



The service was also the last under the auspices of the National United Methodist Church as the locals have completed their disassociation from the national church and have joined the Global Methodists.



Adult and minor injured in Weare ATV crash

Weare Police and Weare Ambulance, New Boston Police and New Boston Ambulance, and Henniker Ambulance, along with a Conservation Officer responded to the crash in Weare last Saturday.

While operating at the All Seasons Campground, 55 year old Thomas Silva of Derry, New Hampshire, along with a minor passenger, approached a road junction. The minor grasped the throttle sending the ATV at a high rate of speed. Silva attempted to correct this but lost control of the ATV, rolling the machine. Silva suffered minor injuries while the minor suffered serious injuries. Henniker Ambulance then transported the minor to Concord Hospital for care of their injuries.

At the time of the crash, the minor and operator were not wearing helmets or other protective gear. Alcohol is also being investigated as a possible contributing factor to the crash.



Woods Woolen Mills Brownfields reclamation is entering final stages

On July 1st Hillsborough Town Administrator Laura Buono, along with Selectmen Jim Bailey and Rich Pelletier met with representatives of the Department of Environmental Services Aquatic Management and Brownfields units for a site walk at the former Woods Woolen Mills site along the Contoocook River.

The Woods Woolen Mill was constructed in 1880 and produced a variety of textiles such as cloth, fabrics, overcoat products and yarn. The mill changed ownership various times throughout the early 20th century, and ultimately became abandoned in the mid 1980s.

In August 2000, a Removals Action was conducted by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) in which 53-drums of unknown liquids and solids, and 20-cubic-yards of asbestos containing material was removed. Later in 2000, a 12,000 gallon underground fuel oil storage tank (UST) with 529 gallons of oil inside was removed from the site.

In November of 2004, the Town of Hillsborough acquired the property by tax deed. In late 2006, investigations at the site were conducted and soil sampling results indicated contamination of PAHs, lead, arsenic, antimony and chromium.

In 2009, partial cleanup was completed which included the demolition of two structures, and removal of approximately

375-tons of building material. Due to limited funds, the Boiler House still remained.

During March 2019, alternatives for remediation at the site were prepared. The recommended removal action at the site was to demolish the remaining building, remove contaminated soils, and install an engineered control/cap.

From 2021-2022 the US EPA conducted a federal response action which included Boiler House demolition, debris and scrap metal removal, and excavation of lead contaminated soil. The Planning process for the reuse of the site and restoration of the floodplain began in 2023. The following funding sources have been used:

\$200,000 - EPA Brownfield Cleanup Grant Agreement (2007)

\$40,000 - Town of Hillsbor-

ough (Grant Match)

\$600,000+ - EPA Regional Removal Program (2022) \$115,000 - Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission's Brownfields Assessment Grant (2019)

\$20,000 - NHDES Brownfields Technical Assistance Grant (2021)

\$258,285 - NHDES Aquatic Resource Mitigation Grant

\$125,000/ongoing - NHDES A combination of 128A, Community Wide Assessment Grant and 128A BIL Funds (2009/ 2022-2024)

The plans for the future include:

- 1. To apply for another grant this year for what is hopefully the final cleanup, during further investigation and management of the remaining contamination.
- 2. Incorporate sustainable designs for "rewinding" the riverbank.
 - 3. Add parking options.
- 4. Provide access for future recreational trails.

REAL ESTATE CONTRACTS: PART II

A written real estate contract must have a description of the property that is the subject of the transaction. There are a number of ways to meet this requirement. Among them are (i) a written legal description with metes and bounds, (ii) a map depicting the property, (iii) the parcel identification number(s) assigned by the tax office, sometimes called a "PIN number",

(iv) a reference to the recording information of the seller's deed, and (v) a street address.

The best is to take advantage of all those methods: the contract should describe the property by address, parcel number, and deed reference, and it should refer to exhibits that contain the legal description and a map. Your attorney will want to review the metes and bounds description in the proposed contract to ensure that it describes the subject property. Often, however, metes and bounds descriptions are not available or the contract draftsperson does not know how to retrieve, or is otherwise unable to access, that description.

Using just one other method for describing the property could be problematic. For example, if the draftsperson uses a street address but there is a vacant adjoining lot that is supposed to be included but does not have a street address, that adjoining lot is arguably not subject to the contract. Likewise, if an incorrect PIN number is used to describe the property, there may be no enforceable agreement. An attorney can help buyers and sellers properly identify the subject property before the contract is signed so that a costly fix is not needed later.



