# Exploring a 2nd District Congressional run

Sen. Becky Whitley, D-Hopkinton has formed an exploratory committee

A leading progressive lawmaker at the State House is taking steps toward a run for Congress in New Hampshire's 2nd District. Sen. Becky Whitley, D-Hopkinton, is forming an exploratory committee as she considers a campaign for the seat that will open with Rep. Annie Kuster's retirement in January.

"I'm exploring a run for Congress because New Hampshire's Second Congressional District deserves a proven and effective leader who will never stop fighting to protect reproductive freedom, to preserve our democracy, and to lower costs for hard-working families," Whitley said. "Our state has a proud tradition of sending strong women to Congress to fight on the front lines for our democracy's future and for our fundamental freedoms." In just her second term in the New Hampshire Senate, Whitley has already become a force within the Democratic caucus, currently serving as assistant leader to Senate Democratic Leader Donna Soucy.

Serving on the Judiciary Committee, she's been on the legislative front lines of ongoing fights over abortion rights at the State House, and was part of a group of senators last year that proposed a 'Momnibus' package of legislation aimed at dealing with issues like the child care crisis. When Kuster announced her decision last week not to seek reelection, Whitley's name was among the first to surface among party insiders as a possible candidate to hold the seat for Democrats.

"I have been truly humbled by the outpouring of encouragement to bring my solutions-oriented approach to D.C.," Whitley said. "It would be an honor to follow in the footsteps of my fellow Hopkinton resident and our beloved Congresswoman Annie Kuster, the district's first woman to hold the office."

# Tractor-trailer and pick-up collide on Route 3A in Bow

Bow police and fire and rescue teams were sent to a crash between two trucks on Route 3A on Tuesday.

Around 1 p.m., Capital Region Dispatch began receiving reports about the crash, involving a tractor-trailer and a pickup truck. Police arrived first and requested EMTs and firefighters, who then went to the scene.

A woman was still trapped in one of the vehicles, Bow police said. Dispatch said there was not much information about the crash but at least one patient in a Ford F-150 pickup truck needed to be evaluated. The truck's front tire was completely off, requiring it to be towed.

The Bow engine blocked the northbound lane of the highway while traffic was rerouted around the crash. Tow trucks were requested to remove the vehicles.

### AN INFECTED MOUTH COULD LEAD TO A BROKEN HEART



Brushing and flossing regularly can keep your smile shining as brightly as ever, but did you know that it could also help protect your heart? Now, researchers in Japan report that an infected mouth could lead to a broken heart.

In a study published last month in the International Journal of Oral Science, researchers from Tokyo Medical and Dental University(TMDU) have revealed that a common oral pathogen can stop cardiac myocytes from repairing themselves after a heart attack caused by coronary heart disease.

Heart attacks occur when blood flow in the coronary arteries is blocked, resulting in an inadequate supply of nutrients and oxygen to the heart muscle, and ultimately death of cardiac myocytes. To prevent this, cardiac myocytes use a process known as autophagy to dispose of damaged cellular components, keeping them from causing cardiac dysfunction.

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# **TAKE YOUR MEDICINE**



A low-cost version of ketamine to treat severe depression has performed strongly in a double-blind trial that compared it with placebo. In research published in the *British Journal of Psychiatry*, researchers found that more than one in five participants achieved total remission from their symptoms after a month of biweekly injections, while a third had their symptoms

improve by at least 50 per cent.

New research published in the *Journal of the American Geriatrics Society* finds that among patients 65 and older, a diagnosis of anxiety was significantly associated with an increased risk of dementia diagnosis, and benzodiazepine exposure was associated with a 28% increased risk of dementia. However, when benzodiazepines were prescribed to patients with an anxiety disorder, there was no significant association between these medications and incident dementia.

A new study published in Headache, the *Journal of Head and Face Pain*, has shown that prazosin, a drug used to treat high blood pressure, can prevent posttraumatic headaches. Persistent posttraumatic headaches are the most common long-term consequence of concussions. Although these headaches usually resemble migraine headaches symptomatically, they often fail to respond to the prevention treatments useful for migraines. The FDA approved prazosin to treat hypertension in 1976. It has been widely used "off-label" to treat conditions such as PTSD-associated nightmares and enlarged prostate.

