School Board refuses to fund SRO Apparently H-D student safety is not a priority

Despite a tragic, unceasing tempo of school shootings in America killing students and teachers, a sizable number of districts across the country acknowledge they have not yet briefed their staffs about how local law enforcement would respond to an active shooter on their campuses, according to an exclusive nationwide effort by the Hearst Television National Investigative Unit, with assistance from Hearst Newspapers, to seek answers from every public school district in all 50 states.

Recently SAU #34 Superintendent Jennifer Crawford, H-D School Board Chair Chris Bober and member Heidi Welch met with the Hillsborough Select Board to discuss the status of the H-D School Resource Officer, (SRO).

Until recently a full time police officer was stationed at the school campus as an SRO paid through the school budget. During the 2021 budget cycle the School Board decided to drop funding of the SRO forcing Hillsborough taxpayers to fund the entire expense. The Select Board then asked the School Board, which had a huge budget surplus, to reimburse the town, which it did. However, in the 2022 budget the School Board again refused to fund the SRO although it negotiated a separate contract with the police department, without any funds to pay for it.

At their last meeting, the Select Board again asked that the School District reimburse the town for that expense and resume funding in future budgets.

Dr. Crawford said the School Board would "consider it," although "the role" of an SRO has changed.

Five local Fire Departments receive Wildfire grants

Kearsarge School District announces expansion of Preschool Program

The Kearsarge Regional School District is pleased to announce that the District will expand its preschool program to a second location in the 2023-2024 school year.

The District will use Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds to purchase a modular building that will be placed on site at Kearsarge Regional Elementary School at Bradford. The building will



have two classrooms, a teacher workspace, motor room, speech room, staff area, and bathrooms. The preschool will also have a fenced-in playground. The building is scheduled to arrive and be placed in the spring.

The District currently operates the James House Preschool on the SAU 65 grounds in New London. The District will rebrand the preschool program and change its name to Kearsarge Regional Preschool (KRPS) at New London and at Bradford.

The expanded program is a recognition of the growing need for early childhood education.

The two Bradford classrooms will run a morning and afternoon program to mirror the current system in New London. There are projected to be 12 to 15 openings in both the morning and afternoon classes, depending on the re-enrollment of students already in the program. Two teachers and two paraprofessionals will be hired for the Bradford location.

The District's early childhood program also supports preschool-age students that receive special education services. Any preschool-age child that lives in the district and will be three or four years old by Sept. 30, 2023, is eligible to apply for the 2023-24 school year. Applications will be accepted beginning after Jan. 1, and spaces will be filled on a first come first serve basis.

Children who live in New London, Springfield, North Sutton, or Wilmot are eligible for the New London site. Children who live in Bradford, Newbury, South Sutton, and Warner are eligible for the Bradford site.

Tuition for the 2023-24 school year will be as follows:

3-year-old morning program: two days per week (Tuesday/Thursday or Wednesday/Friday) from 8-10:30 a.m., is priced at \$115 per month. 3-year-old morning program: four days per week (Tuesday-Friday) from 8-10:30 a.m., is priced at \$165 per month. 4-year-old afternoon program: four day per week (Tuesday-Friday) from 11:30 a.m. to 3:15 p.m., is priced at \$245 per month.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A program designed to increase initiation of buprenorphine treatment for opioid use disorder in the emergency department led to a sixfold increase in its use at three Penn Medicine hospitals, according to new research published in *Annals of Emergency Medicine*. By using various tactics in three acute care centers — ranging from financial incentives for doctors to train to treat opioid use disorder to an automated connection to peer recovery specialists — the program was

not only able to boost buprenorphine treatment rates initially, but it sustained the changes.

Ketamine therapy has a swift short-term effect on reducing symptoms of depression and suicidal thoughts, according to a review of all the available evidence. The systematic review, published in the *British Journal of Psychiatry Open*, analyzed evidence from 83 published research papers. The strongest evidence emerged around the use of ketamine to treat both major depression and bipolar depression. Symptoms were reduced as swiftly as one to four hours after a single treatment, and lasted up to two weeks. Some evidence suggested that repeated treatment may prolong the effects, however more high-quality research is needed to determine by how long. Similarly, single or multiple doses of ketamine resulted in moderate to large reductions in suicidal thoughts. This improvement was seen as early as four hours following ketamine treatment and lasted on average three days, and up to a week.

Five days of antibiotics is superior to 10 days for children with community-acquired pneumonia who are not hospitalized, according to a study published in *JAMA Pediatrics*.

RISK FACTORS FOR GUM DISEASE



Smoking: Need another reason to quit smoking? Smoking is one of the most significant risk factors associated with the development of gum disease. Additionally, smoking can lower the chances for successful treatment.

Hormonal changes in girls/women: These changes can make gums more sensitive and make it easier for gingivitis to develop.

Diabetes: People with diabetes are at higher risk for developing infections, including gum disease.

Other illnesses and their treatments: Diseases such as AIDS and its treatments can also negatively affect the health of gums, as can treatments for cancer.

Medications: There are hundreds of prescription and over-the-counter medications that can reduce the flow of saliva, which has a protective effect on the mouth. Without enough saliva, the mouth is vulnerable to infections such as gum disease. And some medicines can cause abnormal overgrowth of the gum tissue; this can make it difficult to keep teeth and gums clean.

Genetic susceptibility: Some people are simply more prone to severe gum disease than others.

Weare father guilty of negligent homicide in death of his daughter

A jury took less than three hours to



find Christian Cummings, 24, of Weare guilty of negligent homicide and two other charges in the 2019 death of his

18-month-old daughter.

Cummings was found guilty of negligent homicide, child endangerment and reckless conduct in the death of his daughter Kamryn Cummings, who died of a severe urinary tract infection with hundreds of lice crawling on her body.

The night she died, Kamryn was put to sleep in a seat, Cummings told police, because her bed was dirty with vomit. Putting babies to sleep in a seated or inclined position is considered a risk for suffocation — the safest position for babies is sleeping on their backs. Jurors sided with prosecutors, who argued Kamryn's death was the result of a severe urinary tract infection and neglect.

After $4 \frac{1}{2}$ days of testimony, the

Hillsborough County Superior Court jury quickly returned the verdict of guilty on all three charges. The deliberation lasted two hours and 40 minutes, which included a break for lunch.


