Bow woman named NH Civic & Voter Education Coordinator


Bow High School teacher Lily Woo will lead the Secretary of State's civic and voter education efforts starting in July.

The goal will be to encourage citizens to not only vote, but to also become active participants by serving as poll workers on election day.



Colby-Sawyer & NEC make transferring from Community College easier

Colby-Sawyer College and New England College have announced that they have joined the New Hampshire Transfer Guarantee, an initiative which streamlines the admissions process for graduates of New Hampshire's community colleges who wish to attend a partnering four-year institution.

Beginning this fall, students who have earned an associate degree with a minimum 2.0 grade point average from a community college in New Hampshire can transfer toNEC or Colby-Sawyer without an application fee or personal essay. Students who transfer may also be eligible for scholarships and grants, a benefit typically made available only to first-time, first-year students.

"We are excited to join this initiative and make the transfer process even easier for graduates of New Hampshire's community colleges," Colby-Sawyer College Vice President for Enrollment Management and Marketing Valerie Leclair

said. "We are committed to making a Colby-Sawyer education more accessible, particularly for our local communities. Programs like the New Hampshire Transfer Guarantee provide a clear, streamlined, and affordable path for students."

In joining the New Hampshire Transfer Guarantee, NEC and Colby-Sawyer signed memorandum of agreement with the New England Board of Education, Community College System of New Hampshire and New Hampshire College and University Council (NHCUC). As a partner institution, the two colleges guarantee the transfer of associate-earned credits from the sending institution, mitigating an issue that has long been a concern for transfer students throughout the country.

Funded by grants from the Teagle Foundation and the Davis Educational Foundation, the New England Transfer Guarantee launched in 2021 in Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island. In 2022, additional funding from the Arthur Vining Davis Foundations, the Teagle Foundation, the Davis Educational Foundation and the Lloyd G. Balfour Foundation made it possible to expand the program into New Hampshire, Maine and Vermont.

"The New Hampshire Transfer Guarantee is a big step forward in simplifying transfer with the goal of helping students stay on track to earn the bachelor's degree they seek," NHCUC President and CEO Debby Scire said. "The program removes barriers that previously slowed students down, discouraged them or involved extra expense, such as losing earned credits in the transfer process which added both cost and time to degree."

NEC and Colby-Sawyer College are two of five institutions that have announced their commitment to the New Hampshire Transfer Guarantee, joining Franklin Pierce University, Keene State College, and Plymouth State University.

GOOD NEWS, BAD NEWS ON DENTAL PAIN CARE **SEEN IN NEW STUDY**



Americans who have a tooth pulled or another painful dental procedure in the United States today are far less likely to get opioid painkillers than they were just a few years ago, a new study shows. That's good news, since research shows that opioids are not necessary for most dental procedures.

But the COVID-19 pandemic seems to have thrown a wrench into the effort to reduce opioid use in dental care - and not just in the few months after dentists and oral surgeons started

The decline in opioid prescriptions filled by dental patients was much faster in the pre-pandemic years 2016 through 2019, compared with the rate of decline from June 2020 to December 2022, the study shows.

providing routine care again after a pause in spring 2020.

In all, dental opioids dispensed to U.S. patients of all ages declined 45% from 2016 to the end of 2022. But even with the decline, 7.4 million dental patients of all ages filled opioid prescriptions in 2022.

Fortunately, opioid prescriptions to teens and young adults - who face especially high risks related to opioids - kept declining at a rapid rate after the pandemic pause in dental care, the study finds. But for other groups, the rate of decline slowed after June 2020.

In all, the researchers estimate, 6.1 million more dental opioid prescriptions were dispensed between June 2020 and December 2022 than would have been if pre-pandemic trends had continued. And American dentists and oral surgeons were still prescribing opioids in late 2022 at four times the rate that another study showed British dentists were in 2016.

