Former Bradford Fire Captain convicted

Given maximum sentence of 8 years in prison

Russell "Rob" Steiz, 53, of Bradford, was sentenced to eight years in



prison after he
was found guilty
of sexually assaulting two Concord
women.

Between the summer of 2019 and the spring of

2020, the former Bradford Fire Captain was accused of restraining and sexually assaulting two women, aged 48 and 57 at the time.

According to court documents,

in June 2019, the first victim agreed to meet Steiz for coffee at the Starbucks in Concord where he brought her back to his vehicle in the parking lot and attempted to remove her shirt. She later accompanied him to a cleaning service facility where he sexually assaulted her on one of the office desks.

In May 2020, a different woman agreed to meet Steiz for dinner at what she thought was the location of a restaurant but instead, turned out to be his home which he shared with his elderly mother.

After dinner, while sitting around a fire pit, he forced himself on her. She testified that when she told him that she didn't want to do that and began screaming and crying for help, he dragged her to a nearby camper and sexually assaulted her a second time.

In addition to a maximum sentence of eight years in state prison, Steiz will be placed on a 10-year suspended sentence following his release which states that if he were to commit a crime while on probation, another maximum eight-year prison sentence could be imposed.

Developer seeks to renovate two vacant Central Square buildings

Angelo Trodella of Trodco Management, the new owner of the vacant building at 8 Bridge Street met with the Hillsborough Select Board to discuss the acquisition of 2 Bridge Street with a plan to renovate the properties, and stabilize them with affordable housing units and retail store opportunities.

Trodella believes that since they share a common

location, it makes sense to develop them with a common theme, under one ownership so as to be able to manage and maintain these properties efficiently. Furthermore, one developer who seeks to renovate will simplify and better manage construction costs, time of delivery and the overall management of both properties.

Considering its deplorable

condition, he is offering to acquire 2 Bridge Street from the town, for a nominal fee of one dollar.

The plan is to maintain the property in its current use

by maintain housing above local retail below, and provide an asset that will benefit the town by providing affordable housing units and business opportunities. The Board members were supportive of the idea and directed Town Administrator Laura Buono to check with legal council to see if the transfer could occur without going to bid.





Hopkinton School District voters reject two attempts to reduce the budget

Hopkinton voters gathered at the High School gym last Saturday morning for their Annual School District meeting. The modest two article warrant had no relation to the length of the debate.

The first item up for discussion was the proposed \$24,892,924 budget, up \$7.5% from the current \$23,069,768. It was moved, seconded and up for discussion at just after 8:00 a.m.

Speaker after speaker took to the floor until Louise Carr offered an amendment to reduce the budget to its current \$23,069,768. After a lengthy discussion the amendment failed on a 61 Yes to 182 No ballot vote.

Another proposed amendment immediately followed, seeking a modest \$200,000 reduction to \$24,692,924.

Elections have been postponed to March 28 in Andover, Antrim, Bennington, Bow, Bradford, ConVal School District, Deering, Francestown, Goffstown, Greenfield,

Hancock, Hillsborough, Hopkinton (town meeting set for March 18 will still be held), New Boston, New London, Newbury, Warner, Washington, Windsor.

Select Board newcomers upset Henniker veterans

First time candidates Jeff Morse (224 votes) and Neal Martin (213 votes) upset nine vear veteran Tia Hooper and veteran Planning Board member Heidi Aucoin (each

with 183 votes) for a seat on the Select Board. NEC student Michael Barnard finished 5th with 34 votes.

Veteran Peter Flynn did not seek reelection.

Another lengthy debate followed, resulting in a ballot vote loss 90 Yes to 157 No.

A final ballot vote of 186

Yes to 51 No secured the passage of the original request at about noon. The second article, a request to add \$200,000 to District Building Repair & Maintenance Expendable Trust passed unanimously without debate on a voice vote.

One of the many projects that the BPW conducts is a day camp for high school girls. This camp is about teaching them real life experiences by conducting a reality store in which they travel from event to event to see what it takes to live for a month. In addition to the reality store. we start the day with a keynote speaker. This year our speaker is Police Officer Tracy. She has agreed to speak on what made her become a police officer and what her daily duties consist of. In addition, we asked Chief Goldstein if he would share with our high school students his course on self-defense and without hesitation he

Finally, for the time I spent in the school system, I have never felt unsafe. Our police department has always been there for the children and they always come with a smile. When times are tough, and the children are having a hard time, they help. When times are tough and the staff are having a hard time, they help. 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

Newport sex offender faces additional charge

A felon and sex offender, convicted of sexual assault against a child in 2009 and



accused of sexual assault in February, now faces more charges. Thomas Thibeault, 36, of Springfield Road in Newport, was arrested on Saturday by New Hampshire State Police on aggravated felonious sexual assault

and duty to report charges, both felonies. Thibeault was arrested in February on six felony counts of aggravated felonious sexual assault and one of second-degree assault-domestic violence-strangulation after an incident in Salisbury. During the course of the investigation, an additional sexual assault was identified, said Amber Lagace, the public information officer for the state police. Thibeault is a felon and sex offender due to a felonious sexual assault charge from October 2008 and a reckless conduct charge from August 2008 in Sullivan County. He pleaded guilty to both charges in April

2009. The victim in the sexual assault case was under 16, according to state records. Thibeault pleaded guilty to a probation violation in November 2010, connected to the cases. Thibeault was convicted on a criminal trespassing charge in May 2012.

