Long Term Projects that continue to linger on their agenda:

Woods Woolen Mill: Hillsborough Town Administrator Laura Buono reviewed the proposed park plan for the Woods Woolen Mill property with the Board. She said it's definitely not a final plan but wanted the Board to take a look at it. She also said that it had been shared with the Conservation Commission who will be kept in the loop along the way.

Sidewalk Project: Ms. Buono shared the updated schedule with the Board which was drawn up by Dubois & King. She highlighted where they are now estimating the construction timeframe will be 2024.

She said that the main delay over the past several weeks was getting the updated rates approved through the NHDOT due to a COVID grant D&K received. This was briefly discussed and Buono said she and the Planning Director will have a meeting with the Engineers to discuss concerns about the new schedule.

Old Post Office: Buono explained that the InvestNH funds for demolition of the 2 Bridge Street building would not apply to 2 Bridge Street since it is not part of a larger project as they outline within their qualifications.

Parking Regulations: Buono asked the Board if they would like to schedule a public hearing on the proposed parking regulations while they are in the process of working out the agreement with the parking app company. Chairman Bailey said that although initially he agreed with the pay for parking, he is rethinking this part of the regulations. Buono said that part was to mostly regulate the parking lots and to help fund a parking enforcement position. She said the Board has the authority to charge for some areas and times or choose to not charge and simply use it for the parking lots which are often being abused by apartment tenants. The Board agreed to moving forward with the public hearing and discussing the level of enforcement via the app in the meantime.

Thieves use blowtorch at Dunbarton's Page's Corner

Multiple men broke into Page's Country Store and Deli in Dunbarton and used a blowtorch and pry bar to gain access to an ATM. The store is located on Concord Stage Road (Route 77).

According to Police Chief Chris Remillard, "The suspects were able to gain access to the building by prying open a rear door after disabling the alarm system." "Once inside, they gained access to an ATM by using a blowtorch and pry bar."

Accusation of Deering employee thefts are unfounded

Last month, there was a report submitted to a board member from a member of the public accusing staff of stealing materials from the garage. Roy Watson stated that all claims are taken very seriously by the town and thus an investigation was established.

It was concluded through this investigation that the employee did not steal from the highway garage. He finished by stating that at this point this matter is closed and asks that all members of the public with serious claims such as these approach the town through the proper channels rather than continuing to spread rumors.

Treasurer Stephen Fogelson expressed that he was not happy with the statement given by the board regarding stealing at the highway garage, and explained that he had issues with the process taken by the board when dealing with employees. He explained that he understands that the accusations about the staff were proven false by the board, but emphasized that there was far too much gossip about a private town matter being discussed by the public and wanted to know what the board was doing to remedy this leak. J. Peel explained that no member of the board currently believes that this employee had done anything related to these allegations.

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GUM DISEASE INCREASES RISK OF OTHER ILLNESS SUCH AS MENTAL HEALTH AND HEART CONDITIONS



A new study shows an increased risk of patients developing illnesses, including mental ill-health and heart conditions, if they have a medical history of periodontal (gum) disease.

Experts carried out a first-of-its-kind study of the records of 64,379 patients who had a recorded history of periodontal disease, including gingivitis and periodontitis (the condition that occurs if gum disease is left untreated and can lead to tooth loss). Of these, 60,995 had gingivitis and 3,384 had periodontitis.

The researchers examined the data to establish how many of the patients with and without periodontal disease go on to develop cardiovascular disease (e.g., heart failure, stroke, vascular dementia), cardiometabolic disorders (e.g., high blood pressure, Type 2 diabetes), autoimmune conditions (e.g., arthritis, Type 1 diabetes, psoriasis), and mental ill-health (e.g., depression, anxiety and serious mental illness) over an average follow-up of around three years.

The team discovered that those patients with a recorded history of periodontal disease at the start of the study were more likely to go on and be diagnosed with one of these additional conditions over an average of three years, compared to those in the cohort without periodontal disease at the beginning of the research. The results of the study showed, in patients with a recorded history of periodontal disease at the start of the study, the increased risk of developing mental ill-health was 37%, while the risk of developing autoimmune disease was increased by 33%, the risk of developing cardiovascular disease was raised by 18%, and the increased risk for Type 2 diabetes was 26%.

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A popular class of diabetes medications called gIP-1R agonists (Trulicity and Rybelsus) may also protect against glaucoma in diabetic patients, according to a new study led by researchers in the Scheie Eye Institute at the University of Pennsylvania's Perelman School of medicine. The findings were published in the British Journal of Ophthalmology. glaucoma affects 3 million Americans and is the second leading cause of blindness worldwide. People with diabetes are twice as likely to develop the eye condition.