Results of an innovative clinical trial published in eClinicalMedicine have shown that the drug interferon could help reduce the spread of COVID-19 from a positive person to their household contacts, with the study helping to inform treatment options for a future pandemic. Researchers tested the effectiveness of treating the infected people and their uninfected household contacts with interferon. Interferon is a naturally occurring protein that

is known to boost the immune system and help the body fight infection, and it is commonly used to treat people with multiple sclerosis. In addition, interferons have been shown to be very safe and to have positive effects in clinical trials against other coronaviruses, including SARS and MERS.

Acne is a common skin disease with an estimated global presence of 9.4% and an annual cost of \$3 billion in the United States. Although guidelines that recommend medications are generally supported by high-quality, randomized controlled trials, research is lacking on the efficacy of certain medications, particularly when comparing treatment options that have markedly inconsistent drug prescribing patterns among countries and among prescriber specialties. Based on a comprehensive meta-analysis of 210 articles, comprising 221 trials and examining 37 interventions involving 65,601 patients, researchers, according to a report published in The Annals of Family Medicine, have concluded that oral isotretinoin is the most effective treatment for acne. Following closely behind, triple therapies incorporating a topical retinoid, benzoyl peroxide (BPO) and an antibiotic have shown significant efficacy. For monotherapies, both oral/ topical antibiotics and topical retinoids demonstrate comparable effectiveness for inflammatory lesions. However, it is important to note that oral/topical antibiotics exhibit limited efficacy for non-inflammatory lesions and should not be utilized as stand-alone treatments due to the risk of bacterial resistance.

One dead another injured in Goffstown house fire

New Hampshire State Fire Marshal Sean Toomey, Fire Chief Shawn Murray, and Police Chief Eric Sereno announced that a fire occurred at 19 Sonny Avenue in Goffstown on June 17, 2024, at 12:18 a.m. A victim died and another victim is recovering in the hospital as a result of this fire.

Initial reports came in reporting smoke in the home and a victim trapped on the second floor. When Goffstown firefighters arrived on scene, they were met with the trapped victim calling to them from the second story window, a smoke condition on the exterior of the building, and visible fire on

the first floor. When firefighters made entry into the home, they discovered a victim inside. The victim was removed from the home where resuscitation attempts were made but were unsuccessful.

Positive identification of the victim and cause and manner of death are pending an autopsy that took place at the NH State Medical Examiner's Office in Concord, NH, on June 18, 2024.

The investigation into the origin and cause of the fire is active and ongoing by members of the NH State Fire Marshal's Office, the Goffstown Fire and Police Department.

Henniker to apply for a \$500,000 Community Development Black Grant

The Henniker Select Board held a series of public hearings on June 18th, to consider applying for a \$500,000 Community Development Black Grant to assist the White Birch Center's public facilities project grant application for renovations to the Quilted Threads building it is purchasing.

White Birch's renovation plans include providing free space to the Henniker Food Pantry and free office space for the town's Welfare Administrator.

Federal regulations require that in order to be eligible for a CDBG Grant, municipalities must have or adopt a Housing and Community Development Plan, which encourages low income or public benefit projects, as well as a Residential Anti Displacement and Relocation Plan.

Thus, the session was divided into three separate public hearings, after which the board approved all three.

Warner man sentenced to 12 months in jail

Jordon M. Dunne, 28, of Warner has been sentenced to a year in jail for pretending to be an asbestos abatement professional.

Dunne pleaded guilty and has been sentenced in the Sullivan County Superior Court to felony attempted theft by deception for conduct occurring in Lebanon in 2020 and to felony theft by deception and misdemeanor unfair and deceptive business practices for conduct occurring in Claremont in 2022.

In both cases, Dunne "falsely represented that he was a New Hampshire licensed asbestos abatement professional and that building samples he obtained ... were sent to a lab and tested positive for asbestos." He was paid more than \$1,000 each time.

The court sentenced him to 12 months in jail, with all but 30 days suspended for a period of three years, and ordered him to pay restitution to all victims in full on the day of sentencing.

Dunne was ordered to complete two years of probation. He is also prohibited from engaging in asbestos abatement activities or applying to renew his asbestos abatement license during the three-year suspension term.
