Pair trapped in Route 9 rollover

One occupant transported to Monadnock Community Hospital for evaluation

Last Tuesday Antrim Ambulance, Antrim Fire, and Antrim Police were dispatched to Keene Road in the area of Steele Pond for a vehicle possibly in the water, unknown if anyone was inside.

2C1 arrived on scene reporting a tractor trailer had left the roadway in the East

bound lane, went down an embankment taking down several trees then came to rest on its side with the cab partially in shallow water. There was entrapment of two occupants who did not appear to have any significant injuries. Water Rescue Task Force was also called to respond and that was cancelled. Engine companies removed the windshield to extricate the occupants. Booms were deployed in Steele Pond to mitigate any fuel or oil release which appeared to be minimal. One patient was transported to Monadnock Community Hospital for evaluation.

100 mph high speed chase through area towns

In August an officer observed a vehicle traveling at 100 mph on 202/9 and initiated a pursuit.

At times the defendant drove in the opposite lane, narrowly missing other vehicles including cruisers.

The defendant ultimately crashed the vehicle he was operating and fled on foot in Hopkinton.

During this time multiple agencies aided in the investigation, including Henniker, Hopkinton, Bow, Merrimack County Sheriff's Office, NHSP Troop D, and the NHSP helicopter.

The defendant was not located until the following morning, where he was eventually transported to the hospital. He was identified as Samuel Vachon, age 31, of Franklin.

Warrants for his arrest were issued stemming from the incident. On November 9th, he was arrested by the Laconia Police and transported to the Hillsboro Police Department for booking. Vachon was then transported to the Merrimack County House of Corrections pending arraignment.

The new Engine 2 will serve as the first due piece to motor vehicle accidents, motor vehicle fires, hazardous condition calls, and a variety of other incidents.

Also, housed in the new Engine 2 will be the recently

acquired battery-powered Holmatro vehicle extrication tools along with an array of other tools and equipment for the various calls this truck will respond to. The New London Fire Department is truly thankful for the community's support and looks forward to being able to continue to provide the best services possible to New London.

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Bradford Committee recommends demolition of Masonic Building

Committee Chair Kris Foss presented the Bradford Select Board with a slide presentation with the Committee's considerations of use of the Masonic Building.

Considerations:



Fire Department is landlocked with inadequate parking and egress for large trucks.

The Masonic building does not have a purpose that meets the needs of the Town.

The Town does not have funds for continued maintenance of an unused building.

Delaying action will cost more over time.

The Masonic Building location is highly visible in Bradford and can provide an opportunity for beatification which benefits the entire community.

When the Committee studied overlay maps and the history of the Fire Department and Masonic properties, it was found that the Fire Station is using parts of the Masonic property, with permission. This poses a problem should a third party purchase the property.

The Committee studied three paths for the building:

1. Repurpose: For the reasons stated in the consider-

ations, the Committee found no reason or method for the Town to repurpose the building.

2. Raze the building, install parking, landscaping: This option would be preceded by recovering architectural salvage for the historical society, reusing materials within the town, and selling materials to offset costs. Cost estimate for this option is \$110,000.

3. Move the building,

install parking and landscaping: This option includes selling the building to be moved by buyers. Proceeds from the sale to be used to fund paving, landscaping, and hardscaping on the site. Based on an estimate of \$50,000 sale income,

dation is that the building be sold at auction. The auction could package up any additional parcels of land the Town wants to sell. Auctioneer package includes marketing, logistics, legal services/closing. No cost to the town, 10% fee paid by buyer. There would be two options:

Option A: Buyer salvages architectural elements and razes the building. The Town funds fill, paving, and land/hardscaping. Cost estimate to the Town of \$60,000.

Option B: Buyer moves the building with proceeds from the sale funding the fill, paving, and land/hardscaping. Cost estimate, \$10,000.

Recommendation:

Approve the sale of the building by auction as outlined above.

Raise by taxation the amount of \$110,000 to raze the building, fill, pave, and land/hardscape if the auction is unsuccessful.

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

Newbury Select Board addresses transparency of Police Station renovation project

The Newbury Select Board recently discussed the Police Department Renovation Transparency. There was much public concern with the lack of transparency regarding the Police Department Renovation project, as noted in part in public meetings.

