Three New Historic Properties

Antrim Mills, Henniker Academy, Hopkinton Church

The New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources is pleased to announce that the State Historical Resources Council has added eight properties, including three locally, to the New Hampshire State Register of Historic Places.

Built in 1836, Academy Hall in Henniker alternated as the town's high school, event venue and grange hall for more than a century. New England College leased the building from 1946-1995; today it is home to the Henniker Historical Society. The two-story Greek Revival-style building with a cupola is similar to other New Hampshire academies built or renovated in the 1830s and mirrors the neighboring Congregational Church that had been built in 1834.

Built on the site of a 1766 meetinghouse that was destroyed by fire and then rebuilt in 1789, the clapboarded Greek Revival-style First Congregational Church in Hopkinton remains largely unchanged since it was significantly reconfigured in 1839; shutters were added prior to the Civil War and new spires were replaced after weather events in 1938 and 1971. A nearby circa 1780-90 building was purchased in 1959 to serve as a parish house and Sunday school quarters.

Goodell Company Mill in Antrim includes five adjoining brick structures built between 1867 and about 1895, plus a separate sixth building constructed circa 1900.

David Goodell began working at the site in the mid-19th century when it was a shovel manufacturer; in 1864 he started a company on site that produced cutlery, beginning with mechanized apple parers. Goodell rebuilt the structure after it was destroyed by fire in 1867. The complex is under consideration to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

H-D & Antrim Elementary removed from Schools in Need of Improvement List

As required by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and in compliance with the New Hampshire Consolidated State Plan, the New Hampshire Department of Education has identified 23 schools throughout New Hampshire as Comprehensive Support and Improvement Schools, which are designated once every three years as schools that are showing the greatest challenges with academic achievement and student perfor-

Comprehensive Support and Improvement Schools are the lowestperforming five percent of all schools in the state receiving Title I, Part A funds, as well as all high schools in the state with a four-year graduation rate less than 67 percent, regardless of Title I status. There are nine schools, including Antrim Elementary and Hillsboro-Deering Elementary, that were previously identified as CSI schools in 2018 and have since met the necessary improvement criteria to exit CSI status.





Sale of Crotched Mountain School averts closing the facility

Kevin Gersh, Chief Autism Officer for Legacy by Gersh has announced that Seven Hills Foundation has agreed to purchase Legacy by Gersh's Crotched Mountain School.

Legacy by Gersh had previously announced that its school for children with autism would close on November 18th due to staffing shortages.

In a press release Gersh said, "Seven Hills is uniquely positioned to help address the staffing issues that have plagued Crotched Mountain School in recent years."

Seven Hills employs 4,600 professionals and offers a continuum of support and services to more than 60,000 children and adults with disabilities and life challenges. David A. Jordan, the president of Seven Hills, previously served as president of Crotched Mountain Foundation from 1985 to 1995. As Gersh pointed out, "Jordan, he is the pioneer who built many of the facilities you see today at Crotched Mountain." He continued, "We could not have scripted a better person or organization to lead this campus and create a new and promising future for Crotched Mountain School." Gersh Autism, which had taken over management of the school in November 2020, purchased the facility after the Crotched Mountain Foundation announced it would be closing the school because of unsustainable operating costs.

Prosecutors say Weare girl died because of father's neglect

According to prosecutors, the 2019 death of 1½-year-old Kamryn Cummings was the end to a life of neglect characterized by a filthy, crowded home, her lack of medical care and hundreds of lice found crawling on her lifeless body. Christian Cummings, 24, faces charges of negligent homicide, child endangerment and reckless conduct, which could send him to prison for 10 to 30 years.

Prosecutor Mark Ryder said the toddler was sick, and family members warned Cummings that his daughter was ill, and was infested with lice. A police report said the bugs were in her face, eyes and ears, and the autopsy mentions the lice as a factor in her death, and claim the child died of Sudden Unexplained Death in Childhood.

