Local barbers giving free back-to-school haircuts for the less fortunate

Henry Proctor, who owns Mane Street Barber Company with shops in Hillsboro and Antrim is helping kids who may be tight on money get a free haircut before the start of the new school year. One day a group of kids came in that made Proctor want to give back. "There were probably three to four of

them. They all got haircuts and there was one kid who was left out. I was like, 'Are you next?' He said, 'I wish, but I just can't afford it. We never have money.' That just crushed me," Proctor said.

So far, Proctor and Lizzy Nute have cut up to 30 kids' hair for free and are doing it until the end of August.

"Just goes to show that there's that many kids who wouldn't have a haircut for school," Proctor said.

Proctor and Nute have a message for those who need a free haircut but aren't sure about coming in.

"Don't feel embarrassed, just come on over. We're glad to help," Nute said.

Weare rejects all applicants for Building Inspector

Weare Selectman Kevin Cahill said that the Board had agreed that none of the candidates for the Building Inspector position were suitable and they are going to go back to advertising for the position.

Selectman Sherry Burdick suggested several recommendations for calling towns and they have exhausted those.

Selectman Salim Blume suggested going back to New Boston and seeing if it was an option.

Town Administrator Naomi Bolton said the New Boston Town Administrator passed his decision off to the staff and they felt because their building inspector was new, they did not want to

overload him.

Chairman Frederick Hippler asked if they could repost the ad, and Bolton said they could try and send it to the building officials association.

Selectman Cahill said moving forward they should look at combining zoning and building into one position.

Non-profit group partners with Kearsarge schools for student mentoring

The Windsor-based non-profit organization Windsor County Mentors has expanded in the Kearsarge region by partnering with community groups and the Kearsarge Regional School District to start a mentoring program for students at elementary schools in New London and Bradford.

The program is currently recruiting volunteers to match with children during the upcoming school year.

“We’re going to start with that and see how it goes,” said Matthew Garcia, executive director of Windsor County Mentors.

Previously Windsor County Mentors launched a program in Claremont and Newport. While ten mentor/mentee pairs have been established, the expansion has gone slower than planned due to a lack of volunteers, Garcia said.

Windsor County Mentors

launched in the Kearsarge region by recruiting volunteers – there are around a dozen already signed up – before asking school district officials for student referrals.

Two groups – the Kearsarge Neighborhood Partners and Kearsarge Community Network – have been instrumental in finding volunteers.

Carol Conforti-Adams of the Kearsarge Community Network said that the organization was inspired to get involved, in part, after seeing data that showed the positive impact mentorship programs can have on children in a community.

Children who have mentors, for example, are less likely to engage in risky behavior like drug use.

“The whole idea with mentoring is positive role modeling and the more positive role models we can have out there,

the less dysfunction we will see in people,” Conforti-Ad-

ams said. Mentors may be able to help tap into childrens’

interests and inspire them in their future career plans.

In the process of hiring a new Fire Chief Deering's Road Agent resigns

On the heels of hiring a new fire chief and reorganizing that department, Deering now faces problems in the Highway Department.

Last week, Road Agent Brian Houghton submitted his resignation, effective August 24, citing no reasons.

It is unclear if the two are connected or not, but on July 24th a group of prominent Deering residents wrote to the Select Board, in effect, demanding Houghton's resignation. They wrote,

"For seven years, Deering taxpayers have endured a steady decline of town road maintenance. This belief is so commonly held that Deering taxpayers are considering a petition for a special town meeting, prior to the 2024 town meeting, to make the Road Agent an elected position if a change in Highway Department leadership is not immediately realized."

While applauding the determined hard work of the road crew during last winter's epic snow storms and throughout this season's catastrophic rain events, the petitioner went on to say, "We have endured seven years of excuses, seven years of hand wringing and fear of reprisals. Taxpayers have tolerated seven years of a Road Agent not able to hire enough personnel or keep personnel. Whatever the excuse or explanation, seven years is ample time to demonstrate one's track record. During that time, our Road Agent has revealed much about his lack of ability as a Department Head. Taxpayers have a right to demand the best person for the job and the Selectmen have the power and the obligation to make it happen.

Further, we also ask that Selectmen take immediate action by appointing an advisory committee to:

1. Review the Town of Deering Highway Department 10 year Road Management Plan and evaluate its implementation.
2. Take part in the annual Job performance review of the Road Agent.
3. Inventory the existing

condition and maintenance history of Highway Department Equipment.

