Over many years fireplaces got smaller or disappeared in favor of modern stoves. The tradition shifted to decorating a log and placing it on the table. In the 19th century, French pastry chefs began baking rolled sponge cakes decorated to look like the traditional Yule log. Family escapes Warner house fire

Crews from nine towns assist Warner firefighters

Crews from Hillsborough, Webster, Bradford, Hopkinton, Salisbury, Henniker, New London, Newbury and Sutton assisted Warner firefighters in extinguishing a house fire on East Sutton Road Sunday night.

Crews were alerted to a structure fire around 5:30 p.m. and although it took only nine minutes for the first crew to arrive, they found the roof was fully engulfed in flames. The fire, which reached three alarms, was declared under control around 7:30 p.m. Tanker trucks were

used to shuttle water from nearby to douse the flames.

Warner Fire Chief Jonathan France reports that four people were in the home, owned by Sean O'Reil, at the time of the fire, but no injuries were reported. The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

The Warner Fire Rescue is a "call" department, meaning members are paid for the time spent responding to emergencies. The department responds to approximately 300 calls per year.

Kearsarge Regional School District proposed budget set at \$47,172,492

Residents of Bradford, New London, Newbury, Springfield, Sutton, Warner, and Wilmot, attended the Kearsarge Regional School District's Deliberative Session on January 8th.

The following Warrant Articles were presented and voted on:

Article 1: To raise and appropriate a bond of \$22,270,344.00 for the purpose of financing renovation and construction of a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Applied Arts, & Math) wing at the Kearsarge Regional High School.

Article 2: To raise and appropriate \$47,172,492. for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the school district officials and agents, and for the payment for the statutory obligations of the District.

Article 3: To approve the cost item included in the Collective Bargaining Agreement reached between the Kearsarge Regional School Board and Kearsarge Regional Educators Association which calls for increases in salaries and benefits,

and further to raise and appropriate the sum of \$432,569 for the 2022-23 fiscal year.

Article 4: Adopt the revisions to RSA 198:4-b, II enacted in 2020, which allows the District to authorize, until rescinded to retain up to 5% of the District's net assessment in any year, allows the expenditure of any amount retained after the School Board first holds a public hearing, and requires the School Board to include an annual reporting of the retained fund balance in its annual report to the District.

Article 5: To raise and appropriate up to \$25,000 to be placed in the Special Education Expendable Trust Fund, for the purpose of emergency

funding of unforeseen Special Education costs incurred by the District, with such amount to be funded from unassigned fund balance (surplus funds) remaining on hand as of June 30, 2022.

Article 6: To raise and appropriate up to \$35,000 to be placed in the School Buildings Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund for the purpose of repair, unanticipated utility costs, and maintaining the school buildings and equipment, with such amount to be funded from unassigned fund balance (surplus funds) remaining on hand as of June 30, 2022.

Article 7: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Vitamin D is most often recognized for its role in bone health, but low levels of the supplement have been associated with a range of autoimmune, cardiovascular, and infectious diseases. Early on in the pandemic health officials began to encourage people to take vitamin D, as it plays a role in promoting immune response and could protect against COVID-19. In a study published in the journal PLOS ONE researchers show a correlation between vitamin

D deficiency and COVID-19 severity and mortality. Patients with vitamin D deficiency (less than 20 ng/mL) were 14 times more likely to have severe or critical cases of COVID than those with more than 40 ng/mL. Strikingly, mortality among patients with sufficient vitamin D levels was 2.3%, in contrast to 25.6% in the vitamin D deficient group.

New research published in Frontiers in Immunology has found significant differences between the two types of vitamin D, with vitamin D2 having a questionable impact on human health. The study found that vitamin D3 could balance people's immune systems and help strengthen defenses against viral infections such as Covid-19.

A clinical trial published in Arthritis & Rheumatology recently examined whether duloxetine, a medication that is prescribed to treat depression and may also reduce chronic pain, can benefit patients with hip or knee osteoarthritis. In the trial of patients experiencing chronic osteoarthritis-related pain in the hip or knee that did not go away with over-the-counter medications, 66 were randomized to duloxetine added to usual care and 66 were randomized to usual care alone. The trial's investigators found that duloxetine did not lessen pain at 3 months or 12 months.

Our mouths are full of bacteria. Hundreds of different types live on our teeth, gums, tongue and other places in our mouths. Some bacteria are helpful. But some can be harmful, such as those that play a role in the tooth decay process.

Our teeth go through this natural process of losing minerals and regaining minerals all

When a tooth is exposed to acid frequently — for example, if you eat or drink often, especially foods or drinks containing sugar and starches — the repeated cycles of acid attacks cause the enamel to continue to lose minerals. A white spot may appear where minerals have been lost. This is a sign of early decay.