On Monday, the jury viewed the Colby Road home in Weare where the child died in February 2019. During the month she died, 17 animals and seven people were living in the cluttered home. Cummings was subsequently arrested several times in Manchester and Weare on charges that involved fentanyl and methamphetamine. He also has been charged with domestic assault.

Hopkinton area vandalized with spray painted racist and hateful graffiti

Residents in Hopkinton were shocked to find a road in the town, as well as signs, utility poles, and mailboxes, spray painted with racist, hateful, and juvenile graffiti. Steve Rothenberg, the former principal of the Concord Regional Technical Center and an assistant principal at Concord High School, found some of the graffiti early Sunday morning on Penacook Road at the intersection with Briar Hill Road and with Gould Hill Road.

The graffiti included Swastikas, nwords, penises, the words "my pussy," the word "go" on a stop sign, and "f--school." Sabrina Dunlap, the chairwoman of the Hopkinton Select Board, said it did not matter who did it or whether they live in Hopkinton or not; the graffiti needed to be denounced. "It's in our town, it's disturbing, and we have to unequivocally condemn it," she said. "As a community, we don't tolerate this."





TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



The drug baricitinib (a type of drug known as a Janus kinase [JAK] inhibitor, also used to treat rheumatoid arthritis) is strongly recommended for patients with severe or critical covid-19 in combination with corticosteroids, says a WHO Guideline Development Group of international experts in *The BMJ*. Their strong recommendation is based on moderate certainty evidence that it improves survival and reduces the need for ventilation, with no observed increase in adverse effects. The WHO experts note that baricitinib has similar

effects to other arthritis drugs called interleukin-6 (IL-6) inhibitors, so when both are available, they suggest choosing one based on cost, availability, and clinician experience. It is not recommended to use both drugs at the same time. However, the experts advise against the use of two other JAK inhibitors (ruxolitinib and tofacitinib) for patients with severe or critical covid-19 because low certainty evidence from small trials failed to show benefit and suggests a possible increase in serious side effects with tofacitinib.

With numerous recent studies demonstrating that antibiotics work as well as surgery for most uncomplicated appendicitis cases, the non-surgical approach can now be considered a routine option, according to a review article in *JAMA*.

Seven-year-old children performed better on a challenging task requiring sustained attention if their mothers consumed twice the recommended amount of choline during their pregnancy, a new study published in the *Journal of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology* has found. The study, which compared these children with those whose mothers had consumed the recommended amount of choline, suggests that the recommended choline intake for expectant mothers does not fully meet the needs of the fetal brain. Choline is absent from most prenatal vitamins, and more than 90% of expectant mothers consume less than the recommended amount.

EXPECTANT MOTHERS' PERIODONTAL HEALTH VITAL TO HEALTH OF HER BABY



When a woman becomes pregnant, she knows it is important to maintain a healthy lifestyle to ensure both her own health and the health of her baby. It's important for pregnant women to maintain periodontal health as well. Research has indicated that women with periodontal disease may be at risk of adverse pregnancy outcomes, such as giving birth to a pre-term or low-birth weight baby.

Dr. Esin Narli Periodontal disease attacks the gum tissue and in more severe cases, the bone supporting the teeth. If left untreated, periodontal disease, also known as gum disease, can lead to tooth loss and has been associated with other systemic diseases, such as diabetes and cardiovascular disease.

Tenderness, redness, or swollen gums are a few indications of periodontal disease. Other symptoms include gums that bleed with toothbrushing or eating, gums that are pulling away from the teeth, bad breath, and loose teeth. These signs, especially during pregnancy, should not be ignored and may require treatment from a dental professional.

Several research studies have suggested that women with periodontal disease may be more likely to deliver babies prematurely or with low-birth weight than mothers with healthy gums. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), babies with a birth weight of less than 5.5 pounds may be at risk of long-term health problems such as delayed motor skills, social growth, or learning disabilities. 
