# Warner home destroyed

### No injuries reported as heavy winds topple trees

A Warner home was destroyed Friday after a windstorm knocked two trees over, while one woman was inside. The homeowner made it out of the house safely, with the help of her neighbors and family.

"My brother was actually working across the field today and he just had a feeling that it had something to do with my mom's house. And he called me and told me and I left my work and came flying here," said Christina Wiley, the homeowner's daughter.

The fallen trees not only caved in the ceiling of the house, but the entire neighborhood on Pleasant Lane lost power. Eversource was on-site attempting to restore power while crews worked to remove the trees from the home. Neighbors said they heard the homeowner screaming for help when the trees crashed into her home.

"I'm just glad that she's OK and that she was home alone at the time, because she does have my nephew. And my dad could've all been home today, and it could've been worse," Wiley said.

## Shooting at New Boston Space Force Station was justified

New Hampshire investigators have ruled that a fatal shooting involving a New Boston police officer and contracted security member last year at the New Boston Space Force Station was justified.

Investigators said New Boston
Officer Shane Morton and contracted

security member Peter White shot Michael Foley in May believing he was a threat.

According to the report, Foley was armed with two weapons and never complied with orders to drop them. Investigators said they also found that Morton and White didn't immediate-

ly resort to deadly force and instead tried to defuse the situation by talking to Foley. The report found that Foley became increasingly agitated and escalated the threat by pointing his gun at the others. Morton and White shot Foley, who died from his injuries. No charges will be filed.

### Stoddard teacher named a National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Scholar

Maggie Forrestall, a thirdgrade teacher at SAU 24 school James Faulkner Elementary in Stoddard, NH, has been selected as a National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Scholar. She was chosen from a national pool of candidates with a 1 out of 5 acceptance rate. As a summer scholar, Ms. Forrestall will attend the oneweek Landmarks workshop, "From the Fragments: Places and People in Colonized New England" at the University of New Hampshire in July.

Through lectures, immer-

sive place-based field trips, and online sources, participants will look at what happened when English colonists came 400 years ago, including multifaceted encounters with Indigenous peoples, labor-intensive economic pursuits with lasting environmental consequences, and the presence of people forcibly brought by colonists for labor, including indentured Scots and enslaved Africans.



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

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### New London Select Board supports police & church grants - set 2023 priorities

The New London Select Board dealt with a varied agenda Thursday evening.

Pastor Bob Messer of the First Baptist Church requested the Board's support for an LCHIP Grant the Church is applying for.

The church is approaching its 200th anniversary and the grant would be used to repair and replace the windows which were last replaced in 1958. In addition funds would be used to replace the clock. Board members were in agreement and voted 3-0 to issue a letter

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of support for the Grant.

Police Chief Emily Cobb requested the Board's support and acceptance of a \$413,000 COPS Grant to purchase a new CAD/RMS program for the Department.



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
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# Crime Watch

### Henniker man arrested for harassing H-D students



On April 10th, Hillsboro Police responded to the Hillsboro-Deering High School for a suspicious person that was threatening students as they were leaving for the day. With the assistance of

the Henniker Police, we were able to locate and arrest Shawn Mitchell, DOB: 10/30/96 of Henniker, Henniker Police had a warrant for Shawn for a previous issue. Hillsboro Police charged Shawn with 4 counts of criminal threatening and 1 count disorderly conduct. He was held at the Merrimack House of Corrections with arraignment in front of a Judge on April 11, 2023.

### **Peterborough Police** locate suspect with help from Hillsborough K9

The Peterborough Police Department recently called upon K9 Gibbs to assist in locating suspects involved in an assault. The K9 team was able to track a subject from the vehicle involved, approximately a half mile



through the woods and deep swampy area until getting near the high school campus. K9 Gibbs was establishing that the suspect was heading to the school campus area,

perimeter units were sent to that area. The juvenile subject was located by perimeter units not far in front of the K9 team on the school campus. This incident highlights the effectiveness of K9 teams in assisting law enforcement agencies in locating and apprehending suspects. K9s such as the aging K9 Gibbs are trained to track scents and follow trails, making them invaluable assets in situations where suspects may flee on foot or hide in difficult terrain. In addition, K9s can often locate suspects faster than human officers. as they are able to track scents over longer distances and through difficult terrain. This can be particularly useful in cases where time is of the essence, such as when a suspect is believed to be armed or dangerous.

