

The large white tent provided needed shelter from the downpour during this year's ceremony. H-D Principal Jim O'Rourke welcomed all the the festivities, Class President Courtney Ford invited her classmates bound for military service to join her in leading the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by the band's rendition of

the national Anthem.

In her remarks, Ford reminded her classmates of the closeness they have shared and asked them to "Remain just a text away." Superintendent Dr. Jennifer Crawford urged the class of 2023 to "set your own goals," and challenged them to achieve them.

Valedictorian Madison told her

classmates that "Even the best sunrises have clouds," and urged them to "look beyond them and stay positive."

In his Faculty address, Alex Luhtjarv cautioned that "Life often doesn't move in a straight line, so be prepared for those hair pin turns."

The upbeat ceremony ended with a flurry of red caps tossed into the air.

### Slain woman's ex-husband warned of killer's violent tendencies

Nicole Hughes' ex-husband Christopher Kelly says he tried for years to block his daughter from having contact with her mother's boyfriend, fearing something bad would happen one day.

Kelly's daughter, Abrianna, is the 5-year-old girl who was shot by Jamie Bell last weekend in Franklin and had to spend time in a Boston hospital. She has since been released after treatment for wounds to her arm and back.

After last weekend's tragedy, Kelly wonders why Bell was not still locked up after being charged with multiple felonies, especially given their violent nature.

Kelly said he filed motions in family court, sent letters and called various state agencies in efforts to make sure Abrianna, who goes by Brina,

was safe. He wasn't happy about the responses he said he received. "Nobody would listen to me," Kelly said.

Kelly was married to Nicole when they had Abrianna together. They divorced. He is now engaged to be married to Crystal Hardy, who previously dated Bell.

Hughes and Kelly co-parented Abrianna. They were all friends, Kelly said.

### Land Preservation Trust acquires 71.66 Bradford acres

Following a year-long fundraising campaign, Ausbon Sargent Land Preservation Trust has purchased 71.66 acres of land in the town of Bradford, to protect the Bradford Bog headwaters, the Abenaki ancient healing springs site, and the Atlantic White Cedar bog and wildflower sanctuary. It is "highest ranked" wildlife habitat and is an important regenerating forest, a haven for many threatened species of birds. The USDA calls this property one of the most ecologically significant forest blocks in New England.

This project was first made possible by assistance from Mike Andrews, who purchased the property and held title to it until the Land Trust could raise the funds to purchase it. Donations were provided by Ausbon Sargent members and private donations from the citizens of the Town of Bradford, the Rural Heritage Connection of Bradford, NH, and the Bradford Conservation Commission. Additional support was provided by Burton Morgan Foundation, the Quabbin to Cardigan(Q2C) Partnership, the Fields Pond Foundation, the NH Moose Plate Grant, and another anonymous foundation. In December 2022, the New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) provided a leadership-level grant for this project in the amount of \$80,000.

### New London working on Wage Survey and Classification Study

Town Administrator Kim Hallquist informed the New London Select Board that work has started on the Wage Survey and Classification Study. Carol Granfield of MRI has the town's job descriptions, personnel policies, grade scale and Selectmen's Compensation Philosophy and she is reviewing that. In the coming weeks department heads will meet with Granfield to discuss the process. Employees will be asked to submit information on their jobs to ensure that job descriptions are accurate for what the employee is actually doing. Eventually the project will come before the Selectmen for a discussion of the project.

Colin Beasley asked if there will be a discussion of the towns used prior to the recommendations by the consultant to ensure that the positions used are comparable. As examples he noted that some towns have town managers while New London has a town administrator and some public works directors have responsibility for highway, sewer and transfer station and some towns do not have sewer.

Ms. Hallquist agreed that the consultant takes those differences into consideration, and it is why the job description portion of the project is at the start of the project. Mr. Beasley stressed that he felt that a review of the job descriptions is important in order to get valid data for comparison.

Staff will meet with the consultant, but it will not be done at a public meeting, although a selectman may decide to attend. Ms. Hallquist stressed that much of the work is done in the office via phone calls with the consultants, however reports on the work of the consultant will be given at selectmen's meetings and the consultant will attend a meeting and will be able to explain her methods of comparing the various positions to other towns.

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

# Hopkinton's 67 graduates included 5 sets of twins

Friday's traditional Hopkinton High School Graduation was again in the Durgin Pulling Arena.

Salutatorian Ruby Doolan recalled the changes the class has seen over the years, and compared the path that students have taken to the orbit of the moon, saying each "would not be possible without a delicate balance."

Commencement speaker Rob Rothe recalled that about one-third of the graduating class had been on at least one of the three teams that he coaches – track and field. cross-country and Nordic skiing – and drew lessons from that experience.

"Whatever sport you play is like life. You get out of it what you bring," he said. "You show up, every day, you put the effort into it, and you see the result."