On April 17th, the Police Department Renovation Committee was dissolved by unanimous vote with the expectation that the project would be managed only by those listed in the contract, i.e., the Owner (the Town Administrator, the builder, and the architect). As noted in the

quoted motion, the April 22 meeting would be the last meeting for Committee members to attend.

It has recently come to the Select Board's attention that a member of the public (of the former committee), has been attending the meetings, which is contrary to the unanimous motion in April 2022. Although the work is above reproach, we, as a board, need to follow the motion and inform the public.

Until recently, the Select Board did not have access to any of the meeting minutes, but we do now and they are on the

website. The builder has been providing weekly construction meeting minutes and we are grateful to now be able to share those minutes with the public, on the website, under the

Police Department. If you have any questions, please contact the Town Administrator which is Diane and she has been in contact with the builder.

The project is coming in

under budget. There is a delay due to difficulty getting parts, but working to shorten the delay every day. Turnstone is very responsible, and doing a great job for the Town.

Renovation of Newbury's new Police Facility is nearing completion.

Deering Select Board approves body-worn cameras for police officers

Tom Cavanaugh met with the Select Board requesting body worn cameras for his officers. He said it is becoming the standard with all police departments and the benefit of the camera is two-fold, one for the defendant as well as the officer. Any questions of what transpired will be caught by the body camera.

The request is the purchase of five body cameras, anticipating two full-time officers and three part-time officers.

Acting Deering Police Chief The quote from Axon was for \$22,650. Currently there is a grant application pending where the State will fund 50% of the cost of body worn cameras for agencies that do not have any, which brings the Town's cost to \$11,325.



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










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


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Obituaries: Friends & Neighbors Remembered

ADOLESCENT VS. ELDERLY **DENTAL PROBLEMS**



Q: Do dental issues get better or worse as you get

A: Every stage of life has its challenges and opportunities; that applies to dental issues as well. Dental issues don't necessarily get worse as you age, particularly if you have been attentive to your teeth all your life.

Adolescents, for instance, have to deal with gingivitis, the gum inflammation that some researchers think is a by-product of hormonal change at puberty or the result of a typically teenage diet and poor oral hygiene. They may also deal with appliances their parents opt for to straighten their teeth.

The elderly, on the other hand, deal with changes like receding gums, a condition that leaves the cementum that covers each tooth's root exposed. Hence the saying, "long in the tooth" for a person who is aging. The exposed part of the tooth is susceptible to decay and to abrasion from brushing. If their oral hygiene practices have not been good through adulthood, they could also be dealing with the problem of lost teeth.

Older people are also prone to a potentially serious problem with wrinkling around the mouth, a condition that stems from skin not containing as much water and fat as a younger person's does. So, every age presents its challenges when it comes to oral health. The best way to be prepared for them is to visit your dentist regularly and practice good oral hygiene all through your life.

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Targeting a condition suffered by nearly a billion people worldwide, a new study published in the Journal of Clinical Sleep Medicine has shown that reboxetine, a drug previously used to treat depression, can reduce obstructive sleep apnea (OSA) severity. While not yet identifying a cure, the authors say the study opens up further avenues for the development of future drug treatments targeted at the huge number of people

unable to tolerate current sleep apnea therapies, such as continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP) machines.

Women with severe preeclampsia (severe high blood pressure) during pregnancy may be treated with extended-release nifedipine, a blood pressure-lowering medicine, daily during the labor and delivery process, according to new research published in Hypertension, an American Heart Association journal. Women treated with the medicine were less likely to experience dangerously high blood pressure that would require treatment with fast-acting medicines including intravenous (IV) medications. According to the American Heart Association, preeclampsia is typically diagnosed after 20 weeks of pregnancy and indicates high blood pressure measures with symptoms such as headaches, vision changes and swelling of the hands, feet, face or eyes. A diagnosis of preeclampsia with severe features typically includes systolic blood pressure (the top number in a blood pressure measurement) of 160 mm Hg or higher and/or diastolic blood pressure (the lower number in a blood pressure measurement) of 110 mm Hg or higher, and high protein levels in the urine. It affects up to 8% of pregnancies and increases the risk of stroke, liver or kidney damage and pre-term delivery (delivery before 40 weeks). Delivery of the baby is the only way to start to cure preeclampsia, and symptoms usually go away within days of delivery. However, some women continue to need blood pressure medication for six weeks after delivery or longer.

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