BABY'S FIRST VISIT



Q: When should a child first visit a dentist?

A: As a rule, a child should see a dentist by age one, or within six months of the first tooth's eruption. Some parents put little thought into the care of so-called 'baby teeth' because they're going to fall out anyway. The fact is, baby teeth are important

in many ways, including their role as placeholders for the permanent teeth.

On the first visit, the dentist will examine the child's mouth, teeth and gums and explain to the parents how to effectively keep the area clean. He also may have some nutrition tips. The dentist will also be able to evaluate the impact of any habits the child may have developed, like thumb sucking. Tooth decay can develop any time after your baby's teeth appear. By his first birthday, your baby could have eight or more baby teeth. And if one of them is causing pain, he or she won't be able to communicate that fact.

Another consideration in favor of the early visit to the dentist is the opportunity to start a good relationship between the doctor and the patient. The dentist, based on his or her examination, will be able to recommend a schedule for future visits. As with any medical issue, the earlier any sort of dental problem is recognized in your child, the easier it will be to correct it. Talk with your own dentist about the best steps to take with your infant.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A new study published in *Annals of Internal Medicine* found that one in five individuals taking Nirmatrelvirritonavir therapy, commonly known as Paxlovid, to treat severe symptoms of COVID-19, experienced a positive test result and shedding of live and potentially contagious virus following an initial recovery and negative test — a phenomenon known as virologic rebound. By contrast, people not taking Paxlovid only experienced rebound

about 2 percent of the time.

The findings of a study of 68,000 patients who received a diagnosis of COVID-19 and who were at high risk of progressing to severe COVID-19 suggest that the use of either nirmatrelvir (Paxlovid) or molnupiravir (Lagevrio) is associated with reductions in mortality and hospitalization in patients infected with Omicron, regardless of age, race and ethnicity, virus strain, vaccination status, previous infection status, or coexisting conditions. Both drugs can, therefore, be used to treat non-hospitalized patients who are at high risk of progressing to severe COVID-19. The study was published in *JAMA Network Open*.

A new meta-analysis combining 22 studies, presented at this year's Annual Meeting of the European Association for the Study of Diabetes shows that tirzepatide is superior to semaglutide for both control of blood sugar and in terms of amount of body weight lost by patients. Semaglutide, sold under the brand names Ozempic, Wegovy and Rybelsus, is approved for treatment of type 2 diabetes and also obesity/weight loss management. Tirzepatide is a once-weekly subcutaneous injectable peptide (approved by the Food and Drug Administration [FDA] for type 2 diabetes) and its manufacturers have submitted applications for its approval for obesity/weight loss management.

Franklin felon sentenced to 6 years in prison



A felon formerly of Belmont and Franklin was sentenced to more than six years in prison for possessing a gun that another man later used to kill his wife and shoot his daughter in 2023.

After serving his time, 33 months, for felon in possession of a firearm and felon in

possession of a firearm while under indictment, Justin Gebo, 29, will also be required to be on supervised release for three years. Gebo had a Ceska Zrojovka model Scorpion EVO 3, S2, 9x19mm short-barreled rifle in January 2023.

The rifle was recovered after Jamie Bell killed his fiancée, Nicole Hughes, 35, and injured his daughter, Ariella Bell, 18 months, in Franklin in June 2023.

Bell took his own life before police were able to catch up to him.

Arrested in Sunapee for excessive speed



On June 20th, 2024 Officer Joseph Merullo was on patrol on Route 11 in Sunapee Center when he observed a white van traveling at a high rate of speed into town. Ofc. Merullo obtained a radar reading of 40-MPH in a 30-MPH zone. Ofc. Merullo activated his blue lights and stopped the van in the parking lot of

Dunkin Donuts. The vehicle operator was identified as:

Josue Valladares Rivas (24) of Framingham, MA. Upon running his information, Ofc. Merullo learned that Rivas did not have a driver's license and one was never issued. Sergeant Nicholas Boisvert responded to assist. Subsequently, Rivas was placed under arrest and charged with License Required, contrary to NH RSA 263:1,III, which is a Class B Misdemeanor. Rivas was transported to the Sunapee Police Department for booking and processing per department policy, then bailed and released on Personal Recognizances with an arraignment date of August 13th, 2024 at the 5th Circuit Court in Newport, NH.




New this year, on July 19th is the Club Soda Band. Hailing from New England, this fourpiece band performs all styles: pop, classic rock, country and much more.