### Goffstown man charged with 4 felony counts of possession

Noble Scott Hunt, 34, with a last known

address of Pollard Road in Goffstown was arrested at noon on March 29, 2023, on four felony possession of a controlled drug with intent to distribute charges. He also had two active warrants out of Oxford County, Maine, for failure to appear-trafficking scheduled drugs from November 2022, and failure to appear on an aggravated trafficking of scheduled drugs, criminal forfeiture of property, and violation conditions of release charges from July 2022, issued by the Sanford ME Police Department. Hunt was arrested after an incident at Concord Hospital and the Rosemary's Way apartment complex in Penacook. He was arraigned in Merrimack County Superior Court on March 30. On April 3, the charges were amended to seven felony controlled drug: acts prohibited charges.

### Hillsborough woman arrested for aggravated felonious sexual assault

Debra Gee, 54, of East Washington Road in Hillsboro on an aggravated felonious sexual assault charge. She was accused

of sexually assaulting a child repeatedly in Hillsboro between Sept. 24, 2013, and Sept. 24, 2018.

### **Hillsborough Police arrest** man with outstanding warrants

Hillsborough Officers observed a vehicle pulled into a local business and recognized that it was the same vehicle previously pursued in Henniker. A subsequent registration check on the vehicle was conducted and revealed the registered owner's driving privileges were suspended. Officers made contact and determined the registered owner, Paul McCarthy, 42, was the operator. Additionally, officers discovered the defendant had multiple active warrants out of the Concord Police Department. The defendant was taken into custody for operating after suspension and transported to the Hillsboro Police Department. The defendant was then processed and transferred to the custody of the Concord Police Department on Charges of Driving After Rev/Suspension.

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### Nine towns assist New Boston firefighter in battling garage fire - homeowner suffers serious burns

On Sunday, April 9th at approximately 18:09 crews were alerted to a garage fire at 69 Dougherty Lane. The initial report by on scene fire personnel reported a garage fire with an exposure issue.

The fire spread quickly and a second alarm was requested. An aggressive attack was initiated with the focus on saving the adjacent home.

The home owner, who attempted to save property,

suffered second degree burns to approximately 35% of his body and was transported to a local hospital.

While the garage was a total


loss, the home remained intact with mostly smoke and water damage and some charring.

In addition the family cat was saved and returned to the owners.

### TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A global study of asthma patients by Rutgers and an international team of researchers, published in *The New England Journal of Medicine*, shows that a combination of albuterol, which provides relief from an asthma attack by relaxing the smooth muscles and is used for immediate asthma relief, and the corticosteroid budesonide, taken via an inhaler, lower the number of sudden episodes of shortness of breath,

wheezing and coughing in patients. Such incidents, referred to medically as "exacerbations" but commonly known as asthma attacks, can often lead to an emergency room visit, hospitalization, or, in some cases, death.

The largest clinical review of immune responses to Tylenol, non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) and opioid analgesics, with a focus on infectious diseases, has provided insights into unintended impacts of these commonly used medicines. The findings highlight the potential for some of these medicines to join the fight against old and new infectious diseases. The findings are published in the *British Journal of Clinical Pharmacology*. Although research into these drugs has focused on their effects on pain and fever management, until now, their impact on the treatment of infectious diseases specifically was unclear. The findings highlight the need for more studies in this under-recognized area of research, with wide-reaching implications. Key findings of the clinical review: For pain – morphine suppresses key cells of the immune system and increases the risk of infection, particularly after cancer surgery. For fever — antipyretics, e.g. Tylenol, ibuprofen (Advil), and aspirin, can reduce the desirable immune response when taken for vaccination. Aspirin could be an affordable and accessible therapeutic option for tuberculosis — which mainly afflicts poor countries — with beneficial results shown in animals and humans. Anti-inflammatory medicine indomethacin may reduce viral replication in Covid-19, but large-scale human trials are needed.

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# HOMEOWNERS INSURANCE: PART IV



All insurance is definitely not created equal. The least costly homeowners insurance will likely give you the least amount of coverage, and vice versa. There are essentially three levels of coverage.

