On July 28th, Dr. Bob Brust and Dr. Alyssa Brust celebrated their retirement after 30+ years.



The community that is built around this hospital is unlike any other and it's all thanks to Bob and Alyssa and the work they put in over the past 25 years.



### New London Select Board turns over entire \$600,000 Grant to Twin Pines Housing

Andrew Winter of Twin Pines Housing returned to the New London Select Board to continue his request for the town to contribute to the financing of his company's Long Meadow Commons Project.

New London has received a conditional award of \$600,000 from InvestNH's Municipal Grant Program (MGP), a state-sponsored program to encourage the production of work-force housing. This grant is for communities that permit work-force housing projects like the Long Meadow Commons. Twin Pines has been asked by New Hampshire Housing to investigate the possibility of the town committing all, or at least a sizable portion of the funding that the Town will receive for the project from InvestNH. This would reduce the amount of funding that NH Housing commits to the project on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

Without this funding, the project may not proceed, in which case the Town would not receive any of the \$600,000. A funding commitment from the town would make it much more likely that the project would move forward.

Other communities, including Manchester, Newport, Goffstown, and Peterborough, have committed some or all of the MGP funds from InvestNH to projects. Some municipalities put all their money into the projects; some put some in the project and kept some.

From the Board's perspective, putting all the

funds in sends a message that the town is fully supportive of the project and understands that doing this in New London is expensive and the town wants to do what it can to contribute. One of the concerns from New Hampshire Housing is the cost of the project, which is driven by the 4-building design encouraged by the community to better fit within the town, and this increased costs. A contribtion would help address New Hampshire Housing's cost concerns.

Those funds have been contributed to projects in one of two ways. First, they have been granted to the sponsor (in this case Twin Pines) and then loaned into the project by the sponsor. Alternatively, municipalities have directly loaned the funds to the project. Twin Pines would be pleased with either approach if the town is willing to contribute MGP funds to support the project.

Winter stressed that in addition to meeting the urgent need for workforce housing, there would be a significant infusion of tax dollars to the town. This would include a one-time tax payment of approximately \$150,000 once the project is removed from current use. The project would be expected to pay nearly \$100,000 in property taxes in its first full year of operations.

After a brief discussion, the Board unanimously approved contributing the entire \$600,000 to the project.

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
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### Town of Hillsborough seeking legal fees and costs against John Penny

Town Administrator Laura Buono updated the Hillsborough Select Board on the long court battle with John Penny at 45 School Street.

Mr. Penny's barn is falling down and there is a court order in December that ordered Mr. Penny to have the property weather tight and structurally sound by April 30, 2024.

Mr. Penny has not done that and in fact, the barn is in worse shape than it was in December. She said the contempt hearing was scheduled for July 8th but Mr. Penny filed a motion to continue on Friday, July 5th, stating that he has a disability and cannot attend any appointments

before 2:00 p.m.

Due to that and even though Mr. Penny didn't submit anything to the Court showing he needed an ADA exception, the Judge rescheduled the hearing for 2:00 on Monday July 15th.

Ms. Buono said that Mr.

Penny rejects electronic paperwork and doesn't have a mailbox at his house, so everything that is mailed to him gets returned makes it difficult to communicate, and now his attorney has severed their relationship. She said the fact that Mr. Penny doesn't comply with anything is wasting tax-payer money on legal fees but the structure is dangerous and very close to the neighboring property.

She also said that the Town is seeking a judgment for attorney fees as well.

### **Dunbarton 6th graders clean headstones**

On June 13, Dunbarton sixth grade students spent the morning cleaning stones in Center Cemetery, under the tutelage of the Cemetery Trustees, Mike Lessard, Judy Keefe, along with Lee and Fred Mullen.

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## THE ROLE OF THE TONGUE



Q: What is the function of the tongue?

A: The tongue actually has many functions. For one thing, it is essential to speech. You could speak intelligibly with no teeth, but you could not do so without a tongue. The tongue also helps you move food around in your mouth so that you can chew it properly and position it for swallowing and, ultimately, digesting.

