# New Boston nurse charged with abuse

# State says she broke her patient's fingers during tussle



Nancy Waller, 67, the former head nurse at a New Boston care facility is facing felony charges that she broke the fingers of a brain-damaged patient in her care.

Waller is on trial in the Hillsborough County Superior Court where authorities allege she broke two of patient Steven Hall's fingers, after Hall had grasped the call button in his left hand and refused to release it.

Rose Meadow is a residential care program for people with brain injuries. Hall, now 60, lived there after suffering brain damage from an opioid overdose.

Hall's daughter and guardian, Christina Lally, who attended the trial said Waller confided in her that she pried Hall's fingers from the call button. In addition, New Boston Police interviewed several Rose Meadow

workers who said Waller told them she had pried Hall's fingers off the call button.

Waller faces two felony charges: abuse of facility patients and second-degree assault. Each carries a prison sentence of 3 1/2 to 7 years.

In April 2021, Waller agreed to a preliminary suspension of her license after the state Board of Nursing moved for an emergency suspension, citing the finger incident.

Waller's defense maintains Hall's hand was injured in a fall he took.



# Franklin Patrolman's Association votes "No Confidence" in Police Chief and City Manager

The Franklin Police Patrolman's Association has taken a vote of no confidence in Chief David Goldstein, Lieutenant Daniel Poirier, Lieutenant Ralph Hale Jr., Sergeant Daniel Ball, and City Manager Judie Milner.

Seven of nine of the union members supported the vote of no confidence in the department's command staff and city administration while five of nine specifically voted no confidence in the chief while three abstained.

"Chief Goldstein's absentee leadership has created an atmosphere of hostility,

retaliation and intimidating behavior, which has established a pattern and practice of inequitable treatment of union members."

Milner, in a written statement, said she had full confidence in Goldstein and the police department and expressed her disappointment in the union's decision to go public with their concerns rather than waiting for private negotiation. Union contract negotiations are slated to begin in the coming months. Milner declined to comment further.

Mayor Jo Brown also expressed support for Milner and



First to speak were Kather-





Chernow will receive an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from the College in recognition of his literary achievements.


College President Dr.

# Legislative Update

# Our Granite Advantage is Advantageous for us all

When new legislative ideas are brought forward in the Granite State, they're always developed through intense discussion, debate, and often even with compromise. Our tendency to deeply scrutinize these bills makes them stronger and ensures they hold New Hampshire's best interests. This is exactly the process that took place in 2014 with Medicaid Expansion.

The bill was designed to provide health care coverage to low-income Granite Staters through the federal Medicaid program. Providing financially insecure individuals access to needed medical care was something we all wanted to support in theory, but it needed to hold up in practice. Many, myself included, had deep concerns about how the program would function and the immediate and long-term tax impact it would have on Granite Staters. We needed to make this program beneficial for every New Hampshire resident, not only those taking advantage of it directly

The result was the developed transformation of Washington D.C.'s Medicaid Expansion into New Hampshire's Granite Advantage program we have today. We wanted this opportunity to function as a step-up, not a permanent handout, so we included a work requirement. We also insisted on securing funding that did not require the use of General Funds. And as a final safeguard, we made sure Granite State taxpayers would never be on the hook for the program by including an escape clause. Were the Federal Government to fail in contributing its 90% of the Medicaid program as promised, our state would end the program immediately. Through these specific modifications, our Granite Advantage program was born.

Yet, the Legislature went even further to make sure this program made sense for our state. Our legislature developed reauthorization requirements for the program, acting as performance reviews to ensure proper function and continued fiscal responsibility. This temporary testing period turned out to be a success. With a track record of success over the last decade, the program now known as Granite Advantage has the data to prove it.

The results have been to the advantage of

all, even those who've never participated in the program directly. New Hampshire hospitals have seen a drastic drop in uncompensated care attributed to uninsured patients, from \$173 million in 2014 to \$69 million in 2021. There is also a 63% reported reduction in the number of uninsured patients seeking emergency room care, along with a 57% reduction in uninsured inpatient admissions, and a 41% reduction in uninsured outpatient visits. Insurance rates have also fallen in the individual market. At \$309 per month, New Hampshire has the lowest benchmark rate in the nation according to the Urban Institute and Robert Woods Johnson Foundation.

Now having seen our state expand coverage for low-income Granite Staters without increased costs to taxpayers, our Republican Senate President Jeb Bradley is moving to make Granite Advantage permanent. I, along with several other Republican and Democrat Senators are aligned in this effort to do what's right for New Hampshire, as well as the families who call it home.

Why are Republicans taking the lead on this issue? A large reason is fiscal responsibility. When Granite Staters pay their monthly health insurance premiums or through co-pays when seeking care, they're paying into the health care system. Hospitals are required to treat every individual who requests care, regardless of their financial ability to pay. Patients without insurance put a heavy financial strain on the overall system, creating a de facto tax on the insured. Granite Advantage has helped lower those costs, benefitting our entire state.

What we have developed in New Hampshire is a program that embodies the values and needs of our state, which is exactly what's driven its success. As carefully as we've crafted state budgets, Republicans have developed this program to be both effective and fiscally responsible. As widely as we've cut taxes to combat rising costs, Republicans have again worked to lower health care costs for all Granite Staters. And in the state-focused mindset we've used to lead independently, we took a D.C.-driven dilemma and turned it into a New Hampshire success.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved Jardiance (empagliflozin) to reduce the risk of cardiovascular death and hospitalization for heart failure in adults. Jardiance was originally approved by the FDA in 2014 as a supplement to diet and exercise to improve glucose control in adults with type 2 diabetes. Jardiance is also approved to reduce the risk of cardiovascular death in adults with type 2 diabetes and established

cardiovascular disease, and to reduce the risk of death and hospitalization in patients with heart failure and low ejection fraction. Heart failure is a syndrome in which the heart is not meeting the needs of the body, affecting more than 650,000 people in the U.S. each year. Despite therapies in multiple drug classes, mortality remains high and treatment options for a broader range of patients are needed. Symptoms of heart failure vary but can include shortness of breath, fatigue and swelling in the legs. Heart failure becomes more common with age and is the leading cause of hospitalization in people over 65 years old.

Previous studies have shown that psychedelic treatment with psilocybin relieved major depressive disorder symptoms in adults for up to a month. Now, in a follow-up study of those participants, published in the *Journal of Psychopharmacology*, the researchers report that the substantial antidepressant effects of psilocybin-assisted therapy, given with supportive psychotherapy, may last at least a year for some patients. Over the last 20 years, there has been a growing renaissance of research with classic psychedelics — the pharmacological class of compounds that include psilocybin, an ingredient found in so-called magic mushrooms. According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse, psilocybin can produce perceptual changes, altering a person's awareness of their surroundings and of their thoughts and feelings. Treatment with psilocybin has shown promise in research settings for treating a range of mental health disorders and addictions.

# WHEN SHOULD I CONSULT MY DENTIST ABOUT NUTRITION?



Always ask your dentist if you're not sure how your nutrition (diet) may affect your oral health. Conditions such as tooth loss, pain or joint dysfunction can impair chewing and are often found in elderly people, those on restrictive diets and those who are undergoing medical treatment. People experiencing these problems may be too isolated or weakened to