Actual cash value: Actual cash value covers the cost of the house plus the value of your belongings after deducting depreciation (i.e., how much the items are currently worth, not how much you paid for them).

**Replacement cost:** Replacement value policies cover the actual cash value of your home and possessions without the deduction for depreciation, so you would be able to repair or rebuild your home up to the original value.

Guaranteed (or extended) replacement cost/value: The most comprehensive, this inflation-buffer policy pays for whatever it costs to repair or rebuild your home—even if it's more than your policy limit. Certain insurers offer an extended replacement, meaning it offers more coverage than you purchased, but there is a ceiling; typically, it is 20% to 25% higher than the limit.

Some advisors feel all homeowners should buy guaranteed replacement value policies because you don't need just enough insurance to cover the value of your home, you need enough insurance to rebuild your home, preferably at current prices (which probably will have risen since you purchased or built). Guaranteed replacement value policies will absorb the increased replacement costs and provide the homeowner with a cushion if construction prices increase. Additionally, many consumers are under-insured with the contents portion of their policy because they have not done a home inventory and added the total value to compare with what the policy is covering.

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# FIRST U.S. STUDY ANALYZING TOOTH SURVIVAL AFTER ROOT CANAL IN GENERAL POPULATION



Teeth survive about 11 years after a root canal, according to recent research. The groundbreaking study is the first to analyze records from community dental practices, where most Americans receive dental care.

Root canals are an important treatment to maintain natural teeth affected by disease. However, over time, the treated tooth eventually becomes brittle and dies. Understanding the outcomes of the procedure is essential

to improving dental treatments.

For this study, the research team gathered deidentified electronic dental records from the National Dental Practice-Based Research Network, consisting of 99 small group and solo dentistry practices from around the country. The data covered more than 46,000 patients who received root canals.

Data analysis revealed that the median survival time of a tooth after a root canal is 11.1 years. However, several factors can impact that, including follow-up treatments.

Teeth that receive a root canal, and a subsequent filling and crown last about 20 years. Teeth that receive either a filling or a crown after a root canal last around 11 years. Teeth that receive no restorative work after a root canal only last about 6.5 years. There were also wide disparities in longevity among geographic regions.

Northeast – 20.5 years
Southwest – 11.2 years
South Central – 9.0 years

Midwest – 11.2 years
South Atlantic – 9.1 years
Western – 8.7 years

Insurance status also played a significant role.

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# Multiple topics covered during Sunapee's Coffee with the Chief

Introductions were followed by a presentation that covered a variety of topics; including staffing, equipment and vehicles, and recent and upcoming trainings and projects within the Sunapee Police Department.

Chief Cobb also discussed the availability of data and statistics from SPD, as well as the upcoming release of the "Sunapee, NH Crime Data Analysis" report, which will provide a year-by-year look at the activities of Sunapee Police since 2003; and how all of those years compare to each other. Additionally, Chief Cobb presented the Sunapee Police Department's new parking map, which was created in an effort to make parking information more easily accessible in time for the upcoming Summer season.

The Chief also covered the department's plans for a joint active shooter response training with Sunapee School District; to include a table-top training in May, followed by an on-site training in the Fall of 2023.

Chief Cobb also outlined the

resources within SPD; including access to Sunapee School District camera systems in an emergency as well as our monitoring of CopSync, which is a program that sends out an alert directly to area law enforcement in the event of an active shooter scenario and can be activated by the teachers themselves, right from the classroom.

The discussion then moved to Lieutenant Timothy Puchtler, who outlined the department's upcoming 2023 Alcohol Awareness Week at Sunapee Middle High School, during the week of April 17th to April 20th.

Lieutenant Puchtler also continues to actively participate at the High School in discussions with students during Health classes. Sergeant Nicholas Boisvert was then invited up to speak about his recent experiences with Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training for law enforcement and also spoke in detail about the new mental health resource line in New Hampshire, known as 988, and its applicability of use by law enforcement in such a crisis.

We would like to take this

opportunity to thank all of the community members who joined us this morning. Thank you also to the Sunapee Fire Department for allowing us to hold this event in their apparatus bay; Bob Ruopp for serving the event with much needed morning coffee, and to Vicki Jepson and her husband Link for providing the sweets. 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