Your tongue helps with cleaning the mouth, sweeping about and plucking particles of food from the nooks and crannies of the mouth. The tongue also exerts subtle but necessary pressure on teeth, helping to keep them in line. And when teeth are erupting, the tongue coaxes them into their proper positions.

The tongue is also the home of your taste buds. They are what help make food appealing, a critical factor in getting the nutrition you need. In combination with your nose, the center of your olfactory (smell) sense, the taste buds discern salty, sour, sweet and bitter tastes and melds them into a pleasant combination.

The tongue, as you can see, is essential to your quality of life. Like any other part of the body, it is susceptible to disease, like cancer. When the dentist examines you, he looks not only at your teeth and gums, but at all the tissue in your oral cavity. The next time you visit your dentist, ask about how you can keep your tongue healthy.

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### TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Two widely used statins, rosuvastatin and atorvastatin, are equally effective at preventing heart attacks, strokes and death in people with coronary artery disease. But while rosuvastatin treatment is associated with lower cholesterol levels, it also carries a higher risk of developing type 2 diabetes than atorvastatin, finds a study published by *The BMJ*. Lowering "bad" (LDL) cholesterol levels with statins is recommended for people with

coronary artery disease — a condition where the blood vessels supplying the heart are narrowed or blocked.

Relief could be on the way for people with painful hand osteoarthritis after a Monash University and Alfred Health-led study published in *The Lancet*. The paper investigated methotrexate, a low-cost, effective treatment for inflammatory joint conditions such as rheumatoid arthritis and psoriatic arthritis. It has been widely used globally since the early 1980s. Researchers found that methotrexate reduced symptoms in those with hand osteoarthritis (OA). A 20mg weekly oral dose over six months had a moderate effect in reducing pain and stiffness in patients with symptomatic hand OA. Hand OA is a disabling condition that causes pain and affects function, impeding daily activities such as dressing and eating. It can significantly reduce quality of life. About one in two women and one in four men will experience symptoms from hand OA by the time they turn 85.

Time-restricted eating, also known as intermittent fasting, can help people with Type 2 diabetes lose weight and control their blood sugar levels, according to a new study published in *JAMA Network Open*. Participants who ate only during an eight-hour window between noon and 8 p.m. each day actually lost more weight over six months than participants who were instructed to reduce their calorie intake by 25%.

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### Suspect captured after high-speed chase thru Antrim & Hillsborough

On August 5, 2024, Antrim Police were dispatched to T-Bird Mini-mart for a report of a male using narcotics in a vehicle. It was quickly determined that the vehicle was stolen from Nashua and was now heading towards Hillsboro on Route 202.

Before the vehicle reached Hillsboro, officers set up spike strips at two separate locations. Shortly thereafter, officers from Hillsboro and Antrim attempted to stop the vehicle, but the operator fled at speeds exceeding 90 mph. The vehicle was spiked by Hillsboro officers near the Ford dealership and again past McDonald's.

The vehicle then took the westbound Route 9 on-ramp at a high rate of speed, with three of the four tires deflated, crashing over the median on the side of the hill.

The operator then fled on foot into the woods towards Gibbson Road. A plainclothes detective in a suit gave chase through the woods, capturing the suspect minutes later.

The suspect was identified as

30-year-old Michael Stephens of Manchester. He was charged with DUI, reckless conduct with a deadly weapon, disobeying an officer, resisting arrest, tampering with evidence, possession of controlled drug, and receiving stolen property. An adult female passenger was also taken into custody at the location of the crash.

Assisting agencies included the Henniker Police and the Newbury Police K9 unit, which was traveling through town and helped locate narcotics suspected to have been discarded by the suspect in the woods.

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



### New London Historical Society seeks \$35,000 to refurbish Historical Markers

Charlene Baxter of the Historical Society met with the New London Select Board seeking the board's support for the Society's project to restore the town's Historical markers.

New London, New Hampshire celebrated its bicentennial in 1979 by commissioning and erecting 16 historical markers between 1963 and 1978. These markers celebrated important people, places, and events in the

town's history. New London will celebrate its Semiguincentennial in 2029, marking 250 years of its existence as a town.

