Warner woman evades police

She leads State Police Trooper on a high speed chase

A Warner woman wanted on mul-



tiple warrants was arrested Friday night after allegedly leading state police on a chase through Claremont. The incident began around 9 p.m. Friday when a trooper attempted to stop a vehicle, driven by Ashley

E. Smith, 29, of Warner, on Elm Street in Newport for a defective equipment violation and having no license plate. The vehicle failed to stop for the trooper and a chase ensued.

Stop sticks were deployed several times to deflate the tires as the vehicle continued into Claremont and then back into Newport," state police said in a release. "All four tires were eventually deflated, however the operator still refused to stop," the release stated.

The vehicle continued at a slow speed before hitting a Claremont police cruiser, ending the pursuit.

Once Smith was identified at the scene, police determined she had three electronic bench warrants for her arrest, along with a Superior Court warrant with additional charges.

She was also charged with several additional charges, including two counts of felony reckless conduct, operating with a suspended license, disobeying an officer, and falsifying evidence.

A male passenger in the vehicle was released on scene without being charged.

The incident remains under investigation.

Deering to undertake safety improvements at Donovan Station

Peter Flynn wasted no time settling in as Deering's Interim Town Administrator. At his first meeting, he stressed that with budget season fast approaching, it was important to appoint a new Finance Director to replace Samantha Ivanov who has resigned and whose last day in office comes soon. Flynn was complimentary of the input and support she has given him as he assumes the new position.

At the suggestion of Jill Smith the Board considered reinstating the Town Administrator hiring committee utilized to hire Julius Peel. It was tabled until members could consider who to appoint to the committee.

The Board reviewed the recent Fire Department Study Committee's report.

Members agreed that the consensus of residents present was to reject the alternative, calling for contracted services, with most favoring a fulltime EMS/Fire Department.



Gary Samuels briefed the Deering Select Board in the Natural Resource Inventory and Climate Resilience Mapping Projects the town's Conservation Commission is undertaking.

The Board's first priority was to improve personnel safety at the three stations, particularly Donovan Station. With \$77,000 currently in the Department's building fund, the Board voted to request that Fire Chief Jeff LeBlanc prioritize what improvements could be made for that amount, before considering allocating additional ARPA Funds.

The National Institute of Health has reported many individuals with COVID-19 develop abnormal blood clots from high inflammation, which can lead to serious health complications and mortality. To find ways to decrease clotting related to COVID-19, researchers looked at reducing hospitalizations by using prescribed blood thinners. Published in lancet's Open Access EClinical Medicine, the study found that: patients on blood thinners before having COVID-19 were admitted less often to the hospital, despite being older and having more chronic

medical conditions than their peers; blood thinners — regardless of if they are being used before being infected with COVID-19 or started when admitted to the hospital for treatment of COVID-19 — reduce deaths by almost half; and hospitalized COVID-19 patients benefit from blood thinners regardless of the type or dose of the medication used. Outside of COVID-19, the use of blood thinners is proven to be lifesaving for those with blood coagulations conditions.

In the worldwide effort to battle SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, researchers have often turned to medications used as therapies for other conditions in the hopes of finding ones that either kill the coronavirus or lessen the impacts from its infection. Recent small-sample studies (fewer than 200 patients) have suggested that statins drugs that lower levels of low-density lipoprotein (IDI), a form of cholesterol linked to heart disease and stroke — also may reduce the chances of severe disease or death from COVID-19. However, the findings from a recent Johns Hopkins medicine-led study of nearly 4,500 patients hospitalized with COVID-19 over a four-month period provide a stronger case for a very different conclusion: statins likely do not confer any impact — positive or negative — on COVID-related mortality and may be associated with a significantly increased risk — nearly 1 chance in 5 — of more serious illness. The study was published in the journal *PLOS ONE*.

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SOCIAL ISOLATION AMONG **OLDER ADULTS LINKED TO** HAVING FEWER TEETH



Older adults who are socially isolated are more likely to have missing teeth — and to lose their teeth more quickly over time — than those with more social interaction, according to a new study.

Gum disease, smoking, lack of access to dental care, and chronic illnesses like diabetes and heart disease increase the risks of tooth Dr. Esin Narli loss. Missing teeth can have a significant impact on one's quality of

life, affecting nutrition, speech, and self-esteem.

The researchers found that higher levels of social isolation were associated with having fewer teeth and losing teeth more quickly over time, even when controlling for other factors such as oral hygiene, health status, smoking and drinking, and loneliness. Older adults who were socially isolated had, on average, 2.1 fewer natural teeth and 1.4 times the rate of losing their teeth than those with stronger social ties.

Social isolation and loneliness in older adults are major public health concerns around the world and are risk factors for heart disease, mental health disorders, cognitive decline, and premature death. In some countries, including the United States, up to one in three older adults are lonely, according to the World Health Organization. The COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated these issues among older adults, as many inperson interactions have been interrupted to protect older adults from infection.

Social isolation and loneliness are related but different. Social isolation is an objective measure defined as having few social relationships or infrequent social contact with others, while loneliness is the feeling created by a lack of social connection.

ZBA being asked to OK conversion of 4 Central Square business units

A developer has an agreement to purchase the buildings at 2 and 10 West Main Street in Central Square Hillsborough.

Charles Hoegen hopes to demolish the white house to provide parking for nine residential tenants in the larger, yellow building. To do so, he requires a pair of Special Exceptions from the ZBA. The buildings are located in the Central Business District, and currently have five unoccupied residential units on the 2nd and 3rd floors of the yellow building. To convert two commercial units on West Main Street and two others in the former Robinson Store on Bridge Street require ZBA approval.

Riche Colcombe, both personally and as a representative of the Chamber of Commerce, took strong exception to the conversion. She cited the recent influx of commercial development in Central Square after years of stagnation. Katherine Charette, who recently purchased and is renovat-

ing the Central Square Emporium directly across the street, also spoke in opposition, referring to the Master Plan and zoning ordinances which call for the commercial re-development of Central Square.

Messenger Publisher Leigh Bosse cited this newspaper's decade long crusade to revitalize Central Square and praised the Select Board for working with the state to increase the parking needed for business growth. He cautioned that this project is completely "out of character" in the Business District and its approval would destroy any chance of restoring Central Square to its former glory.

As we go to press on Thursday, the ZBA is reconvening to decide on this project and the fate of Central Square.