Erratic tractor-trailer stopped in New London

On March 11th NH State Police received a complaint from a concerned motorist about



a tractor-double trailer that was traveling all over the road and had possibly struck a guardrail on I-89 northbound in the town of Warner. The New London Police Department was able to locate the driver as he exited

the interstate at exit 11 and conducted a motor vehicle stop. Trooper McGrath from the New Hampshire State Police #TroopD Barracks arrived shortly after and conducted a roadside investigation reference possible impairment of the driver. The lone operator was identified as Thomas Hawk, 64, of Newburgh, NY. After the roadside investi-

gation was completed, Hawk was arrested for aggravated driving while intoxicated and open container. Hawk was released on personal recognizance bail and is scheduled to appear at the Newport District Court on April 11, 2023, at 8:00 a.m.

Henniker man arrested making false report

Aaron Keith Richard, 38, of Henniker was arrested on January 18 on a false report to law enforcement charge. He was arrested after an incident at Memorial Field on South Fruit Street.

Sunapee man charged with criminal mischief

He was subsequently placed under arrest and charged with Criminal Mischief.

A Connecticut tractor-trailer driver was arrested in Hopkinton late Tuesday night after state police say he tried to avoid an inspection and crashed into a cement pole before attempting to flee on foot. Jermayne Eubanks, 42, of Tolland, Connecticut, was charged with conduct after an accident, reckless driving and reckless

conduct. Hopkinton police responded to the McLane distribution center on Maple Street for a report of a crash involving a commercial motor vehicle. Upon learning that the Department of Safety's Motor Carrier Unit was called in to conduct an inspection of the truck, the driver attempted to drive off, striking a cement pole and an exit gate, officials said. The second crash "resulted in significant property damage and caused the front axle of the trailer to become disconnected," the release said. That's when the driver attempted to flee on foot and was arrested by Hopkinton police, officials said. Driver inattention appears to have been a factor in the crash, officials said.



TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Ivermectin is a drug approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to treat parasites in animals and in humans with intestinal strongyloidiasis (roundworm) and onchocerciasis (river blindness) orally, as well as ectoparasites and skin conditions topically. Ivermectin is not approved by the FDA to treat or prevent COVID-19. Nonetheless,

prescriptions of ivermectin by U.S. health care providers increased more than tenfold from 3,589 per week pre-COVID-19 to 39,102. In addition, the U.S. National Institutes of Health (NIH), World Health Organization (WHO) and European Medicine Agency (EMA) have all advised against using ivermectin to treat or prevent COVID-19.

Pancreatic cancer is an extremely difficult cancer to treat. Notwithstanding many advancements in our understanding of the biology of pancreatic cancer, current treatments do not have much of an effect on prognosis. Unless it's caught early, which is rare, only about 10% of patients survive five years past diagnosis. However, new research that is the largest population-based study of this question, published in *BMC Cancer*, shows that medications commonly prescribed to treat high blood pressure, ARB-type therapies — which include drugs such as valsartan and losartan — and ACE inhibitors, including benazepril, ramipril or Lisinopril may also improve survival in patients with pancreatic cancer. These medications for hypertension do not have a lot of side effects — far fewer than chemotherapy, for example — and yet data suggests that they might extend life in patients with pancreatic cancer.

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Check with a professional to:

- Raise your furnace, water heater, and electric panel to floors that are less likely to be flooded. An undamaged water heater may be your best source of fresh water after a flood.
- Install check valves in plumbing to prevent floodwater from backing up into the drains of your home. (As a last resort, when floods threaten, use large corks or stoppers to plug showers, tubs, or basins.)
- Construct barriers such as levees, berms, and flood walls to stop floodwater from entering the building (if permitted by local building codes).
- Seal walls in basements with waterproofing compounds to avoid seepage through cracks.

Use sand bags when flooding is expected. It takes two people about one hour to fill and place 100 sandbags, creating a wall one foot high and 20 feet long. Make sure you have enough sand, burlap or plastic bags, shovels, strong helpers, and time to place them properly. If a flood is expected, some communities will offer free sandbags to residents. Be sure to watch or listen to the news so you can access these resources.

Remember: standard homeowners insurance doesn't cover flooding, but flood insurance does. Get information at www. FloodSmart.gov.

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CHOOSING A TOOTHPASTE



Q: What's the right toothpaste for me?

A: The best way to answer that question is to talk with your dentist about it. There are lots of toothpastes on the market, and not all are the same. See what your dentist thinks about which ones may be best for your particular needs.

One main consideration in picking a toothpaste is to make sure it carries the American Dental Association (ADA) Seal of Acceptance. The seal is awarded only to those products that have passed a demanding testing procedure and have been proven effective. Another key consideration is that the toothpaste contain fluoride, a key element in preventing tooth decay. The ADA also notes that toothpastes containing an ingredient called triclosan can combat gingivitis, the early stage of gum disease, or periodontal disease.

Older people, whose gums may have receded a bit, leaving sensitive roots partially exposed, may want a toothpaste with a desensitizing agent that reduces the potential discomfort of exposure to heat or cold. Some people may be in the market for a paste with a whitening agent. Also, you want a toothpaste that's going to make your mouth feel clean and fresh. That way, you'll be eager to use it.
