Weare Police join Special Operations Unit

21 Central New Hampshire towns pledge mutual assistance in high risk operations

The Weare Select Board approved a memorandum of understanding (MOU) for the Weare Police Department to become part of the Central New Hampshire Special Operations Unit.

The purpose of the unit, as defined in the MOU, is to provide mutual law enforcement assistance and/or logistical support to the city/town governments party to this agreement in highrisk situations including drug raids, hostage rescue, barricaded suspects, search and rescue, or other situations requiring exceptional police actions which are beyond the normal resources and/or capabilities of any department.

Including Weare, there will be 21 team communities with some of the closest being Bow, Bradford, Concord, Dunbarton, Henniker and the Merrimack County Sheriff Department.

When asked about assistance from the N.H. State Police, Chief Moore said the agreement didn't rule out calling the state police, but they are already spread thin and cannot always respond. At Chief Moore's request, the board discussed and took action on two parking issues.

The first will allow the police department to put up temporary "Handicapped Only" parking signs in the spaces on East Road near the gazebo for special events such as the Patriotic Celebration.

The second will allow permanent "No Parking" signs on Sugar Hill Road South on the opposite side of the road from Ilsley's Ice Cream Stand.

Motorcycle crashes in Franklin trying to elude police

Two people were hurt after they tried to get away from officers on a stolen motorcycle.

Franklin Police said they tried to make a traffic stop on Hill Road around 1:00 a.m. last Friday.

The operator sped away but crashed

near Laconia Road and Church Street. Police said both people on the motorcycle had active arrest warrants from several agencies.

They were both transported to a hospital to receive treatment for injuries that were not deemed to be life-threatening, police said.

Officers said the motorcycle's operator, Brandon Janak, 29, was also carrying meth and fentanyl, and he will face felony drug charges. The motorcycle had been stolen out of Farmington in May.

Warner Corridor Committee recommendations to the Select Board

At their summary presentation to the Warner Select Board, the Corridor Committee put forward the following recommendations regarding the corridor between the village center and the Exit 9/Intervale district:

• Based on the research, educational speakers, discussions, and a survey answered by over 500 people, the Corridor Committee recommends pursuing the NHDOT TAP Grant and continuing to pursue the implementation of some sort of alternative transportation accommodation.

• It is not recommended at this time to put forth any warrant article for Town Meeting concerning the corridor/sidewalk/multi-use path.

• It is not recommended to make any changes at this time to the funds that are currently held in the 2 Capital Reserve Funds for transportation alternative projects.

• It is recommended that the

Select Board and the Corridor Committee hold a joint public meeting to provide the findings of the Corridor Committee, survey results to the public and to inform the public about other transportation alternative projects and how they will coordinate with each other.

• It is recommended that the Corridor Committee continue to work until recommendations have been made for Town Meeting 2024.

• Should a warrant be considered, it should include all necessary and sufficient funding for both matching funds and the project.

• And, should the project move forward in 2024, the entire project should be Page 16 of 16 included in the warrant article to include the full match necessary to secure 80% of the funding from Federal Highway sources.


• It is recommended that the Corridor Committee come back to the Select Board at a future meeting to provide a more robust report on findings and presentation of data and survey results.

• It is recommended that the Select Board, following the future report by the Corridor Committee, assist with next steps and public engagement about the process going forward. • It is recommended by the Corridor Committee, should the project move forward, that the project study process have significant public input in the development of the project and contain all options for the project including a 'no build' alternative and a charrette so that people can have visual concepts of streetscapes to understand impacts more fully.

Despite the overwhelming demonstration of need and support this project garnered over the past two decades, at the 2023 Town Meeting, petitioned Warrant Article 6 narrowly passed 104 - 96 "to cease pursuit of development of sidewalk/multi-use path on Route 103."

Public support needed for proposed Newbury Fire Department History Museum

The Newbury Fire Department Benevolent Association is seeking donations to fund the construction of a small Fire Dept. Museum on town property alongside the Velie Memorial Playground adjacent to the new fire station.

Highlights of the project are as follows:

• The project will be constructed with private funds and some donated labor - no town funding.

• The building consists of a single bay garage with exterior covered porch area.

• The museum will house the department's antique fire truck and portable fire hydrant as well as additional historic items.

• In the 1980's and 1990's the antique fire truck was restored with private funds and donated labor, including major time commitments by fire dept. members Jim Drewniak and Kevin Walker who passed in 2002 and 2006, respectively. Currently the fire truck is only occasionally displayed to the public, primarily on Old Home Day.

• The fully restored and operational fire engine is a 1942 Chevrolet truck with a pump and hose bed salvaged from the town of Newbury's original 1927 fire truck (the town's first fire engine).

• Expansive glass around the building will allow visitors to the playground and museum to easily view the antique fire truck and other exhibits inside the museum.

• Exterior display boards in the open covered porch area will provide a history of the Newbury Fire Dept. and the items displayed in the museum, as well as fire department membership recruitment information.

• Tours inside the museum

will be available upon request and during certain designated times throughout the year.

• Building design allows for easy entrance/exit of the antique fire truck so it can participate in special events including parades. Help us celebrate the richness of Newbury Fire Department's history and enable community residents and visitors to view the historic gems of the department on a regular basis.

Warner man indicted for theft by deception in two counties

A Warner man was indicted in two counties for allegedly falsely representing that he was a licensed asbestos abatement professional.

According to the New Hampshire Attorney General's Office, Jordon M. Dunne, 27, of Warner, was indicted in both Sullivan and Grafton counties for felony counts of theft by deception and attempted theft by deception.

