N.H. Library of the Year

NH Library Trustees Association honors Hillsborough's Fuller Public Library

The New Hampshire Library Trustees Association (NHLTA) was established in 1957 as a non-profit organization. Its mission is to "assist trustees to be knowledgeable and effective to serve, improve and promote New Hampshire libraries. Annually we give awards to recognize outstanding libraries, library directors, trustees, Friends groups, etc. NHLTA is always looking for persons who are interested in our mission, not only on

our board but committees.

On Saturday October, 28th, a large crowd gathered on the front lawn as the NHLTA presented a plaque to recognize the Fuller Public Library as the association's 2023 Library of the Year.

In her remarks, Marcia McLaughlin, President of the Board of NHLTA, said, "The award committee was impressed by the nomination as a whole but most especially by Fuller's programs, services and outreach into the community. Rather than read you a long list of these things, since I'd be preaching to the choir, I'll highlight just a few. Project LIFT, which I have just learned has been in existence for 30 years; the Fresh Books-Fresh Food and the newsletter which includes both library and community news as well events in the area. It is our privilege to present this award to you."

Another New London Community Gathering December 15th

Following the success of the Summer Gathering that was held on August 18th at Colby-Sawyer College, the New London Select Board is planning another gathering to update citizens on the many initiatives they are working on and to answer questions and hear the opinions and suggestions of those present. More on this in future issues.

At the Town's Annual Town Meetings in 2022 and 2023, bonds were approved

for repairs at Whipple Memorial Town Hall totaling \$786,000. The Board of Selectmen, upon the recommendation of the Finance Officer and Treasurer, decided to go to the NH Bond Bank to borrow that amount as the Bond Bank has consistently offered better rates than local banks. After a two-month application process, the Town was approved. They now await the issuance of the bond funds which will occur in February 2024. Since the town has

paid North Branch, Frank Anzalone Associates and others for the work completed at Whipple, they will be borrowing what is known as a "Bond Anticipation Loan" from a local bank. This will reimburse the General Fund for the money spent on the project while they wait for the money from the Bond Bank. Borrowing from the NH Bond Bank is a long process, which is one of the reasons they only go there for larger projects.

NH Department of Education Orphans of Veterans Scholarship Program

The New Hampshire Department of Education recently awarded a \$2,500 check to assist a child of a veteran with his college expenses. The award is part of the Orphans of Veterans program that helps war orphans offset the cost of college for items such as books and supplies.

This year's recipient is Evan Milton of Merrimack, a sophomore at the University of New Hampshire studying Health Sciences. Evan's father, James Milton, was an airman in the U.S. Air Force who passed away in 2014 from a service-related illness.

"This scholarship means so much to me, as it recognizes all that my father was able to do. These funds will also help me live independently at school and help fulfill my needs," said Evan, a 2022 graduate from Merrimack High School who hopes to eventually apply to medical school. RSA 193:19

was established in 1943 to give children of soldiers who lost their lives during World War II the opportunity to apply for a scholarship to attend college.

The program has been updated numerous times to cover other wars and conflicts through the Gulf War.

In 1981, the law was updated to allow orphaned children of veterans to also obtain free tuition to the University System of New Hampshire colleges and universities and the Community College System of New Hampshire. "It is our pleasure to assist Evan and provide him with a small amount of financial support, knowing that his father gave the ultimate sacrifice. We wish him the best of luck in college and throughout his future career aspirations," said Frank Edelblut, education commissioner.

The Orphans of Veterans program is able to issue four, \$2,500 grants each year. For

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
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New Hampshire Library Trustees Association honors Connie Kirwin

to these responses, Connie is well-known and appreciated throughout the entire NH library community."



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

John Stark High School's Dan Marcus named Civics Educator of the Year

Dan Marcus, a social studies teacher at John Stark High School in Weare, has been selected as the 2023 recipient of the Mary Susan Leahy Civics Educator Award. He was recognized at the NH Council for the Social Studies (NHCSS) annual conference on Friday, October 20th at the Grappone Center in Concord.

