

New London Select Board examining the Broom Building as possible New Police Station

New London Select Board Chair Janet Kidder reported that she, Kim Hallquist, Adam Ricker, Chief Cobb and Lieutenant Keith toured the Broom Building last week to see if it might work as the future location of the Police Department. She noted this follows up the suggestion made by the former Police Station Site Review Subcommittee.

Mr. Beasley asked about the video that was discussed at the last Selectmen's meeting. Chair Kidder explained that the Selectmen want to have a video made that will illustrate the reasons the Board feels a new building is needed. It will include information from the Chief and will be made available to the public to help them decide whether they feel a new police station is needed.

Mr. Beasley asked if it will include information from those who feel that the current station can accommodate the needs of the police. Chief Cobb noted that she always tries to be fair and when she gives tours of the station, she points out the views that others have raised that are contrary to hers. Colin Beasley noted that as a matter of fairness he feels that both sides should be given, and asked if there was another video made could it be posted to the town website with the Selectmen's video.

Hopkinton High School Honors Biology Class participates in a Bioinformatics Project from NEC

Bioinformatics is an interdisciplinary field where computer programs are used to analyze immense amounts of complex biological data. The Human Genome Project is one example. Other initiatives include identifying unknown species (e.g., bacteria, plant, fish, etc.) by collecting DNA from a specimen, amplifying select marker genes using the polymerase chain reaction (PCR), sequencing these amplified products, and comparing the sequence reads from a sample against a universal database to enable identification. Through these activities, students at Hopkinton High School are engaging in collecting and analyzing data precisely and accurately, critical thinking, problem solving, and so much more.

The goal is to participate in a pilot program as citizen scientists who contribute to a collaborative project with the Lake Sunapee Protective Association (LSPA). With the help of learned about the health of the Dr. Geoff Cook and others from New England College as well as the staff at LSPA, students will be collecting water samples from the lake to isolate environmental DNA (eDNA) from the water. The collected DNA will then be used to identify what invasive species are present in the lake; monitor bacterial communities, and potentially track fish populations. Hopefully no invasive species will be found, but if they are then LSPA will now be aware and can make plans to manage the situation.

In May, students piloted a citizen scientist data collection project with Dr. Cook (NEC) and Dr. Elizabeth Harper and others from LSPA. The focus is on using eDNA found in water samples from the lake to determine if invasive species are present, track bacterial communities over time and space, and possibly monitor fish populations. In addition, students

ulty at New England College and staff at the Lake Sunapee Protective Association, our students are obtaining authentic learning experiences in the

application of genetics and bioinformatics, the role of microbiology within an ecosystem and an introduction to potential careers.

> The initial call was reported as a motor vehicle accident with someone who may have been ejected. The body was later determined to be a dead woman, which Hopkinton fire and rescue teams confirmed.

The initial alert on Monday described the woman as white, with fair skin complexion, strawberry blonde-red hair, and blue eves.

She was described as

between 18 and 30 years old, about 5 feet, 1 inch tall, and weighing around 111 pounds.

An autopsy showed that Maiorano died from blunt impact head injuries, but there is no word on how she got those injuries and the manner of death has not been determined.

Tuesday evening, state police arrested Thomas Shane Hanley, 30, of Henniker, in connection with the case. He is charged with conduct after

an accident, breach of bail and stalking. News 9 is waiting to learn what led to those charges. At this time, authorities are not commenting on the relationship between him and Maiorano.

Almost three patients ag cording to Congress of The study a fices, hospit U.S. adults mon reason

Almost three-quarters of antibiotics prescriptions to patients aged 65 years or older are inappropriate, according to a study presented at last year's European Congress of Clinical Microbiology & Infectious Diseases. The study analyzed over 7 billion visits to doctor's offices, hospital clinics and emergency departments by U.S. adults and children over 7 years. The most common reasons for inappropriate prescriptions were for

illnesses that are not caused by a bacterial infection such as non-bacterial skin conditions, viral respiratory tract infections, and bronchitis. Antibiotic prescribing remains far higher in the U.S. than in many other countries, despite efforts to reduce inappropriate prescribing. An estimated 80-90% of antibiotic use occurs in the outpatient setting, and in 2020, almost 202 million courses of antibiotics were dispensed to outpatients in the U.S. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates that at least 30% of outpatient antibiotics are unnecessary (no antibiotic was needed), and up to 50% of antibiotics are inappropriately prescribed (unnecessary use and inappropriate selection, dosing and duration).

A large cohort study found that babies born to men who took metformin during the period of sperm development were at increased risk for birth defects, specifically genital defects in boys. These finding suggest that men with diabetes who are taking metformin should talk to their doctors about whether they should switch to another treatment when trying to conceive a child. However, because diabetes control also affects sperm quality, discontinuing metformin treatment could also affect birth outcomes. The findings are published in *Annals of Internal Medicine*. Diabetes increasingly occurs in people of reproductive age, compromises sperm quality, and is associated with impaired male fertility. Some diabetes drugs may also affect male reproductive health.