"You choose your path, but stay open. Sometimes the path chooses you," Rothe said. He cited two years in Africa with the Peace Corps when he wasn't sure what to do, and then talked of becoming a coach for the first time at age 45. "The excitement lies in the unknown. ... Challenges are exciting but they can also be unnerving. Just keep challenging yourself."

Superintendent of Schools Michael Flynn said that he has been part of at least 30 graduations over the years and

dreaded the thought of being predictable. "I can guarantee that nobody woke up this morning and said, 'I can't wait

to hear what the superintendent has to say," he said."I went to ChaGPT and said, write a non-cliched graduation speech from a superintendent," he said. Alas, that didn't work: it suggested he talk about the road less traveled.



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
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# School Days

# TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A new study published in *Neurology*®, the medical journal of the American Academy of Neurology, suggests that antidepressant use by mothers during the first trimester of pregnancy does not increase the chances of epilepsy and seizures in babies. Antidepressants in the study included medications to treat anxiety and depression, specifically selective

serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRIs) and serotonin and norepinephrine reuptake inhibitor (SNRIs).

Meningiomas, tumors of the membranes (meninges) surrounding the brain and spinal cord, are the most common tumors of the central nervous system. Although most meningiomas are low grade and cause few or no symptoms, a subset, called high-grade meningiomas, can cause serious neurologic and cognitive problems and have high mortality rates. Meningiomas are treated with surgery and in some cases radiation, but there are few other effective therapies, and even with optimal therapy, recurrences are common: About half of all patients with intermediate (grade 2) meningiomas will have a recurrence within 5 years of treatment, and 90% of patients with the most advanced (grade 3) meningiomas will experience recurrences within 5 years. Only about half of all patients with recurrent aggressive grade 2 meningiomas and none with grade 3 disease can be expected to survive for 10 years. But researchers now report that a class of cancer drugs known as immune checkpoint inhibitors can slow disease progression and offer hope for longer survival of patients with high-grade meningiomas. They report their findings in Nature Communications.

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### HOW HOME STANDBY GENERATORS ADD SAFETY AND SAVINGS: PART II



Home standby generators differ from portable generators. Portable generators are designed for portable power needs, require manual set-up, do not turn on automatically and must be monitored for refueling every few hours. A standby generator, however, is permanently installed outside your home and connected to a natural gas or liquid propane fuel source.

Unlike portable generators used for camping or tailgating, home standby generators are designed to supply power for your entire home. They include an automatic transfer switch that seamlessly shifts your electrical circuits and appliances to the standby generator — within seconds of an outage.

With a home standby generator, you don't need to go outside or do anything to get it started. You don't even have to be present, making the generators ideal for vacation homes or for those who travel frequently. They are set up to work automatically, day or night.

How you can prepare for an outage without a portable generator: Create a home emergency kit: Preparedness experts recommend using a waterproof container to store clean drinking water, non-perishable food, flashlights and batteries, a first aid kit and more to be prepared for any emergency. See recommendations at Ready.gov/Kit.

Assemble a 'go bag': In some emergencies, evacuation is recommended or even required, so have a bag ready with items you'd need if you had to leave in a hurry. Some things will be similar to your emergency kit, plus personal hygiene items that you might need for staying in a shelter or hotel. It should be small enough that you can carry it.

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### ACIDS IN SUGAR-FREE BEVERAGES COULD ERODE TOOTH ENAMEL



New research finds acids in sugar-free beverages could erode tooth enamel, as a recipe mixing flavored sparkling water with balsamic vinegar to create a so-called "healthier" alternative to soda takes TikTok by storm.

The research adds to our understanding about the importance of limiting consumption of acidic beverages. The TikTok video that features adding balsamic vinegar (an acid) to flavored sparkling water (an acidic beverage) recently received more

than 6.3 million views.

Acidic foods and beverages can wear away the enamel that protects teeth, a process known as tooth erosion. Tooth erosion is permanent and may open the door for bacteria to cause cavities or infection. It can also make teeth appear discolored, as white enamel is worn away to expose the yellow layer below called dentin.

In the study, researchers wanted to see whether non-carbonated bottled water, flavored sparkling water and plain sparkling water might cause dental erosion. Recently extracted human teeth were soaked in 7 different sugar-free beverages (and one soda with sugar for comparison) to see which, if any, beverages caused erosion. Teeth were exposed for twenty-four hours, which the researchers considered to replicate a year's worth of exposure to these beverages.

When measuring the results of soda with sugar versus sugar-free soda, they found acids in both caused dental enamel to erode. Sweetener type was less of a factor, as it was the acid in the beverage that eroded the enamel.