Trained as a lawyer, Marcus decided that he could make a bigger difference sharing his knowledge of civics and law in the classroom. While teaching social studies in Indiana, he piloted a new (at the time) civics program called "We the People," which taught students about the US Constitution and our system of government.

When he arrived at John Stark two decades ago, he noted that no civics classes were being taught, and proposed the school add "We the People" as an elective. He has been teaching it every year since. Known for making his lessons engaging and funny, he often writes songs to ensure that his students remember complex sets of facts, such as all the amendments in the US Constitution, while strumming his guitar.

Outside of the classroom, Marcus has contributed significantly to the state-wide conversation about civics over the years. In 2014, he was asked by Justice David Souter to join the Civics Task Force to help the group create its statement of purpose.

A former trustee of NH Civics, he has worked with the NH Bar to design and deliver a three-day institute for teachers on "We the People." As a contributor to the Concord Monitor and the NH Bulletin, he wrote a column called "3 Minute Civics" producing 19 articles on topics like the Electoral College and the Divisive Concepts law. He also led a



writing program last summer through the Monitor, teaching people how to write an effective letter to the editor.

"Like a good lawyer, Dan begins his class with a strategically designed presentation to persuade his students that civics matters, that they WILL use civics in their lives," said NHCSS Board member Martha Madsen in her introduction on Friday. "Dan is a model civics educator, both inside and outside of the classroom. He is most deserving of this recognition and I'm honored to call him my colleague."

New England College professor lectures at John Stark

Professor of Biology and Co-Director of the Center for Undergraduate Science Research at New England College, Dr. James Newcomb visited Ms. Zaffers' AP Biology class for two days the week of October 23.

He spoke about regeneration and its application in medicine using sea anemones and sea slugs for demonstration. He also offered tips to decoding terms they may come across in the AP exam that they may not recognize or fully understand. The students themselves will be conducting the regeneration data collection.

Their goal will be to devise a way to measure the regrowth of the oral tentacle of a sea slug that has been severed. They will monitor and collect this data for a few weeks and create an academic poster of their results.

Dr. Newcomb is also a

member of the John Stark School Board and Vice Chair of the SAU 24 School Board.

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

A Unique Veterans Day Lesson

In September of 2005, on the first day of school, Martha Cothren, a History teacher at Robinson High School in Little Rock, Arkansas did something not to be forgotten. On the first day of school, with the permission of the school superintendent, the principal and the building supervisor, she removed all of the desks in her classroom. When the first period kids entered the room they discovered that there were no desks.

'Ms. Cothren, where are our desks?' She replied, 'You can't have a desk until you tell me how you earn the right to sit at a desk.'

They thought, 'Well, maybe it's our grades.' 'No,' she said.

'Maybe it's our behavior.' She told them, 'No, it's not even your behavior.'

And so, they came and went, the first period, second period, third period. Still no desks in the classroom. Kids called their parents to tell them what was happening and by early afternoon television news crews had started gathering at the school to report about this crazy teacher who had taken all the desks out of her room.

The final period of the day came and as the puzzled students found seats on the floor of the desk-less classroom. Martha Cothren said, 'Throughout the day no one has been able to tell me just what he or she has done to earn the right to sit at the desks that are ordinarily found in this classroom. Now I am going to tell you.'

At this point, Martha Cothren went over

to the door of her classroom and opened it. Twenty-seven (27) U.S. Veterans, all in uniform, walked into that classroom, each one carrying a school desk.

The Vets began placing the school desks in rows, and then they would walk over and stand alongside the wall. By the time the last soldier had set the final desk in place those kids started to understand, perhaps for the first time in their lives, just how the right to sit at those desks had been earned.

Martha said, 'You didn't earn the right to sit at these desks. These heroes did it for you. They placed the desks here for you. They went halfway around the world. giving up their education and interrupting their careers and families so you could have the freedom you have. Now, it's up to you to sit in them. It is your responsibility to learn, to be good students, to be good citizens. They paid the price so that you could have the freedom to get an education. Don't

By the way, this is a true story. And this teacher was awarded the Veterans of Foreign Wars Teacher of the Year for the State of Arkansas in 2006. She is the daughter of a WWII POW.