4. Review the use of the Town Pit by the Highway Department.

4. Make recommendations to improve: Road maintenance, Highway Department

moral, and Communications between the Road Agent and Selectmen."

The letter was signed by former selectmen Michelle Johnson, Ed Cobbett and J.P. Marzullo, along with Planning Board member Bob Carter and former member Bob Compton.

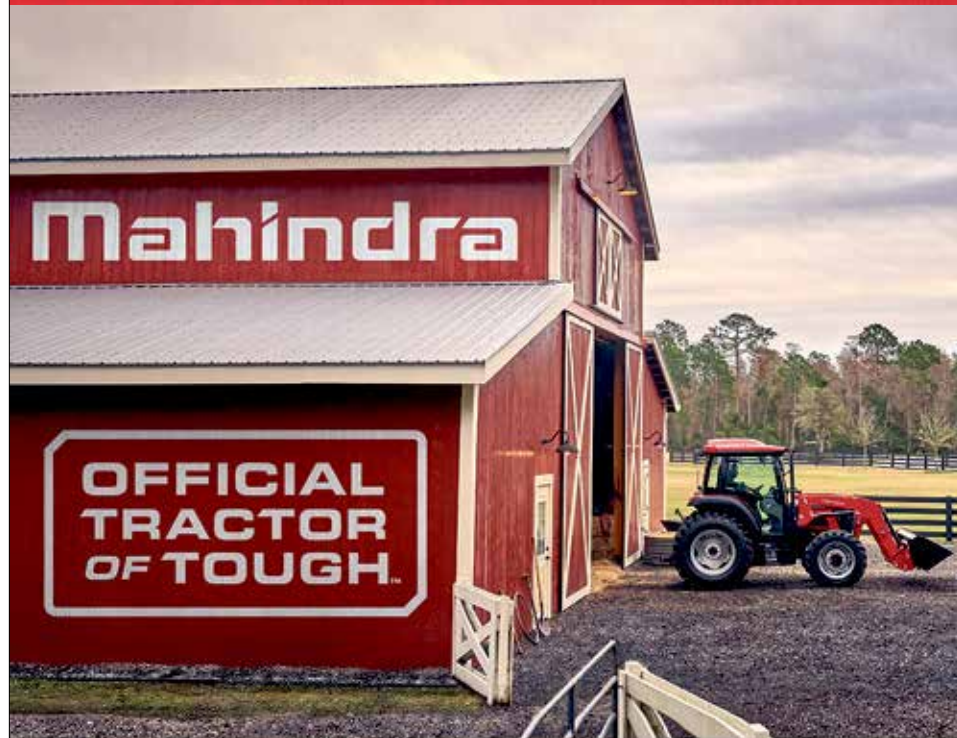

Hollis man dies of apparent drowning at Franklin Pierce Lake

State police report that a 76-year-old Hollis man died Monday on Franklin Pierce Lake in Hillsborough, the fourth death reported on NH waters in the last week.

Around 11:22 a.m. Monday, state police dispatch received a call reporting a possible

drowning on Franklin Pierce Lake in Hillsborough.

The victim, identified as Alan Morrison, 76, of Hollis, was found in the water along the shoreline of his residence by neighbors. State police said in a news release his death is considered a "possi-

ble drowning."

New Hampshire State Police Marine Patrol, state

troopers, Hillsborough Police and Fire, and Hollis Police responded, along with the state

Medical Examiner's Office. An autopsy was scheduled for Tuesday.

Henniker teen died fleeing Mass. police

A 19-year-old from Henniker died in a crash Sunday night while fleeing from police in Belchertown, MA.

Troopers said they tried to stop a car at 8:45 p.m. on Route 202, but the driver sped away. The car was being operated erratically and failed to stay within marked lanes, according to State Police spokesman David Procopio.

He said Miles Murray ran a red light and crashed into a mulch bed before the car went airborne. The car then hit a rock wall, a large tree and a

light post before striking the front end of a Jeep Wrangler that was parked in the driveway of a house at 79 North Main St.

The car's engine block was "launched out of the engine compartment," and it crashed through a nearby home and landed inside the house on the second floor, police said. The front end of the car then struck the exterior of the house on the first floor, leaving gaping holes on two levels. The driver was thrown from the car during the crash and pronounced dead at the scene.