Researchers also observed erosion in flavored sparkling waters, though it was less than that observed for sugar-containing and sugar-free soda. The only beverages in the study that did not erode enamel were non-carbonated, non-flavored bottled waters.

- 1. Letter to AWE regarding failure to comply with Agreement (Discuss next meeting)
- 2. Winter storm debriefing of what went wrong and right with all Department Heads.
- 3. Organize our approach to moving forward with the Stewardship Plan completed last year in preparation for 2023 CIP Funding for Town Buildings.
- 4. Bring a resolution to the Tri-Town gravel pit Agreement with Bennington and

Francestown. No action since 2019.

- 5. Address the Grapevine Lease renewal with an eye toward physical needs pointed out in the Stewardship Plan (Lease Expires in 2023?)
- 6. Conduct a review of all our written general and financial policies and procedures -update and correct as needed or create ones if there are none. See audit comments.
- 7. Ensure that all 2022 employee reviews are complete, reviewed by Russ and signed by all parties.
- 8. Discussion on developing a schedule for any sale of tax deeded (eligible) or town properties that have no future benefit to the Town.
- 9. Discussion of reviewing our Antrim Gym/Shea Field Agreements to identify any changes to be discussed with SAU l-Budget & Properties

Committee (Reviewed annually in July?)

10. Discuss our assessment process - talk about our LUCT process with our building inspector to perhaps design a better identification system between departments and how we might update values that have no trespassing signage. It's a John Hatfield discussion. 11. Discuss what should be added to our Town.

The other members agreed to review the suggestion and place it on the agenda for the next meeting.

It is traditional, at this time of year, for just about anyone to offer you his or her sage advice on what to do with the rest of your life. Here, for what it's worth, is my contribution. LDB

GET OUT OF TOWN: Your hometown has nurtured and supported you all these years, but it has also limited your perspective on the world around you.

EXPLORE NEW HORIZONS: This great country has a lot to offer, much of which you have not experienced. Explore, discover, grow.

CHALLENGE STEREOTYPES: Much of what you "KNOW," you actually just suspect, based on the limits of your education, upbringing and environment. Stereotypes breed prejudice which breeds bigotry. Challenge them at every opportunity.

CHERISH DIVERSITY: America owes its greatness, in large part, because it has been a melting pot of races, cultures and ideas. Different is not divisive. Reach out and understand what your fellow man has to offer.

LISTEN: Just like in class, too often our misunderstanding of the other person's position results from the fact that we just were not listening. I've always learned more with open ears than with an open mouth.

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# Sunapee Harbor reopened after fuel spill

Sunapee Harbor on Lake Sunapee has reopened as of Wednesday. It was closed since Saturday after a spillage from a parked boat.

The Sunapee Fire Department was dispatched before 5 p.m. on Saturday to a call in the harbor for fuel spillage, which occurred due to fuel overflowing from a parked boat in the harbor.

The Sunapee Fire Department, New Hampshire DES and Newbury Fire Department contained the spill to the Harbor, keeping it from flowing downstream.

There is no danger to the public or the town water supply, according to authorities. Authorities said a containment boom was set up in the harbor restricting boat traffic. All harbor businesses remained open.

Authorities said New Hampshire DES and the town of Sunapee continued to monitor and test the water supply as clean-up continued.

There is still a "very mild contaminated area," Town Manager Shannon Martinez said, but the town beach is expected to reopen on Thursday.

# Groups working to keep Warner Food Pantry open

The Warner Select Board has been discussing what to do if Warner Connects, which manages the Food Pantry, decides to close its doors. The Community Action Program (CAP) of Belknap-Merrimack Counties previously managed the facility and has indicated that it is prepared to take over, if needed.

If CAP takes it over, it will ensure there's no interruption in service. Meg Whitmore, another former Food Pantry volunteer, said she's been talking with various organizations that could also help with food insecurity issues in the future, including Kearsarge Regional Food Hub, Kearsarge Neighborhood Partners, and Sweet Beet Market. Whitmore said since possible "fraudulent activities" at Warner Connects became known, she and other volunteers have worked to keep the Food Pantry functioning. But since then, all have resigned.

At this time, she said she believes the current leadership of Warner Connects, "while well-intentioned," does not have the skills required to operate a Food Pantry. She said she's not denigrating anyone, but there are certain skills required to operate a Food Pantry and the team put together by Sue and Dan Morrison would be able to do the job. Whitmore also said she's spoken with the leadership of several local nonprofit organizations, and they would support any group able to oversee the Food Pantry, as long as they have "competent, professional (and) ethical" management.

## **Avanru Development seeking further Newport concessions**

Chad Brandon, P.E., representing Jack Franks from Avanru Development, introduced the project attorney, J.P. Harris of Sheehan & Finney to the Newport Select Board. Mr. Brandon said they were present to give an update on the 42 unit project and the 96 unit project and to get some feedback from the Board of Selectmen.