In the 50 plus years since the historical markers were erected, they have experienced significant wear and tear, resulting in markers today that are weather worn, faded, and in poor condition. This group of concerned citizens is asking the Board of Selectmen to address the poor condition of

Ideally the existing markers will be refurbished, placed on new posts, and in some cases even moved to more appropriate locations by the time New London celebrates its next big birthday in 2029.

Sewah Studios in Marietta, Ohio manufactured the markers

and can refurbish them to their original condition. Total project cost is up to \$35,000, which includes \$1500.00 per marker refurbishment plus \$375 per new improved post. Transporting the markers to and from Ohio is included in these cost estimates. As an element of this project, the selectmen would request


the town highway department be involved in taking down the markers, helping prepare them for shipment, and re-erecting the refurbished markers on their posts when they arrive back in New London.


The Board agreed to support a Warrant article at the next Town Meeting.

### Sinking boat saved - Oil spill contained

Sunapee Fire, New London Fire, and Newbury Fire were called to the area of Lake Ave in Georges Mills for a sinking boat. New London Ambulance 5, who happened to be in the area returning from a separate call, arrived on the scene and confirmed that a boat was actively sinking with no one on board. Shortly after Ambulance 5's arrival, Sunapee Boat 1 and New London Boat 1 arrived on the scene and started to pump water out of the boat. Due to the large amount of water in the boat and more


rapidly coming in, Sunapee Fire utilized the fire pump onboard Sunapee Boat 1 to pump out water and upright the sinking boat. While Sunapee Boat 1 and New London Boat 1 were tied up with the sinking boat, a second, unrelated oil spill was toned out in George's Mills Harbor. Due to Sunapee and New London Newbury Fire was redirected to the oil spill. Shortly after 14:30, the sinking boat was successfully pulled out of the lake, and the separate oil spill was fully contained and cleaned up.





### Peterborough Police arrest Hancock man after high-speed chase and accident

### Hancock to complete 6-year Fidium conversion August 15

Hancock will celebrate the completion of Fidium Fiber's network during a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the Hancock Farmers' Market Thursday, August 15, at 5:30 p.m.

The completion of the network means high-speed internet will be available to more than 900 homes and businesses in the community. "Hancock has worked with Consolidated Communications for six years to bring fiber optic internet to our small rural town," stated Mollie Miller, chair of the Hancock Telecommunications Committee. "Throughout, Consolidated has been a loyal and creative partner. Thanks to Consolidated, federal infrastructure money and a committed Telecommunications Committee, our small town is finally moving into the 21st century."

### Cyanobacteria warnings posted for Dunbarton & Hopkinton

State officials are reporting several continuing and new fecal bacteria and cyanobacteria watches and warnings around New Hampshire.

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services posted a new cyanobacteria warning-advisory for the Hopkinton Dike at Elm Brook in Hopkinton. The report stated the cyanobacteria warnings-advisories for Cobbetts Pond in Windham, issued July 25, and Gorham Pond in Dunbarton, posted on July 26, were still active.

Cyanobacteria is a natural component of lakes and ponds and form when excess nutrients are found in the water. The scum and blooms can cause health effects if exposed to them.

### New Boston Select Board deals with several issues

The New Boston Select Board dealt with a varied agenda at its last meeting.

Dick Backus, from the Historical Society requested repainting the Sunday Driver Rock. He explained that the rock has been vandalized many times over the years and was repainted, but he was unhappy with how the repainting was done. The rock interests him and he would like to consider repainting it to show the original message. The proposal is to sandblast the rock and have a local artist repaint and duplicate the message. The Board agreed with the proposal.

Emily Manns from Community Power explained that the Eversource rate was recently set at 10.403 cents per kW hour starting August 1 for six months. Community Power's rate is 10.568 cents per

kW hour. The difference between the two is approximately \$1 on the average user's monthly bill. The main benefit for Community Power users is a steady rate over time.

Bill McFadden noted that the distribution amount for Eversource's rate is expected to raise drastically. Over a five-year span, this looks to be approximately a 40% increase.

Bill McFadden explained that the Transfer Station recently purchased a new forklift. There was an attempt to sell the previous forklift, but this did not work out. There is a suggestion to transfer this to the Highway Department.

Benji Knapp agreed that he reviewed the vehicle and would be able to use it. The Board agreed to the transfer.