On June 16, a Grafton County grand jury indicted Dunne on two Class A felony charges of attempted theft by deception. Between January 1, 2020 and January 31, 2020, Dunne allegedly attempted to obtain funds of more than \$1,500 by falsely representing that he was a New Hampshire-licensed asbestos abatement professional and that building samples obtained from a Lebanon business were sent to a lab and tested positive for asbestos. Then, on June 20, a Sullivan County grand jury indicted him on two Class A felony charges of theft by deception. Between June 22, 2022 and July 31, 2022, Dunne obtained funds of more than \$1,500 by falsely representing that he was a New Hampshire-licensed asbestos abatement professional and that building samples obtained from a Claremont residence were sent to a lab and tested positive for asbestos, prosecutors allege. Dunne was also charged in Sullivan County with two Class A misdemeanor charges for unfair and deceptive business practices in violation of the state's consumer protection act and one Class A misdemeanor charge of theft by deception related to the same transactions.

If convicted, Dunne faces up

to 15 years in the New Hampshire State Prison and a \$4,000 fine on each felony charge and 12 months in the county house of corrections and a \$2,000 fine on each misdemeanor charge.

Fleeing vehicle crashes after 130 mph high speed pursuit in Bow

On June 22, 2023, at approximately 10:23 p.m., a trooper assigned to Troop D observed a vehicle traveling at 109 mph and swerving erratically on Interstate 93 northbound in Bow. The trooper attempted to stop the vehicle as it took the ramp to Interstate 89 northbound, but it failed to stop and increased its speed to 130 mph.

The trooper did not pursue the vehicle but observed that it took Exit 2 into Concord and then lost sight of it. Another trooper who was just leaving the Troop D barracks observed a vehicle stop on the side of the road by the barracks and shut its lights off. The trooper quickly realized that it was the vehicle that had just fled, but when the operator saw the trooper, he started driving again and actually turned in towards the parking lot of the Troop D barracks. It appeared, however, that the operator then saw the State Police sign and realized where he was. He turned back out of the parking lot and another attempt was made to stop the vehicle. Once again, the vehicle did not stop, and a pursuit ensued.

The vehicle continued to operate erratically and at varying speeds as it attempted to elude troopers, even crossing a median on two occasions. It eventually struck a concrete curb on Manchester Street in Concord and crashed on the Merrimack River Bridge where the operator was taken into custody. No other vehicles were struck or damaged as a result of this operator's behavior.

The operator was identified as Gabriel Lima, age 24, of Lawrence, MA, who was transported to a hospital with minor injuries.

As a result of this incident, Lima was charged with a number of crimes to include Aggravated DUI – Class A Misdemeanor (x3), Reckless Conduct – Class B Felony (x2), Disobeying An Officer – Class A Misdemeanor, Operating Without a License, Subsequent Offense – Class A Misdemeanor, and Crossing a Median (x2). The crash as well as its causing factors is still under investigation.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Aspirin therapy, as opposed to statin use, for non-obstructive coronary artery disease does not reduce major cardiovascular events, according to a new study published in the journal Radiology: *Cardiothoracic Imaging*. Coronary artery disease is the most common type of heart disease, affecting roughly 6.7% of U.S. adults, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Coronary artery disease occurs when there is a buildup of plaque in the arteries that supply

blood to the heart. Coronary artery disease puts people at a higher risk for major adverse cardiovascular events, including heart attack and death. Non-obstructive coronary artery disease occurs when there is less than 50% stenosis, or narrowing, of the coronary arteries due to plaque buildup. Coronary CT angiography (CCTA) is often recommended as a first-line test to detect plaque. Medications called statins are commonly prescribed for patients who are diagnosed with non-obstructive coronary artery disease. Statins reduce the production of low-density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol and draw cholesterol out of plaque, therefore stabilizing the plaque and reducing the risk of it rupturing. Aspirin is another drug that is commonly recommended.

One of the greatest frustrations regarding urinary tract infections (UTIs) is that they so often recur. UTIs are caused by bacteria in the urinary tract and characterized by frequent and painful urination. A round of antibiotics usually clears up the symptoms, but the relief is often temporary: A quarter of women go on to develop a second UTI within six months. Some unfortunate individuals get UTIs over and over, and require antibiotics every few months. A new study published in *Nature Microbiology* suggests that women who get recurrent UTIs may be caught in a vicious cycle in which antibiotics given to eradicate one infection predispose them to develop another. Repeated cycles of antibiotics wreak havoc on the community of helpful bacteria that normally live in the intestines, the so-called gut microbiome. The findings highlight the importance of finding alternatives to antibiotics for treating UTIs.

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CONSUMING ACIDIC FOODS AND BEVERAGES

Dr. Esin Narii People find carbonated beverages refreshing. Enjoy them in moderation and preferably with meals. But if you're looking for a glass of something that is actually good for your dental health, regular water, including fluoridated tap water, or milk are always good options. The American Dental Association offers these tips to reduce tooth erosion from acidic food and beverages:

- Use a straw, sip and swallow do not swish or hold it in your mouth longer than you need to.
- Wait an hour before brushing to give saliva a chance to naturally wash away acids and re-harden enamel.
- Rinse with water, drink milk or enjoy a snack of cheese right afterward. Dairy and other calcium-rich foods can help neutralize acids.
- Keep saliva flowing to keep acids under control and protect your teeth. You can do so by chewing sugarless gum.
- Look for dental health products like enamel erosion control toothpaste and sugarless gum with the ADA Seal of Acceptance, which indicates the product has been rigorously and independently evaluated by dental experts.
- Practice good oral health every day: Brush twice a day with fluoride toothpaste, clean between your teeth daily with floss or another interdental cleaner, eat a healthy diet that limits sugary foods and beverages, and visit a dentist regularly.






