Graduate donates \$1.5 million for Colby-Sawyer Athletic Center

Colby-Sawyer College has broken ground on a \$2 million athletic pavilion to be situated on the Kelsev Athletic Campus, marking the college's first major construction project since 2017.

The pavilion, made possible by a \$1.5 million gift from Colby-Sawyer College Board of Trustees member Sally Shaw Veitch '66, will open this spring and include team meeting spaces, an athletic training room and a covered picnic area, among other

spaces. The 2,700 square-foot facility will also feature wireless internet. allowing for enhanced live streaming of college athletic events from nearby fields.

"Construction of this pavilion at the heart of our Kelsev Athletic Campus will allow us to better support the needs of our athletics department while also creating a greater experience for our student-athletes and spectators," Colby-Sawyer President Susan D. Stuebner said. Veitch, who

participated in intramural sports and was a member of the athletic association during her time at the college, is an avid supporter of her alma mater and a member of both its Legends Society — which recognizes individuals who've contributed more than \$1 million to the college — and Athletic Hall of Fame.

She also served as a member of the Board of Trustees from 2011-2020 and was reelected to the board last vear.

Resident angrily chastises Henniker Select Board - Rescinds prior offer

At a previous Select Board meeting David Eilenberger, owner of Blue Sky Irrigation, offered to donate the



labor and materials needed to irrigate the ball fields near the school. The Board expressed its appreciation, but wanted to review the anticipated cost of operating

and maintaining the system. Having concluded the review, the Irrigation System was again on the agenda for Tuesday's meeting with the Select Board prepared to accept the generous donation.

Instead, when called to the podium, Eilenberger launched into a tirade, complaining that he "was unceremoniously treated like a snake oil salesman rolling into town with a broken down cart, attempting to fleece anyone I came in contact with." He continued, "I'm not used to being treated with this level of disrespect, due to my talent, honesty, and integrity. But, somehow the Town of Henniker, and its Select Board, managed to do just that, disrespect me and my intentions, all in less than a 5 minute appearance at your meeting."

He claimed Board statements were "disparaging, juvenile and dis-

respectful," and that members acted "in such an arrogant and condescending manner."

He concluded, "given the rude na-

ture of my treatment, so I am hereby rescinding my offer to the Town of Henniker, effectively immediately," before storming out of the meeting.

NAIL-BITING: UNSIGHTLY AND HARMFUL



Q: I bite my nails. Are there any dental concerns about that?

A: There are indeed. Nail-biting is more than an unsightly habit. It can play havoc with your mouth, particularly with the operation of your temporomandibular joints, the joints in front of your ears where the jaw bones meet. You'll often hear those

joints referred to, in shorthand, as the TMJ joints. Any activity, like nail-biting, that puts the teeth in an unnatural position for an extended period has the potential to strain the TMJ. The unnatural position will eventually stretch the muscles in the jaw, cause pain and throw off the balance of the TMJs.

If a very young child develops the habit, it can produce a gap between the front two teeth. Additionally, the type of person who is prone to bite nails may also be prone to picking at his or her gums. Non-toxic but unpleasant tasting lotions are available for application to the fingers and nails and some physicians and dentists recommend that approach. Another approach is to put a band aid on a finger as a reminder and deterrent. Talk with your dentist about what you can do to protect any nail biters in your house.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Children and young adults who have pain from surgery, dental care and other conditions are often prescribed opioids. But half of these prescriptions, a new national study suggests, are high risk because of their potential for adverse outcomes. What's more, a small group of prescribers in the top 5% of prescriptions account for half of all opioid prescriptions for children and young adults and half of high risk prescriptions. many of these

prescribers are dentists or surgeons, and a disproportionate share practice in the South, according to the study in *Pediatrics*.

A recent study found that patients who regularly use steroid nasal sprays are less likely to develop severe Covid-19-related disease, including a 20 to 25% lower risk of hospitalization, ICU admission and mortality. The study was published in *Journal of Allergy and Clinical Immunology: In Practice*.

Consuming higher amounts of Vitamin D — mainly from dietary sources — may help protect against developing young-onset colorectal cancer or precancerous colon polyps, according to the first study to show such an association. The study, recently published online in the journal *Gastroenterology* could potentially lead to recommendations for higher vitamin D intake as an inexpensive complement to screening tests as a colorectal cancer prevention strategy for adults younger than age 50. The association was stronger for dietary vitamin D — principally from dairy products —than from vitamin D supplements.



Peterborough man guilty of threatening Greenfield man with a gun

Hillsborough County Superior Court Judge N. William Delker has sentenced Branden French, 19, of Peterborough to jail time after he pleaded guilty to threatening another man with a gun in April.

French was sentenced to one year in the Valley Street Jail in Manchester on a felony count of criminal threatening and an additional year on a misdemeanor count of reckless conduct. He had spent 144 days incarcerated prior to the conclusion of his case and has been credited that much time off his sentence on the felony count, which also states that nine months of his sentence on the misdemeanor charge will be suspended if he maintains good behavior.

Greenfield police received a report on April 13 from a man who said French had threatened him with a gun and shot it in the air the previous night.


In exchange for French's guilty pleas, prosecutors agreed to dismiss a

felony charge of criminal threatening with a deadly weapon and amend a felony charge of reckless conduct with a deadly weapon to the misdemeanor reckless conduct charge. Upon his release from jail, French will be placed on probation for 2½ years, the sentencing documents state.