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HOW HOME STANDBY GENERATORS ADD SAFETY AND SAVINGS: PART I

If you've experienced a power outage, you know how inconvenient it is. While a couple of hours without electricity may be a nuisance, any longer can become costly in many ways — and the level of impact depends on the length of the outage, which is completely out of your control.

By: Joyce Bosse From the aging power grid to severe weather events, power outages lasting over an hour or two are increasing, no matter where you live: According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, electricity customers experienced an average of eight hours of power outages in 2020, causing many to seek solutions like home standby generators.

While storms have historically played a big part in the demand for home standby generators, things like aging grids, rolling brown-outs and the work-from-home trend are just a few of the reasons that there has been a significant sales growth in standby generators in recent years, and this growth is expected to continue.

If you don't have a home generator to keep your power on during an outage, what consequences could you face?

How a power outage can impact your pocketbook

Losing power creates problems you may not anticipate. This can include community-wide issues like disruptions to communication, transportation and business as well as individual household issues that are a major inconvenience to your family. An extended power outage could result in food spoilage including meats, dairy and eggs; no lights, heating, air conditioning, running water or sewage pumps; repairs due to flooding/ frozen pipes; mold and necessary removal; risk of intrusion if your security system is inoperable; interruptions to work/study; and even the cost of hotel stays for comfort and safety.

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CARBS, SUGARY FOODS MAY INFLUENCE POOR ORAL HEALTH



The foods we eat on a regular basis influence the makeup of the bacteria — both good and bad — in our mouths. And researchers are finding that this collective of bacteria known as the oral microbiome likely plays a large role in our overall health, in addition to its previously known associations with tooth decay and periodontal disease.

Dr. Esin Narii Scientists from the University at Buffalo have shown how eating certain types of foods impacts the oral microbiome of postmenopausal women. They found that higher intake of sugary and high glycemic load foods — like doughnuts and other baked goods, soft drinks, breads and non-fat yogurts — may influence poor oral health and, perhaps, systemic health outcomes in older women due to the influence these foods have on the oral microbiome.

In the study, researchers investigated whether carbohydrates and sucrose, or table sugar, were associated with the diversity and composition of oral bacteria in a sample of 1,204 postmenopausal women using data from the Women's Health Initiative.

The research team reported positive associations between total carbohydrates, glycemic load and sucrose and Streptococcus mutans, a contributor to tooth decay and some types of cardiovascular disease, a finding that confirms previous observations. But they also observed associations between carbohydrates and the oral microbiome that are not as well established.

The researchers observed Leptotrichia spp., which has been associated with gingivitis, a common gum disease, in some studies, to be positively associated with sugar intake. The other bacteria they identified as associated with carbohydrate intake or glycemic load have not been previously appreciated as contributing to periodontal disease in the literature or in this cohort of women.

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Antrim man survives lightning strike - refuses hospital

Antrim Fire & Ambulance were dispatched Friday June 2nd to 29 Old Turnpike Road for a house struck by lightning. This was initially a first alarm assignment and arriving companies found issues with the electrical circuits in the kitchen. Owners reported after the lightning strike that sparks were coming out of the light fixtures. The entire house was checked with a thermal imaging camera in

the kitchen area.

Companies shut off the breakers and de-energized the kitchen area with the homeowner instructed to contact an electrician.

While clearing that incident, they were dispatched several houses down the road to 19 Old Turnpike Road for a male patient who had been struck by lightning.

The patient had been standing inside his garage when another nearby lightning strike had traveled through the ground knocking the patient to the floor. Upon arrival the patient was alert and oriented and Antrim Ambulance assessed the patient, assessing vital signs and doing an EKG, but he refused transport to the hospital.

During the thunderstorm, it appears that there had been three different lightning strikes in that area of Old Turnpike Road.

Killer of Franklin woman and daughter had violent criminal history

The man who killed himself after shooting his girlfriend and 1-year-old daughter to death in Franklin over the weekend had a violent past and was sentenced to at least 18 months in state prison on drug and weapon charges, according to court records. (See Story on page 1). Previous charges against Jamie Bell, 42, included a 2008 burglary in Merrimack and using a Ford F-150 a decade later to ram into a vehicle with his ex-girlfriend in it in Franklin.

Bell was sentenced on multiple charges of being a felon in possession of dangerous



Franklin man arrested for threatening a U.S. Senator

Brian Landry, 66, of Franklin, was arrested Friday morning by the FBI and charged with threatening to assault, kidnap or murder a U.S. Senator.

In an affidavit, an FBI special agent said Landry allegedly left a voicemail in May for a U.S. Senator in which he said he was a veteran sniper.

"And unless you change your ways, I got my scope pointed in your direction, and I'm coming to get you," Landry said in the voicemail, according to the affidavit. According to the affidavit, investigators determined that the phone number belonged to Landry.

When Landry was interviewed by the FBI, he allegedly admitted calling the senator's office but didn't recall exactly what he said.

When the agent told him what was said in the message, Landry allegedly said he might have said that, but he never wanted to commit violence against the senator or anyone else.