Do you think this is worth passing along so others won't forget either, that the freedoms we have in this great country were earned by our U.S. Veterans?

Let us always remember the men and women of our military and the rights they have won for us.

WHAT TO DO DURING A POWER OUTAGE



Keep food cold and when in doubt, throw it out. Eat your fresh, perishable foods first. Avoid opening your refrigerator and freezer to preserve cool temperatures. An unopened refrigerator will keep foods cold for about 4 hours. A full freezer will keep the temperature for about 48 hours (24 hours if it is half full) if the door remains closed. Use coolers with ice if necessary. Measure the food temperature in your

refrigerator and freezer with a thermometer. Throw out food that has been warmer than 40 degrees F.

Prevent power overloads and fire hazards. Unplug appliances and electronics to avoid power overloads or damage from power surges. Use flashlights, not candles. Turn off the utilities only if you suspect damage or if local officials instruct you to do so. Your gas line can only be turned on by a qualified professional. If any circuit breakers have been tripped, contact an electrician to inspect them before turning them on.

Prevent carbon monoxide poisoning. Don't use a gas stove to heat your home and do not use outdoor stoves indoors for heating or cooking. If using a generator, keep it outside in a well ventilated area away from windows.

Decide if you need to stay or go. Evacuate if your home is too hot or too cold, or if you have medical devices that need power.

Communities often provide warming or cooling centers and power charging stations.

Keep away from power lines. Stay at least 35 feet away from fallen power lines and anything they are touching. Call 911 to make them aware of the damaged lines.



ANGULAR CHEILITIS

Q: What is angular cheilitis?



A: Angular cheilitis (pron. ky-LIE-tis) is a condition that develops with age. As we get older, the cells in our skin contain less water and the tissue holds less fat. One of the results is the creation of socalled "purse string" wrinkles around the lips.

In some cases, especially if the loose skin condition is exacerbated by tooth wear or tooth loss, the wrinkles can become especially deep at the corners of the mouth. If they are subjected to continued wetting and drying because of constant licking, the corners can become chapped and inflamed. This is the condition known as an qular cheilitis.

The condition can be aggravated by vitamin deficiencies, particularly by a deficiency of vitamin B2. It is not uncommon for angular cheilitis to be accompanied by an infection like candidiasis, which is the general term for conditions involving a variety of fungi referred to as yeasts.

The most common of these fungi is called candida albicans, which is naturally found in the mouth. When something throws off the natural balance involving fungi in the mouth, it's a problem. Candidiasis in the mouth is commonly referred to as thrush. Talk with your dentist to learn more about angular cheilitis and other dental conditions that come with aging.

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TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



The antiviral drug nirmatrelvir plus ritonavir (Paxlovid) was granted Emergency Use Authorization for treating COVID-19 in December 2021. In clinical trials, the antiviral was associated with an 88% reduction in hospitalization or death among high-risk, unvaccinated individuals with COVID-19. However, little was known at the time about whether Paxlovid could significantly benefit vaccinated individuals, as well as individuals infected with novel

variants of SARS-CoV-2 that were not dominant during the drug's clinical trials. By leveraging a large, well-validated, COVID-19 data repository housed within their system, Mass General Brigham researchers confirmed that the drug is associated with a 44% reduction in hospitalization or death in a highly vaccinated population of adults over the age of 50. The results, now published in *Annals of Internal Medicine*, suggest that Paxlovid can offer a substantial benefit even to vaccinated patients diagnosed with COVID-19 in the outpatient setting, and can contribute to ongoing efforts to reduce COVID-19 hospitalizations during a projected winter surge.

Patients hospitalized with fractures typically receive an injectable blood thinner, low-molecular-weight heparin, to prevent life-threatening blood clots. A new clinical trial, however, found that inexpensive over-the-counter aspirin is just as effective. The findings, published in the New England Journal of Medicine, may lead surgeons to change their practice and administer aspirin to these patients.

Fewer cases of melanoma were observed among regular users of vitamin D supplements than among non-users, a new study published in Melanoma Research finds. People taking vitamin D supplements regularly also had a considerably lower risk of skin cancer, according to estimates by experienced dermatologists.