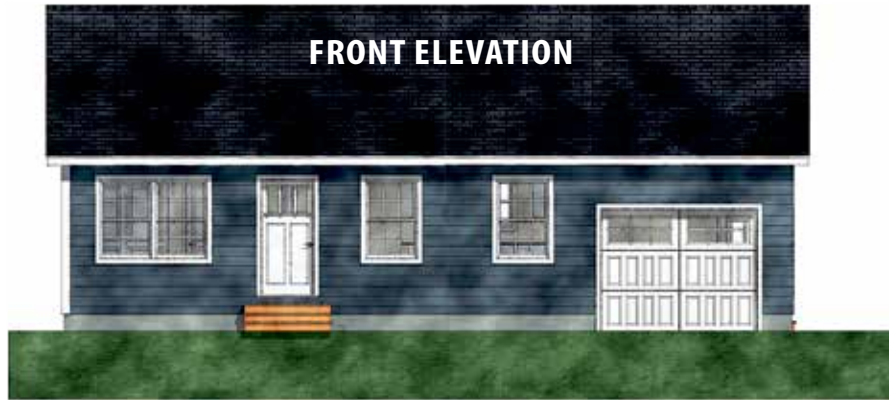

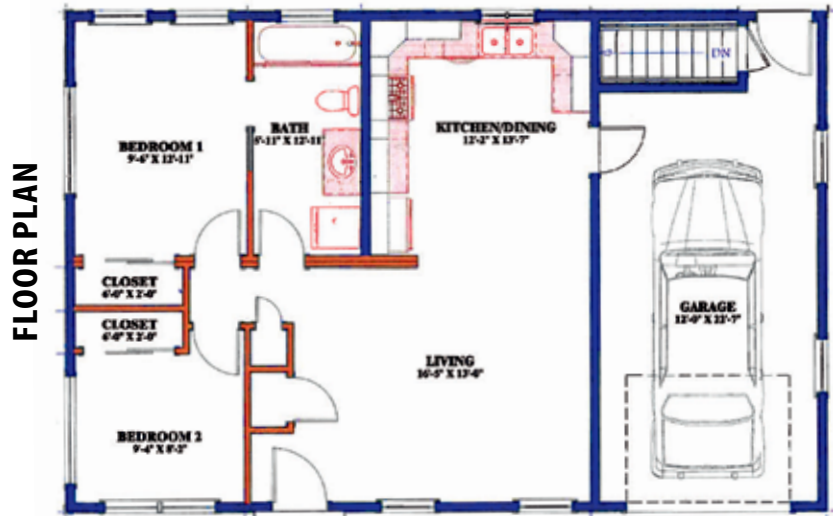

Peterborough OKs 96 housing units

Catholic Charities has received approval from the Peterborough Planning Board to build a 96-unit Catholic Charities mixed-income housing development, consisting of a 64-unit apartment building, as well as retrofitting two existing buildings on Vose Farm Road to provide 32 units. They will also restore a section of wetlands buffer by removing pavement and additional buffer impacts for the creation of emergency access,

retaining wall, drainage pond and associated grading.

George Chadwick of Bedford Design Consultants and Jeff Lefkovich, executive director of real estate services for Catholic Charities New Hampshire, originally presented the plan before the board in July but it was continued to August to give the Conservation Commission time to review it and serve in an advisory role to the Planning Board.

Henniker man killed - teen injured in two vehicle crash

On August 20, 2023, at approximately 6:10 p.m. Henniker Police, Fire and Rescue responded to a motor vehicle crash on Route 114 at the intersection of Prospect Street.

There were two vehicles involved in the crash. Unit 1, a motorcycle, operated by John Eaton, 52, of Henniker NH, was traveling south on Route 114; Unit 2, operated by Andrew Carroll, 17, of Henniker NH,

was traveling from the west side of Prospect Street to the east side of Prospect Street. Unit 1 struck Unit 2 in the driver's side rear of the vehicle. Both vehicles sustained heavy damage and sadly, Mr. Eaton was killed on impact.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to the Eaton family.

Andrew Carroll was transported for possible injuries. No further information is available.

The cause of the crash remains under investigation; however, speed appears to be a factor in the crash. The

roadway was closed for approximately three hours. Henniker Police were assisted on scene by Bradford Police and a NH State

Trooper. Any witnesses to the crash or prior to the crash are asked to contact Sgt. Matthew Mitchell, 603 428-3213.

Henniker woman indicted for Medicaid Fraud

Bridget Watson, 48, of Henniker has been charged with theft and insurance fraud and could face prison time if she's found guilty.

A grand jury returned indictments charging her with theft and two felony counts of Medicaid fraud.

The indictment alleges that between June 2020 and April 2023, Watson received \$1,500 from the NH Medicaid

Program by submitting false records, documentation and reimbursement paperwork for costs and expenses associated with Medicaid-covered services.