Bradford man killed in rear-end accident

A Bradford man was identified as the driver who died on the interstate in Bow on Thursday morning, after crashing into a tractor trailer. John Byrne, 38, of Bradford was driving south on Interstate 93 just after 6 a.m. Thursday when, according to a news release from the New Hampshire State Police, he crashed his pickup into the back of a tractor trailer. Bow firefighters rushed to the crash site and performed CPR on Byrne, state police said. Byrne was pronounced dead at Concord Hospital. The driver of the tractor trailer was not hurt. State police are still investigating the crash.

Weare man charged with multiple sex crimes

On October 11th, the Weare Police Department received



information concerning a juvenile victim of alleged sexual assault. An investigation immediately ensued and assistance was provided from the Child Advocacy Center, DCYF, and Hillsborough County Attorney's Office. On October 13th, Newell Bailey, 76, of Weare was placed under arrest and processed by Weare Police. He has been charged with: Incest, Aggravated Felonious

Sexual Assault, Felonious Sexual Assault, Endangering the Welfare of a Child, Witness Tampering and Simple Assault. Bailey is being held pending arraignment at Hillsborough County North Superior Court.

Goffstown man is critical after being shot

A man is in critical condition after a shooting in Goffstown. Police said the 29-year-old man was shot just before midnight Thursday at 626 Mast Road. A woman who lives in an apartment at the address told News 9 that the victim was her best friend, but she doesn't know what happened or why he was at her apartment. She said she came home to find the street cordoned off and was unable to get inside. She said there was no indication inside her apartment that anything had happened. Police said they are still investigating what led to the shooting and can't yet say if there were other people around at the time. Police said the man was shot in the abdomen. The victim suffering from the gunshot wound was transported to the hospital," said Capt. Dan Conley. "He's in critical but stable condition."

Franklin Police K-9 Miller is NH's second comfort dog

Police K-9 Miller has it good at Franklin Middle School. He is greeted with cheers, hugs and pats and even has his own water bowl.

But it's not all fun and games for Miller. This yellow lab has a power. "They are actually saving lives. They are making it easier for people to communicate when they need to, making it easier for people to get services when they need them," explained Franklin Police Chief David Goldstein.

Miller is Franklin Police's speciallytrained comfort dog, the second in the state of New Hampshire. Alongside Officer Tracy, he uses his gentle presence to soothe people in their darkest moments.

"We had a juvenile try to commit suicide by jumping out of a second story window and we met her at the hospital and she was just completely catatonic," Tracy recalled. "I brought him into the ER room and she just completely opened up. He put his paws on her."



K-9 Miller and Officer Tracy had a special visitor. Brooklynn is an amazing 9 year old girl who has been battling Cystic Fibrosis and a variety of other health issues since she was born. Miller provided her with some extra comfort before some of her doctor's appointments.

Miller comforts officers who have experienced on-the-job trauma, calms victims of serious crime and attends calls in the patrol car that has his name painted on the side. He also snoops around school where kids have struggled with mental health issues on the heels of the pandemic. We

saw this with a child who was sitting alone in a hallway at school, somehow Miller draws them out.

He also comforts people in the community, including Marie Guinta, who has experienced loneliness because an illness kept her isolated during the pandemic.


Stories of Ghosts, Witches & Things That Go Bump In The Night

Gersh Autism announced the closing of its Greenfield facility

Gersh Autism announced Monday that it would be shutting down Legacy by Gersh at Crotched Mountain in Greenfield on Nov. 18. The organization took over and eventually bought the Crotched Mountain Rehabilitation Center in 2020 after the foundation that ran it said it had to close because of COVID-19 staffing issues.

"The Crotched Mountain Foundation is really saddened to hear about the closure of the Legacy by Gersh school," said Ned Olney, president and CEO of the Crotched Mountain Foundation.

Gersh Autism shifted the school's mission to working with residents on the autism spectrum from the ages of 4 to 21. Owner Kevin Gersh notified families of its roughly 50 residents of the closure Monday.

"Please know we did not come to this decision lightly," Gersh said in the letter. "Our No. 1 priority is the safety of our students. The truth is, we have worked exhaustively to shore up

future workforce and keep Crotched Mountain open, but we simply do not foresee a solution to the staffing shortage that will enable us to continue to provide the level of safety and care they deserve."

New Hampshire's licensing website shows that it conducted 13 complaint investigations this year at Legacy by Gersh, ranging from a lack of background fingerprints on some staff, to not meeting staff ratios, to some residents not receiving medications on time. Other complaints were filed about a resident walking away and about a staff member allegedly hitting a resident in the head with a closed fist multiple times.

Henniker Select Board reviewing multiple requests for ARPA Funds The Town of Henniker has received a \$525,225

The Town of Henniker has received a \$525,333 ARPA Grant and the Select Board has begun studying how the funds should be allocated.

\$181,658 has already been committed to these projects: \$100,000 Wastewater Upgrades,

\$27,083 Replace Main Door at Transfer Station, \$47,075 Ductless A/C Minisplits at Town Office, \$7,500 Improved Broadband Service.

Other projects currently under review include: \$5,305 Replace Fire & Security Systems at Transfer Station, \$40,000 ADA & Fire Upgrades at Garage, \$10,000 Fire Safety Upgrades at Community Building, \$5,600 Electrical Upgrades at Academy Hall, \$75,000 Azalea Park Stabilization, \$7,774 Community park Improvements, \$16,803 Replace Fire Rescue Boat, \$29,000 Improve Library Accessibility, \$75,000 Outdoor Pavilion at White Birch.

The Board anticipates other requests will be forthcoming from other departments, committees and groups.