He spoke on staying within budget for this workforce housing project, specifically discussing a hardship for the water and sewer connections fees, for which his client did not account for. He stated that he could not find the information on the Town's website as well as no reasoning for the high fees. Mr. Brandon also stated that the Town of Newport fees were not similar to other communities, which were much lower.

He added that there were several RSA's for workforce housing to help make these projects successful. He was hoping to be able to work with the Town to address these high fees because it would be hard to make this project go forward.

He proposed that the Board consider assessing the fees to be more in line with normal fees, around \$15,000 for the water and sewer connection.



### Hillsboro officers, students and teachers carry the torch to Concord

On June 1st, 2023, Hillsboro Police officers participated in the Special Olympics Torch Run, which went from Hillsboro to Concord. This annual event is held to raise awareness and funds for the Special Olympics, an organization that provides year-round sports training and athletic competition for individuals with intellectual disabilities.

Law enforcement officers, students, teachers, and athletes carried the "Flame of Hope" torch through the streets of Hillsboro, passing it from hand to hand as they made their way towards Concord.

The torch symbolizes the courage and spirit of the athletes who participate in the Special Olympics.

Chief Parsons commented on his experience, stating that "It touches a certain part of your heart, giving back to the community while having the athletes with us." Overall, the Special Olympics Torch Run was a wonderful event that brought together law enforcement officers, athletes, and the community to support a great cause.

# Newbury Board votes to join Tri-Town Watershed Initiative

Kristin Schultz said she, Dennis Pavlicek and Whitford met with Sunapee and New London. Sunapee and New London voted to join the tri-town watershed initiative. They asked Schultz to bring it back to the Board and ask if Newbury would join.

Police Chief Brad Wheeler asked what is the direction or format. Schultz said Sunapee has a septic ordinance that they started.

Wheeler would like to see a directive and he would have no problem with joining. Jack Kutner said it is just an advisory group to have the Selectboard member present to see if things are doable or not, and come back and see what the three towns can do. The only directive that was discussed was to see what they could create, to explore what Sunapee did with the septic rules and how they did it, and the three towns will share information.

Schultz said the other towns are looking at Newbury ordinances because Newbury did a good job. Schultz made a motion to join the tri-town watershed initiative and said she would like to be the representative. It was approved.

### Bradford Select Board approves several road & bridge repairs

The Bradford Select Board was notified that following an inspection of the bridge over Hoyt Brook on Center Road between Battle's Farm and Bradford Center, the NH Department of Transportation officially recommended that the bridge be closed on May 24 and placed it on the State's Municipal Red List of deficient bridge structures.

The Board and Steve Hall also discussed the West Main Street sinkhole in the road and hole in the sidewalk. Steve Hall recommended that the Town get the Wetlands permitting done at approximately \$30K so that the permit would be in place when the Town is ready to repair it and/or should the culvert fail. The engineer (from Hoyle Tanner) recommends that the pond be lowered in anticipation of rain events to facilitate the water flow under the bridge. The Board then approved the following expenditures: Center Road Bridge: \$35K from the Emergency Road and Bridge Expendable Trust Fund and \$47K from the 2019 Road and Bridges Expendable Trust Fund; and permitting for the West Main Street culvert: \$35K from the 2019 Roads and Bridges Expendable Trust Fund.

### Belmont man connected to Franklin deaths has been arrested

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms arrested Justin Gebo, 28, of Belmont on Thursday on three firearms charges. The charges revolve around a Czech-made Ceska Zbrojovka model Scorpion EVO 3 S2, which was found at the scene of the Franklin shooting.

The investigation into Gebo is spelled out in an affidavit filed in federal court in Concord. Among the

disclosures: The Scorpion changed hands five times after its April 2019 sale at Riley's Sport Shop in Hooksett. Two of those were private sales and were unregulated and took place without background checks.

The affidavit said the gun was found at the rear yard of the home where Hughes and her daughter were found. The affidavit makes no mention of when or how Gebo's Scorpion ended up at the murder scene.



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

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### **Exhausted Franklin couple** rescued off Little Haystack summit

Bryan Morse, 29, and his wife, Samantha Nigro, 26, both of Franklin, said they began hiking up Falling Waters Trail at 1 p.m. Saturday, and had reached the summit of Little Haystack by 7:30 p.m. when they decided to reach the Liberty Springs Tent site, two miles across Franconia Ridge.

Approximately one-quarter mile past the summit of Little Haystack, the pair began feeling the effects of being cold and wet as it had been raining off and on all day.

Eventually the couple became so cold they called 911 for help. A search and rescue team from Pemigewasset Valley, along with conservation officers, hiked three miles to get to Morse and Nigro, who had made a fire by the time officials arrived at their location at 1:20 a.m. Sunday.

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


