Flames consume Hopkinton home

The home was engulfed in total flames when firefighters first arrived

Firefighters from around the capital region assisted Hopkinton fire and rescue teams in extinguishing a house fire on Granite Valley in Contoocook last Wednesday.

Along with Hopkinton firefighters, firefighters from Concord Engine 1 and Warner and Webster tankers were also requested. The first arriving firefighters confirmed the home was engulfed in flames at 18 Granite Valley and immediately called for a second alarm. Engines from Boscawen and Henniker were requested, along with tankers from Bow, Salisbury, and Weare, and Webster EMTs. About 15 minutes later, a re-tone was activated for firefighters to come to the area.

Firefighters spent about two hours

fighting the fire and had difficulty containing it due to the lack of fire hydrants and water in the area.

Just before midnight, firefighters were called back to the home due to a report of rekindling flames.

No injuries were reported but the house, which was built in 2022, appears to be a total loss.

Man indicted for numerous sexual assaults in Antrim

Robert Barry, 59, of Sullivan faces numerous sexual assault charges over incidents that allegedly occurred in Antrim with a minor between 1995 and 1999.

Barry was indicted November 15th in Hillsborough County Superior Court – North on charges of aggravated felonious sexual assault, without penetration, on a victim under 13; aggravated felonious sexual assault; and five counts of aggravated felonious sexual assault/pattern sexual assault.

Each of the charges is a Class B felony punishable by 10 to 20 years in prison and

a \$4,000 fine.

According to the indictment, the alleged victim was between the ages of 8 and 13 when the crimes took place. The documents state that the incidents took place over a period of two months or more within a five-year period.

Kearsarge HS students join New London Hospital LNA Program

This fall, six Kearsarge Regional High School students embarked on an educational endeavor on the floors of New London Hospital (NLH) as part of a joint LNA (Licensed Nursing Assistant) program in association with LNA Health Careers.

After completing their necessary classroom course work in the middle of September, the six students eagerly gathered at NLH every Tuesday and Thursday to apply their knowledge in a real-world healthcare setting. "This program is designed to foster a culture of learning and mentorship," says Nicole Wakeman, clinical manager of Inpatient Services.

"The students definitely arrive with some nerves in the beginning, as they have to adapt to being in the close proximity to the patients in need of their assistance, but it is our role to guide them, develop their skills, and while to see them gain confidence is rewarding for us, it is especially for them."

Ava Bidlack, a 17-year-old senior student in the program, joined the program with little knowledge of what to expect. "As a senior in high school, I'm starting to really think about my future and I do see something in the healthcare field in my future, so this is a great step," says Ava. "The nurses and staff at NLH are so welcoming and kind. A lot more happens behind the scenes than I ever realized, but they walk you through everything that I will do as an LNA."

The program, spearheaded by Melissa Smith, LPN program director at LNA Health Careers provides high school students the opportunity to start a career in healthcare at no cost, including training and licensing fees. "This is a great way for students to get into the field of healthcare while learning lifetime skills, gaining academic credit and clinical hours for the future," says Melissa. 



Consultant recommends closing Bennington's Pierce School and Francestown Elementary

The ConVal School Board scheduled a special meeting on Thursday, December 7th, at 7 p.m. in the SAU No. 1 board room, where Tatia Prieto, founder and principal of Prismatic Consulting, presented its recommendations after studying under-enrollment in the nine-town District.

It's expected that Prismatic Consulting would recommend a reconfiguration plan that would close Francestown Elementary School, Dublin Consolidated School, Bennington's Pierce School and Temple Elementary School.

These are the four smallest of the eight elementary schools in the district. The most recent enrollment numbers show 37 for Temple Elementary School, 43 for Francestown Elementary School, 55 for Dublin Consolidated School and 62 for Pierce Elementary School. Based on the recommendation, Greenfield, Antrim, Peterborough and Hancock would receive additional students. Students from each of the schools slated to close would have the choice of attending one of the two next closest schools.


"What our data is showing is that this reconfiguration would easily save the district and the voters \$2.5 million a year, and we actually believe that number could be significantly higher," Prieto said.

Prismatic also recommended that Antrim and Peterborough open before-school care and after-school care, and that the middle schools implement a world language program, which they currently don't have because they have not been able to afford it.

The ConVal School Board's special meeting Thursday, December 7, is where Prieto presented the final report. The board will hold a public forum about the reconfiguration recommendation Monday, December 11, at 7:30 p.m. in the Lucy Hurlin Auditorium at ConVal High School. If the School Board goes forward, it would create a proposal for residents of the nine towns to vote on.

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

Henniker fatality driver given 6 to 12 years

A man from Manchester was sent to prison for six to 12 years for causing the death of a woman from Henniker in April.