# H-D schools facing nearly \$9.2 million in needed Capital Improvements

**Business Manager Grant** Geisler briefed the H-D School Board on the dozen Capital Improvements projects the District is facing over the next few years and suggested the following priorities: 1. Replace HS Boiler \$500,000 2. Replace HS Gym Roof \$200,000 3. Replace ES Boiler \$225,000 4. Install ES Ventilation \$650,000 5. Hassett Ventilation \$1,600,000 7. Upgrade HS HVAC \$1,800,000 8. Repave Hillcat Drive \$250,000 9. ES 3rd Fl Ventilation \$1,500,000 10. Repave ES Parking \$250,000 11. HS Gym HVAC \$200,000 12. New HS Gym Floor \$200,000

TOTAL \$9,175,000 The High School Boiler Replacement project has been #1 on the Capital Maintenance Plan for quite a while. The current cost estimate is \$450,000. The two boilers are beyond their 35 year life expectancy and if one or both fail, they could be looking at significant down time.

Even though there are two boilers, the hot water is circulated by a single drive. If the drive fails, they can't circulate heat. The existing pumps can be replaced with two variable-speed drives to provide the redundancy. Domestic hot water is provided by a separate boiler that is in good condition.

However, redundancy is currently maintained by an electric water heater which is in poor condition and due for replacement. A zone from the new boilers will serve as the redundancy and eliminate the electric water heater.

The High School Gym Roof



During Monday's H-D School Board meeting, Rep. Riché Colcombe renewed her request for an explanation of the mysterious "Account 25," containing a balance in excess of \$170,000, separate from the school's Operating Account, which has apparently never been reported to the state and of which past and present Board members know nothing about. Chair Chris Bober promised an answer at the next Board meeting.

project wasn't on the original priority list, but should have been since it's beyond its useful life (33 years old).

The boiler project can tap into both the HV AC and Building Maintenance Trusts. The roof project can tap into both the Roof and Building Maintenance Trusts. At the conclusion of the projects, the HV AC and Roof Trusts will be depleted (as planned), the Building Maintenance Trust will have a balance of about \$80K and the Technology Trust will have a balance of \$99.3K. Officials anticipate sufficient FY24 surplus to be able to add \$250K to the Building Maintenance Trust and \$10K to the Technology Trust.

### Homeowners purchase Mobile Home Park for \$5 Million

Homeowners in Longwoods Mobile Home Park in Deering recently purchased their 98-unit park, making it New Hampshire's 149th resident-owned manufactured-home community (ROC).

With training and technical assistance from the New Hampshire Community Loan Fund's ROC-NH<sup>™</sup> program, residents organized and formed Contoocook River Cooperative last October after being notified that the park owner had received an offer to purchase.

The cooperative matched the offer and bought

their community for \$5 million with financing from the Community Loan Fund. "It was a lot of work to get here, but we're super excited to be in control of our destiny," said Janette Lochmandy, secretary of the co-op's board of directors. "This process brought all of us closer together as neighbors and we're all looking forward to the future of our park."

Contoocook River Cooperative is Hillsborough County's 16th ROC. In total, these communities contain 1,183 permanently affordable homes.

## Manual Science Perspective

#### Two religions celebrated

As we celebrated Easter, the holiest of Christian holidays, it was appropriate to join our Jewish brothers and sisters in observing Passover, one of the most widely observed Jewish holidays, commemorated by many affiliated and nonaffiliated Jews alike as a time to contemplate the endurance of the Jewish people throughout history.

In the narrative of the Exodus, the Bible tells that God inflicted ten plagues upon the Egyptians before Pharaoh would release his Hebrew slaves, with the tenth plague being the killing of all of the firstborn, from the Pharaoh's son to the firstborn of the dungeon captive, to the firstborn of cattle. The Hebrews were instructed to mark the doorposts of their homes with the blood of a spring lamb and, upon seeing this, the spirit of the Lord passed over these homes, hence the term "passover." When Pharaoh freed the Hebrews, it is said that they left in such a hurry that they could not wait for bread to rise.