U.S. Postal Service issues stamp honoring New London's Tomie dePaola

The U.S. Postal Service recently announced its commemorative stamps for 2023, including a stamp honoring children's book author and illustrator Tomie dePaola and his beloved character, Strega Nona, whom Tomie doodled on a notepad during a faculty meeting at Colby-Sawyer in the 1970s.

Tomie's ties to Colby-Sawyer started in 1959 when he was invited to create sets and participate in the first-ever production held in the new Sawyer Fine and Performing Arts Center, Thornton Wilder's "The Matchmaker." He returned to the college in 1972 as a full-time faculty member through 1975, a time Tomie recalled as the college's golden age of theater!

As his career as an author and illustrator took off, Tomie remained an integral part of the Colby-Sawyer community. He continued to teach off-and-on as an adjunct professor, held numerous art exhibitions at the college and endlessly showed his support and commitment to Colby-Sawyer's fine

Weare child predator faces more charges

On June 11, 2021, members of the Weare Police Department

received information concerning a juvenile victim of alleged sexual assault. An investigation was launched resulting in the arrest of Jason Lewis, of Weare. At that time, he was to answer for the following charges: Incest (4 counts); Aggravated Felonious Sexual As-

sault (5 counts); Kidnapping I Extortion Criminal Restraint Pattern Sexual Assault; Endangering the Welfare of a Child; Contribute to Delinguency of a Minor (2 counts). Over the State's objection, Lewis was later released on Personal Recognizance bail. Through the unyielding and dedicated efforts of the Weare Police Department additional leads were explored and developed. On January 6, 2023, Lewis has been arrested on the following additional charges: Incest (2 counts); Aggravated Felonious Sexual Assault (8 counts); Felonious Sexual Assault (14 counts); Manufacture Child Abuse Images (29 counts); Possession of Child Pornography (36 counts). He was being held at the Hillsborough County Department of Corrections pending the January 9, 2023 arraignment before the Hillsborough County North Superior Court. We extend our sincere appreciation to the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office, Goffstown Police Department, Child Advocacy Center, DCYF, Hillsborough County Attorney's Office and NESPIN.





Antrim Select Board applies for \$500,000 Grant to be loaned to developer

Following a public hearing, the Antrim Select Board voted to apply to the Community Development Finance Authority for up to \$500,000 in CDBG Housing Grant Funds. Of the grant funds, up to \$25,000 will be retained by the town for administrative/labor compliance costs associated with the project, \$475,000 of the funds will be loaned by

the Town to Antrim Commons Development LLC to be used by Owner to support the development project known as Antrim Commons located at 42 Main Street, Antrim, NH to acquire and be rehabilitated into approximately 35 units of affordable housing. The loan from the Town of Antrim to the Owner shall be for a term of no less than 60 years with

an annual interest of zero percent (0%) and no payments due until the maturity date of the loan. The Owner shall enter into a promissory note where it agrees to pay the Town on the terms described above and shall provide the Town with a subordinate mortgage lien on the property securing the performance of the obligations.

The town has voted three times to put money into 2 Capital Reserve Funds to do something to improve walking and biking. The town was awarded a TAP grant that could fund 80% of a project.

But last year at town meeting the warrant article requesting funding from the town was altered (substantially de-funded) and the amended article was voted down. As with most things in most towns some people want it and some people don't.

Deering Board expected to form a Patriotic Committee

Betsy Holmes, Chair of the Library Trustees requested that a \$2,000 Warrant article be included in the Warrant in order to paint the Library. The Board agreed.

The Board presented Don Mann with proposed charter language for the Patriotic Committee they hope to approve at the next meeting.

The Board approved Betsy Kirby's

request to waive the fee for holding a Country Line Dance at Town Hall.

Finance Coordinator Meagen Kerris-Deering's request to secure a Debit Card was deferred pending adoption of the procedure for its use.

The Board approved the hiring of Greg Chlapowski in the Highway Department, and the hiring of a minute-taker at \$1,500-\$2,000/year.

ConVal School Board approves proposed budget on 8-1 vote

The ConVal School Board has approved the proposed 2023-2024 operating budget. The proposed budget of \$53.8 million reflects an increase of 1.35% over the current budget. The gross budget, which includes federal programs like Title I & II and food services, is approximately \$56.1 million, or a 0.5 % decrease.

A public hearing on the budget was scheduled for Tuesday at 6 p.m. in the district office.

The vote to approve the budget was 8-1, with Francestown member Kevin Pobst voting against, claiming that he was uncomfortable with the additions to the budget, including the plan to add paid positions.