Matthew Malloy, 57, of Fern Lane in Manchester was driving north on Route 114 in Henniker when he crossed into the southbound lane and struck a car head-on.

The crash caused injuries to two elderly Henniker residents. One, Phyllis Anderson, 82, who was a passenger in the car, died about two weeks later. Her husband, Daniel D. DaCosta received serious injuries in the crash.

County Attorney Paul Halvorsen said several blood samples were taken from Malloy after the crash and indicated blood alcohol levels over the legal limit (0.08) and as high as 0.14.

Malloy was arrested on six felony charges. He pleaded guilty on Wednesday to negligent homicide and driving while intoxicated charges.

Halvorsen said Malloy was sentenced to a committed sentence of six to 12 years in the New Hampshire State Prison for Men on the negligent homicide charge. If he completes a substance abuse treatment program, a year could be shaved off his sentence.

His driving privileges were suspended for an indefinite period of time but no less than seven years. Malloy must also complete an impaired driving education program before he can get his operating privileges restored. If he gets his license restored, he will need to install an alcohol interlock device on his vehicle for at least five years.

On the DWI charge, he was sentenced to three and a half to 7 years in prison to be served consecutive to the other sentence. That sentence was also suspended for 10 years on the day he is released from prison. Malloy must also pay a fine of \$1,240.

Malloy should also not have contact with anyone involved in the crash or their family members.

Halvorsen said the investigation was conducted by Officer Bossi, Officer Lacombe, Lt. Dandeneau, and Chief French, all of the Henniker Police Department. Assistant Merrimack County Attorney Molly Lovell prosecuted the case with support from Victim Witness Coordinator Kelsey Heinemann.

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Goffstown woman stabbed to death by her son

A woman died at the scene of what was originally dispatched as an assault on Goffstown's Joffre Street. According to sources, the woman was stabbed multiple times and was pronounced dead at the scene. Goffstown Fire was also dispatched to the scene for a fire, which was quickly extinguished.

While police searched for the person responsible, the Bartlett School on Mast Road was placed in lockdown for the safety of the children and staff. A person of interest was identified as her son, and that person was quickly located and the school returned to normal operations.

Bow car crash on I-93 ignites exploding ammunition

One person was arrested after a crash on the northbound side of Interstate 93 in Bow on Saturday.

Around 3:00 p.m. New Hampshire State Police dispatch received a report about a driver operating a vehicle erratically. The vehicle crashed into a Jersey barrier and ricocheted across three lanes of highway. The vehicle then hit another vehicle and crashed into the woods. The vehicle struck several trees and then caught on fire.

Good Samaritans and witnesses stopped to assist, and three people inside the vehicle were able to get out. One person was taken to the hospital with significant but non-life-threatening injuries.

All northbound lanes of Interstate 93 were shut

Thief of multiple stolen motor vehicles still at large

The Hopkinton Police Department is currently investigating a stolen motor vehicle from a residence. At 2:00 a.m., Tuesday, November 28th, a stolen motor vehicle out of Maine was abandoned off Little Tooky Road in town. Not long thereafter a vehicle was stolen from a residence on Carriage Lane.

This vehicle was soon found crashed in Henniker, close to where another motor vehicle was stolen from scene tape, and officers were positioned on all sides to secure the scene. Goffstown Police Chief Eric Sereno said the investigation would be handled by the NH Attorney General's Office and the New Hampshire State Police Major Crime unit.

The team from Major Crime arrived at about 5:30 p.m. and were joined by investigators from the NH Fire Marshal's Office. A woman from the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner's Office was also at the scene and could be seen taking photos. Investigators spent a significant amount of time concentrating on an area near the carport where a large tarp could be seen.

down as the fire increased in size, and then the southbound lanes were also shut down as several hundred rounds of ammunition in the vehicle started exploding. Fire crews arrived on scene shortly afterward and were able to contain the fire, at which time the southbound lanes were reopened.

The high-speed lane on the north-bound side of the Interstate was reopened, but the other two lanes remained shut down for "a significant period of time." State police arrested one of the people on several warrants. More charges may be pending after an investigation is completed. The names of the vehicle occupants are being withheld pending further investigation.

Saturday evening at 7:44 p.m. New London Firefighters, along with other area departments, were dispatched to 166 Old Main Street in New London on a first alarm assignment for smoke in the building. Upon arrival, first due companies were met with a significant smoke condition in the basement and throughout the residence. New London crews quickly located the source of smoke to be a malfunctioning furnace with no fire present. Mutual aid companies responding were cancelled per command with New London Fire to handle. New London crews remained on scene to ventilate the residence of smoke and high levels of carbon monoxide. New London Fire units were back in service by 10:00 p.m.