If found guilty, Watson could face up to 15 years in prison on theft by deception and up to 7 years in prison for both Medicaid fraud charges and would be required to pay a fine of \$4,000 per charge.

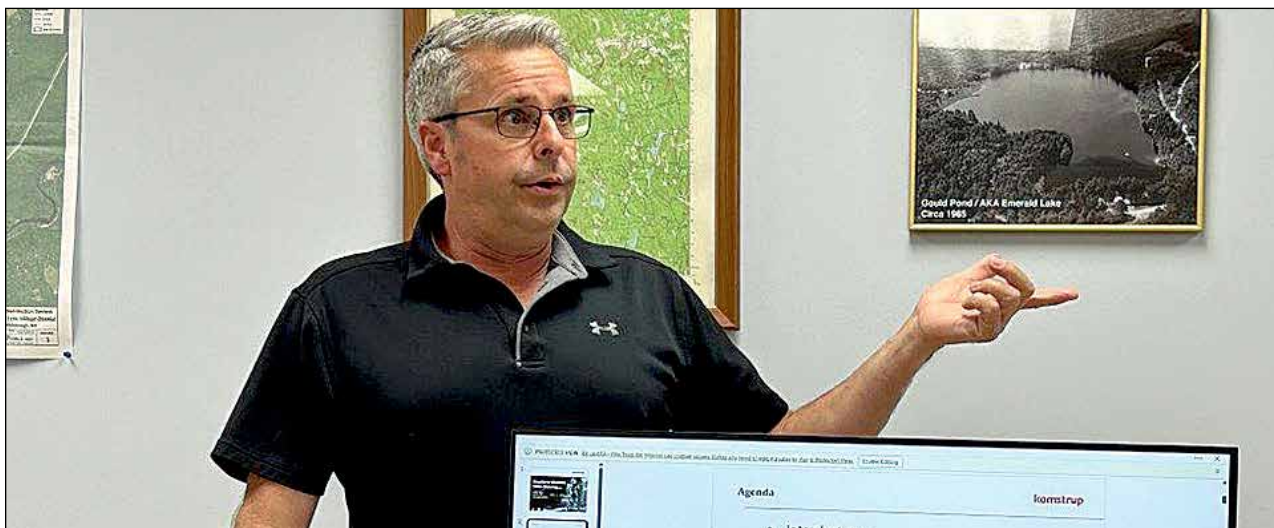

CAPITAL GAIN EXCLUSION WHEN SELLING YOUR HOME: PART I

The IRS has a special gift for you when you sell your home: You probably won't have to pay taxes on all or part of the gain from the sale. Your home is considered a capital asset. Normally, you have to pay capital gains tax when you sell a capital asset for a profit. However, if you're married and file a joint return, you don't have to pay tax on up to \$500,000 (\$250,000 for single filers) of the gain from the sale of your home if you (1) owned the home for at least two of the past five years, (2) lived in the home for at least two of the past five years, and (3) haven't used this exclusion to shelter gain from a home sale in the last two years.

So, for example, if you bought your home five years ago for \$600,000 and sold it for \$700,000, you won't pay any tax on the \$100,000 gain if all the exclusion requirements are satisfied. (Unfortunately, if you sold your home for a loss, you can't deduct the loss.) Any profit over the \$500,000 or \$250,000 exclusion amount is reported as capital gains on Schedule D.

New Boston man arrested for knife assault in Manchester



A New Boston man has been charged in connection with a Manchester stabbing last month. Manchester Police said they identified the suspect as Edgardo Molina, 34, of New Boston, who is charged with first degree assault. Warner's 3rd Select Board member to be announced Aug. 29

The Town of Warner has begun the process of filling the remaining open position on the Select Board. Interest forms from residents were accepted until 5 p.m. Wednesday. Once they compiled a list of interested applicants, members Harry Seidel and Faith Minton held in-person interviews which were open to the public.

Interviews took place on Tuesday, August 22nd, in Warner Town Hall, then Minton and Select Board Chair Harry Seidel deliberated on Friday, August 25th. They will announce their selection at the next select board meeting on Tuesday, August 29th.

As of last week, seven people indicated interest to serve on the board – Karen Coyne, Sara Colson, Dustin Chamberlain, Romeo Dubreuil, Derek Narducci, Michael Smith and Linda LeClair.

Coyne previously ran against Seidel for a seat on the Select Board in March, losing with 236 votes to Seidel's 364. During Tuesday's Select Board meeting, Danielle Young, a Warner resident, questioned the need to interview candidates when Coyne has previously earned votes from town residents. "The only ethical choice for this board is Karen," she said. No answer was given.