Babies born prematurely who require treatment to prevent blindness from retinopathy of prematurity (ROP) could be treated with a dose of Avastin (bevacizumab) that is a fraction of the dose commonly used for ROP currently. Results from the dose-finding study were published in JAMA Ophthalmology. Pre-term babies are at high risk of abnormal blood vessel growth in the retina, the light-sensitive tissue in the back of the eye. These abnormal blood vessels are fragile and prone to leaking. If left untreated, vessel growth can lead to scarring and retinal detachment, the main cause of ROP-related vision loss. ROP is one of the leading causes of blindness in children. Established ROP treatments include laser therapy and cryotherapy. Both interventions work by causing the abnormal blood vessels to stop growing before they can cause scarring and retinal detachment. Avastin is one of several available drugs that inhibit abnormal blood vessel growth by suppressing the overproduction of a signal protein called vascular endothelial growth factor (VEgF). The U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved Avastin in 2004 as a cancer therapy. Since then, ophthalmologists have used it off-label to inhibit abnormal blood vessel growth in ROP, as well as in other ocular disorders. Results from a clinical trial published in 2011 confirmed the benefit of using Avastin over laser therapy for treating the most severe cases of ROP. ٠

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) has REMOVED a cyanobacteria advisorv for Elm Brook that was issued on 8/15/2022. While the bloom accumulation has dissipated, NHDES advises that lake-goers look out for green surface accumulations in the future. Please continue to monitor your individual shoreline for changing conditions.

A worker at a construction site in Greenfield is recovering from serious injuries after falling more than 10 feet. The accident happened Saturday on East Road. Officials said the worker was transported by helicopter to a local hospital. The cause of the fall is still under investigation.

Grapevine receives Arts Projects grants

The Grapevine Family and Community Resource Center's Avenue A Teen + Community Center in Antrim was one of eight organizations receiving fiscal 2023 Youth Arts Projects grants from the New Hampshire State Council on the Arts. The council awarded a total of \$43,305. Youth Arts Projects grants fund educational opportunities in the arts across all disciplines, including dance, theater, media, music, visual arts, craft and creative writing. The Grapevine's grant was for creative writing.

Hancock seeks new Building Inspector

The Hancock Select Board met with Tim Herlihy to discuss the building inspector position. The Board believes the position requires at least 10 hours a week, day appointments for contractors would be helpful. The board recognizes that Herlihy is not able to provide more hours; the Town needs to start exploring longer term options. The position will be advertised, but finding a long term solution may take some time. The Board explained that they believe Herlihy is doing a good job with the limited amount of time that he has, and that they would like him to continue in the position until a replacement is found.

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THREE FACTORS INFLUENCE CHOICE OF REAL ESTATE AGENTS



A Baylor University business study of recent home buyers and sellers found that most consumers rely on three basic factors when deciding on an individual real estate agent for buying or selling a home.

Through their focus group study, researchers with Baylor's Hankamer School of Business found that consumers are likely to begin evaluating real estate agents by paying close attention first to social in-

fluences, followed by market sources and ultimately, the reputation of the agent.

The study found that critical "word-of-mouth" referrals often come from friends who are real estate agents and from friends who had a good experience with a specific agent, indicating that individuals seek out others who have some level of experience in buying or selling real estate and with whom they already have a relationship.

The ease of use of the realtor's website also gives buyers or sellers a clue about the agency's "potential quality." Satisfaction with a realtor's website can lead customers to be more loyal and spread positive messages to others.

"Consumers may be aware of the realtor's name and have visited the website, but unless they see that the agency is active in the neighborhoods they find desirable, the agency won't be getting a call," said Dr. Kirk Wakefield, professor of marketing at Baylor.

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Hillsborough woman was arrested for arson



A physical altercation between a male and female that occurred on August 18th led to Lynn Geddes-Morin being charged with Arson. Officers discovered that Geddes-Morin had assaulted a male tenant in the same building she resides in. Geddes-Morin then, in the middle of the night, lit a pile of newspapers on fire at the victim's door. The male party was awoken by noise outside his doorway and observed

her actively igniting a fire. Geddes-Morin was subsequently arrested with the assistance of the Hopkinton Police Department and later released to appear before the Superior Court.

Andover man guilty of negligent homicide



Thomas Taylor, 36, Andover, who pleaded guilty to negligent homicide and other charges, has been sentenced to three to six years in prison. Taylor was using his cellphone while driving a loaded commercial dump truck weighing around 37 tons on May 26, 2020, causing a crash involving multiple vehicles. An elderly woman lost her

life during the crash, while others were injured.

Peterborough man faces multiple felonies


On August 24th Peterborough Police received a telephone call from a 43-year-old Peterborough woman reporting that she had just been assaulted by her husband in Peterborough and that he was armed with a handgun. The husband had also informed the victim that the handgun was to be used against police if they caught him. At the time of the report, the assault victim was at a Nashua, NH hotel. With the assistance of the Nashua Police Department and Nashua EMS, who made contact with the victim, probable cause was established for multiple domestic violence charges. Due to the nature of the violent offenses and the fact that the suspect was armed with a handgun which he had threatened to use on police, Peterborough Police summoned the assistance of area law enforcement resources. Police entered onto the property of 130 Hunt Road in Peterborough where after a short dialogue with Daniel Laguerre, 35, of Peterborough, police took him into custody. He was arrested and charged with: 2nd Degree Assault (Felony) Criminal Restraint (Felony) Stalking (Misdemeanor) Domestic Violence Simple Assault (Misdemeanor) Domestic Violence Simple Assault (Misdemeanor) Breach of Bail Conditions (Misdemeanor). Laguerre is currently being held at the Valley Street Jail in Manchester on Preventative Detention.