New Boston man faces additional felony assault charges

A New Boston man was indicted last week on additional felony assault charges in connection with a violent assault outside of a Manchester bar in September.

Around 12:45 a.m. on September 29, Manchester Police responded to McGarvey's Bar on Elm Street for reports of an assault. Arriving officers found a 34-yearold man in an alleyway outside the bar, "bleeding and suffering from serious but non-life-threatening injuries," police said in a news release in the days following.

The reporting party did not see the assault but heard a scuffle outside of the bar and saw two men, later identified as Damon Carter, 34, and Payson Tracy, 29, of Allenstown, leaving the area.

Carter was charged with first-degree assault and falsifying physical evidence in October for causing serious bodily injury to the man outside the bar in the fall, court documents show. Tracy was charged with first-degree assault, a felony.

The victim suffered from broken ribs, a shattered jaw, a ruptured spleen and internal bleeding and was

transported to Concord Hospital and placed in a medically induced coma in the intensive care unit.

Three weeks later, the victim gave his statement to police and told them that he had gone to McGarvey's to meet his girlfriend when he ran into an acquaintance at the door. A few minutes later, the acquaintance came up behind him at the bar, put him in a headlock and threatened him, he told police.

The victim told police he got out of the headlock and the pair were kicked out of the bar.

The victim then went to Wild Rover pub for a short period of time before returning to the area to meet up with the acquaintance, when he was attacked behind the bar by him and a friend, later identified as Carter.

Last week, Carter was charged with three additional charges — first-degree assault with a deadly weapon, a felony, and two counts of simple assault, misdemeanors.

Carter and Tracy remain released on a \$10,000 cash bail pending hearings on December 13 and December 18, respectively.

Hillsboro's K9 Officer Gibbs retires after years of service

For over a decade, K9 Gibbs has played a critical role in locating numerous individuals in the Hillsboro area, including missing persons, endangered individuals, criminals involved in domestic assaults, pursuits, and other crimes. One particularly notable instance involved Gibbs locating a mother in mental distress who may have been harming her child, as well as an accident victim who was hypothermic and had no pulse. These cases serve as a testament to the invaluable role that well-trained police canines like Gibbs can play in saving lives and protecting officers.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



In a new study including 145,000 pregnancies published in JAMA Internal Medicine, researchers found that antidepressant exposure during pregnancy was not associated with autism spectrum disorder, attention-deficit/ hyperactivity disorder, specific learning disorders, developmental speech/language disorders, developmental coordination disorders, intellectual disabilities, or behavioral disorders.

In a large clinical trial that directly compared four drugs commonly used to treat type 2 diabetes, researchers discovered that insulin glargine and liraglutide performed best when added to metformin. The results were published in a pair of papers in *The New England Journal of Medicine*. The study found that participants taking metformin plus liraglutide or insulin glargine achieved and maintained their target blood levels for the longest time compared to sitagliptin or glimepiride. This translated into approximately six months more time with blood glucose levels in the target range compared with sitagliptin, which was the least effective in maintaining target levels.

A common clinical practice may be inadvertently harming patients, according to new research published in the *European Respiratory Journal*. The team of researchers behind the study suggest that administration of antibiotics with activity against anaerobic bacteria has a profound effect on the gut microbiome and, ultimately, an adverse impact on critically ill patients. In the paper, researchers reported that in critically ill patients, the practice of early administration of anti-anaerobic antibiotics is commonplace — about two-thirds of the 3,032 patients observed in the study's cohort received such treatment. The research suggests that depleting the gut of these 'good bugs' may be contributing to worse clinical outcomes.

POWERED VERSUS MANUAL TOOTHBRUSHES



Q: Which is better, a powered or a manual tooth-brush?

A: One has no inherent advantage over the other, though circumstances might make one preferable. For instance, a person hampered by a physical challenge like arthritis that limits dexterity, might

find a powered brush easier to use. The American Dental Association draws no distinction between the two types. The more critical factor is how thoroughly and effectively you brush your teeth. Another consideration is that it might be easier to get a child established in a healthy regimen of brushing by letting him or her experiment, under your supervision, of course, with a gadget like a powered brush.

Whichever type you choose, the technique for brushing is essentially the same. You want to make sure you hit the back and front of each tooth. Some experts recommend thinking of the mouth in terms of quadrants – two on the top and two on the bottom – and concentrating on one quadrant at a time. Also remember that brushing too hard or too long can actually damage the sensitive tissue of the gums.

The ADA also recommends that you replace your brush every three to four months. For one thing, frayed bristles don't clean teeth as well, and they can irritate gum tissue. Ask you dentist or hygienist for advice on the best tools for keeping your teeth clean.