Newbury Board continues to discuss new Septic Rules

Newbury Selectwoman Kristen Schultz said this is part of an ongoing conversation that the Board has been having based on the tri-town initiative to try to protect the watershed in unison with the other towns. She said the bacteria levels are increasing, and there is information about fertilizers and septic systems that needs to be looked at.

David Rhodes from Lake Sunapee Protective Association has done research on towns that have done septic systems failure rates. Schultz thinks there should be septic system regulations. Chair Joanne Lord said she does not disagree. She said there are ordinances and policies in place already that they are not enforcing. She said if

there would be any cost to the Town, there would need to be a warrant article.

Schultz said the intern to do research would be free. Lord thinks this might need to go to a warrant article, and Schultz agreed. Scott Wheeler asked what the purpose of the intern would be, to which Schultz said to identify the houses that are subject to this regulation. Scott asked what houses would be impacted. Schultz explained that this would affect houses within 250' of lakes or ponds and fourth water streams. Lord then asked if eventually they want to make this town-wide. Schultz said that is a conversation they can have a later time.

Franklin may cut classes because of teacher shortage

Franklin High School is unable to offer some courses this year due to ongoing teacher shortages, and the district is working on navigating the issue many schools across the country are also facing.

Principal David Levesque said the school is short three teachers, which affects upper-level math and sci-

ence courses. "Some of those classes we will not be able to offer in-house unless a teacher arrives on campus for us," he said.

"But we've been working very closely with Lakes Region Community College to come up with some alternative options for our students."

DIET AND DENTAL HEALTH

Q: I know sugar's not good for teeth. What foods are generally good for dental health?

A: You're right about the sugar. Your mouth is full of bacteria that naturally occur there. The bacteria love sugar — and starch. And when your teeth are not thoroughly clean, the bacteria eat the sugar and starch that form a film on your teeth — the plaque. The byproduct of their eating is acid that can eat through the enamel. That's decay.

It's hard to avoid sugar entirely, and you don't have to. Fruit, milk, bread, cereals and vegetables all contain sugar. But avoid sugary snacks. The American Dental Association estimates each sugary snack results in an acid attack on your teeth of 20 minutes or more. If you feel the urge for a snack, reach for fruit, nuts, seeds raw vegetables, plain yogurt, popcorn, dill pickles and olives.

Sugar and starches eaten as part of a meal are less harmful than when eaten alone. During a meal, your mouth is producing substantial saliva, which helps wash away food particles. Avoid things like cake, chips, cookies and crackers when you're eating them by themselves. In general, eat a balanced diet, including the FDA recommended portions of break and grain, fruit, vegetables, meat, poultry and fish, and dairy — milk, cheese and yogurt. Ask your dentist for more information on healthy eating habits.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE

Intravenous treatment with omega-3 fatty acids in elderly hospitalized patients in intensive care due to COVID-19 seems to have positive effects on the ability of the immune system to cope with the virus, according to a study published in the journal *Clinical and Translational Medicine*.

Women with severe preeclampsia (severe high blood pressure) during pregnancy may be treated with extended-release nifedipine, a blood pressure-lowering medicine, daily during the labor and delivery process, according to new research published in *Hypertension*, an American Heart Association journal. Women treated with the medicine were less likely to experience dangerously high blood pressure that would require treatment with fast-acting medicines including intravenous (IV) medications. According to the American Heart Association, preeclampsia is typically diagnosed after 20 weeks of pregnancy and indicates high blood pressure measures with symptoms such as headaches, vision changes and swelling of the hands, feet, face or eyes. A diagnosis of preeclampsia with severe features typically includes systolic blood pressure (the top number in a blood pressure measurement) of 160 mm Hg or higher and/or diastolic blood pressure (the lower number in a blood pressure measurement) of 110 mm Hg or higher, and high protein levels in the urine. It affects up to 8% of pregnancies and increases the risk of stroke, liver or kidney damage and pre-term delivery (delivery before 40 weeks). Delivery of the baby is the only way to start to cure preeclampsia, and symptoms usually go away within days of delivery. However, some women continue to need blood pressure medication for six weeks after delivery or longer.

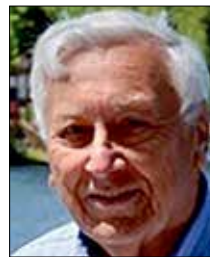
Sarah (Sally) Winlock Chase