In commemoration, for the duration of Passover, no leavened bread is eaten, for which reason it is called "The Festival of the Unleavened Bread." Matza (flat unleavened bread) is the primary symbol of the holiday. Together with Shavuot ("Pentecost") and Sukkot ("Tabernacles"), Passover is one of the three pilgrimage festivals (Shalosh Regalim) during which the entire Jewish populace historically made a pilgrimage to the Temple in Jerusalem.

#### When we talk, we come to understand - that's the bridge

Democrat legislators talking with their Republican counterparts and vice-versa?

Wow, what a concept! This is the goal of the Granite Bridge Legislative Alliance (GBLA).

This organization is part of the Braver Angels consortium, a group that is working to "bring Americans together to bridge the partisan divide and strengthen our

democratic republic." We are the first legislative body to take on their challenge to form a caucus, so there are a lot of eyes watching us and hoping to learn. It's a great opportunity for such an evenly divided (and large) legislative body as ours.

Braver Angels states that: "As we separate into groups that increasingly do not even know, or interact with, people of differing opinions, we lose trust in our institutions, eroding the ability to govern ourselves and lowering the caliber of citizenship. This growing trend coarsens public debate, produces policy gridlock, shrinks our capacity for goodwill, and harms our family and personal relationships. Effective self-government depends precisely on what this type of polarization destroys. We believe the American Experiment can survive and thrive for every American who contributes to the effort.

Where we go from here is up to us."

Peggy Noonan once said, "What we need most right now, at this moment, is a kind of patriotic grace -agrace that takes the long view, apprehends the moment we're in, comes up with ways of dealing with it, and eschews the politically cheap and manipulative. That admits affection and respect. That encourages them. That acknowledges that the small things that divide us are not worthy of the moment; that agrees that the things that can be done to ease the stresses we feel as a nation should be encouraged, while those that encourage our cohesion as a nation should be supported." We believe, especially in the purple state of New Hampshire and where we have been a swing state in national politics since 1992, that this effort should especially be encouraged.

The GBLA is co-chaired by Reps. Alicia Gregg, D-Nashua, Hillsborough 7, and Fred Plett, R-Goffstown, Hillsborough 29, and has on its steering committee Reps.

Tom Cormen, D-Lebanon, Grafton 15; Eric Turer, D-Brentwood, Rockingham 6; Katelyn Kuttab, R-Windham, Rockingham 17; and Sheila Seidel, R-Goffstown, Hillsborough 29. We are aided by Braver Angels volunteers the Hon. Douglass Teschner (R), West Lebanon, a former assistant secretary of state and Peace Corps volunteer, and the Hon. Patricia Higgins (D), Hanover.

We have plans for a group dinner in Concord in early April, inviting all representatives, a Braver Angels workshop in early May, a Fisher Cats game in May, and more to come.

We will never do away with partisan differences. Partisan differences are essential to a functional democracy, and they have existed from the beginning of the republic. However, partisan differences should not lead to personal animosity. Rather, conversations should take place, where we truly listen to the other side, to the point that we can articulate the other side's viewpoint. With that, it might be possible to establish common ground, at least some of the time.

And whether or not that is always possible, at least friendships can be established and mutual respect developed. Some legislative committees operate on a bipartisan basis most of the time. Others may be inherently more divided. The GBLA will foster mutual relationships. It certainly can't hurt.

We hope that the public will support this effort and develop renewed faith in your legislators representing you, and the legislative process. Please wish us well in our endeavors!

#### LEGAL FRAMEWORK FOR THE ACQUISITION OF REAL ESTATE **ENTITIES OR REAL ESTATE** ASSETS: PART I



The legal framework for the acquisition of real estate entities or real estate assets in the US is complex and multifaceted, as it involves federal, state and local laws.

Real estate acquisitions usually involve a letter

By: Joyce Bosse of intent (LOI) or a purchase and sale agreement (PSA) outlining the key terms of the transaction, such as the purchase price, closing date, due diligence period and other conditions of the deal. If outside financing from banks or private lenders is needed, financing agreements will need to be captured in legal agreements such as mortgages, deeds of trust or promissory notes.

In the case of an asset deal, the due diligence will be done primarily at the real property level. A title search will be performed to ensure that the real property's title is clear and free from any liens or encumbrances. Title insurance is obtained to protect against any undiscovered title defects. An environmental assessment is also usually required to identify any potential environmental liabilities related to the real property and to assure that the real property is compliant with federal and state environmental laws. Additionally, depending on the location and type of real estate, additional regulations and zoning laws might be applicable.

### Merrimack Station to be converted to 'renewable energy park'

Bow's Merrimack Station, the last coal-fired power plant in New England and a longtime target of conservation groups, will close to make way for a "renewable energy park." Owner Granite Shore Power reached an agreement with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to cease using its coalfired boilers by at least June 1, 2028, maybe even a year earlier, according to the agreement, which includes a similar plan for Schiller Station in Portsmouth. The agreement ends litigation brought by the Conservation Law Foundation and the Sierra Club, according to the organizations.

New England will be the second "coal-free" region in the United States after the Pacific Northwest, according to Bloomberg Philanthropies, which has worked with the Sierra Club to eliminate 72% of coal-fired power plants in the U.S. since 2011.

### Newport Library Arts Center Peeps Diorama Contest winners

The Library Arts Center hosted its 13th annual Peeps Diorama Contest in 2024, and the gallery was filled with the iconic marshmallow Easter candies as the stars of 98 unique dioramas, displayed through April 4.

In the Children's category, "Mount Olympeeps" by Noah, Marji, Lorelei, Hazel, Zaxton, Exavior, and Jolene won first place. "Peeps in the Jungle" by Paisley Winchell of Newport won second place and "Peeps Carnival" by Avery Bevilacqua of Newport won third.

In the Teen category, "Female Gladiators" by Emilee Hall of Claremont won first place. "Brazen Bull" by Daven Vaine of Claremont won second place and "The Little Peep That Could," by Michael Breisch

The plant mostly runs in the winter, when natural gas prices are high. Since 2019, 350 NH Action has called for the shutdown of the Bow plant through its "No Coal, No Gas" campaign. Merrimack Station has a maximum capacity of 482 megawatts between its two coal-fired steam units and two kerosene-fueled combustion turbines, which is reached typically only in peak winter months, according to its website.

A 50-50 partnership between Atlas Holdings of Greenwich, Connecticut, and Castleton Commodities International of Stamford, Connecticut, bought the plant from Eversource for \$175 million in 2018. Castleton Commodities International no longer has an ownership interest, according to its website.

The plant will continue to operate while the 400acre property is redeveloped.



### Henniker accepts Fire & Emergency Management Grants

The Henniker Board of Selectmen proposed a Special Detail Fee Schedule for Police and Fire services to take effect May 1, 2024. The following fees are for private details only.

Police Special Detail = \$100.00 per hour (minimum one officer and one cruiser per detail)

Each additional officer will be billed at \$85 per hour Each additional cruiser will be billed at \$15 per hour Fire/EMS Special Detail — staff hourly fee per person = \$75.00

Fire Engine = \$100.00 per hour

Ambulance = \$75.00 per hour

Forestry Truck = \$75.00 per hour

Minimum Public Safety Detail = 4 hour increments Cancellation Notice = 24 hour minimum (to avoid billing)

The Select Board approved Fire Chief Jim Morse's

request to Expend Funds from Fire-Rescue Building Expendable Trust Fund for Garage Doors at the Fire Station, in the amount of \$19,482 (50% deposit). This represents an in-kind portion of the EMPG grant that has been approved for the fire station. This is one half of the cost of the garage doors and represents the deposit requested by the vendor, K Greene Services. The total cost is \$38,964. The garage doors are 30 years old and are one of the problem areas of the station.

The Board also voted to accept the terms of the Emergency Management Performance Grant as presented in the amount of \$51,000 for the EOC Generator Project. Furthermore, the Board acknowledges that the total cost of this project will be \$102,000, in which the town will be responsible for a 50% match (\$51,000).
