

Former Franklin Police Chief Honored A Portion of Route 127 named the Bradley Haas Memorial Highway



held Thursday honoring former Franklin Police Haas, who was shot and killed last year at New

Hampshire Hospital in Concord while working as a security guard.

State Senator Dan Innis (R-Bradford) sponsored the legislation authorizing the sign marking the Bradley Haas

Memorial Highway. It will be posted on a section of Route 127 from Central Street in Franklin to the Sanbornton town line, a stretch of highway friends said Haas drove nearly every day.

Haas was killed on November 17 at New Hampshire Hospital after a gunman opened fire. He was the Department of Safety corrections officer assigned to the hospital. At the ceremony Thursday, Haas was remembered as community-minded and service-oriented. Before joining the Department of Safety, he served in the Army and the Franklin

Police Department for nearly 30 years, first as a patrol officer and eventually as chief of police.

"He's never really left us, quite frankly," said current Franklin Police Chief David Goldstein. "This is the way to honor the man so that, as the governor said, as people drive down the street, they know they're in the presence of a hero."

During the ceremony, Gov. Chris Sununu said that honors such as this aren't about reliving the tragedy, but instead about honoring the hero.

Operation Christmas makes the season brighter

Each year, there are gift tags that don't get taken, gift tags that never get returned and families that we learn about at the last minute. Newbury salutes Hometown Heroes who saved a distressed swimmer

Newbury Police Chief Brad Wheeler said he would like to recognize a few people from his department and the New London Dispatch Center. On July 19th of this year, approximately 7:23 in the evening, Officer Clark and Officer Stone heard a medical tone go off for a swimmer in distress on Lake Sunapee, in the area of The Fells.

The officers immediately headed to the town dock. They observed a boat and asked to jump in with the occupants and be transported to the scene of the swimmer.

The owners, Heather and Lee Minich allowed the officers to jump on their boat and they proceeded to the scene.

The New London Dispatch kept the responding units up to date with the swimmer's condition and location, all while assisting all the other responding units in getting to where they needed to be at that time.

Officer Stone first entered the water and began chest compres-

sions on the victim. Officer Clark then entered the water as well, and the officers were able to get the swimmer conscious again.

The Newbury Fire Department arrived on their boat and provided additional help. The victim was placed on the backboard and transported to Newbury Harbor where the New London Ambulance was waiting. The victim did spend some time in the hospital, but he was expected to make a full recovery, if he has not already done so.

Chief Wheeler stated that New London Dispatch deals with police, fire, and New London Ambulance, and that they often may have one dispatcher trying to relay all this information to three totally different entities. The chief said that the dispatcher on duty was Greg Barthol. He asked Greg to come up to receive a letter of commendation for his part for relaying all the information and making sure everybody got to where they needed to be.

He then asked Heather Cole and Lee Minnich to come up to receive the Newbury Police Department Citizen Award for their assistance in this rescue.

Chief Wheeler then introduced the distressed swimmer, Steve Gunnerson, a resident of South Sutton. He read a letter of appreciation to the outstanding officers, and concluded by saying, "It was through your gracious acts that I am here, and I humbly say, thank you."

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New London's Tracy Library Garden selected for Special Library Service Contribution Award

The New Hampshire Library Trustees Association (NHLTA) Board of Directors has chosen the Garden at Tracy Library as this year's winner of their Special Library Service Contribution Award. This award recognizes a group who have given outstanding service to New Hampshire public libraries. The Garden at Tracy Library is a separate 501(c) (3) tax-exempt organization. All funds come from private and business donations.

Designed by the famous Olmsted Brothers Landscape Architects in the 1920s on the property of the Tracy Memorial Library in the town of New London, New Hampshire, the Garden has been restored and maintained to the original plans by a group of over 30 volunteer gardeners under the direction of a master gardener. Their mission is to maintain and preserve the restored historic garden for the education and enjoyment of the community and public.

For over a decade, volunteer gardeners plan and maintain the plantings, historic signage and fountain, as well as sponsor educational programming. Earth friendly enrichment and composting are part of this organization's sustainability practices. 



New Boston Select Board continues planning the 2025 town budget

New Boston Town Administrator Carl Weber updated the Select Board on the budget. The budget is still at 5% with some changes made. Changes were made to the proposed Library budget leading to it being approximately \$25,000 higher than the 5%. Also, the heating oil bid was finalized.

Staff considered that lawn maintenance could be done using the Town's equipment and were able to lower some budget amounts based on the bids that came in for assessing. Regarding the budget for gasoline and

diesel, prices have continued to drop. This led to a net result of a budget that was \$73 lower than when originally presented to the Board, but still holding steady at 5%. The Departments have continued to work to find creative ways to reduce the budget line items.

Regarding the proposed Warrant Articles, the proposed Highway Department purchase for a 10 wheel dump truck from Capital Reserve Funds increased by \$5,000 due to inflation.

Minor detours and road closures occurred due to the incident. Steven's Towing & Recovery recovered two vehicles and Gauthier Auto Service recovered one vehicle.

inflation will not lead to any tax impact. Also, there was a request for an additional \$2,200 for Meals on Wheels based on the actual meals provided. There are also proposed Warrant Articles for the Deaf Exemption and

the Electrical Storage System Exemption, each of which has no estimated dollar impact.

Currently, the proposed taxable Warrant Articles total approximately \$17,634,128 more than last year or about 1.95%.

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TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Acetaminophen is considered the safest over-the-counter pain reliever and fever reducer available during pregnancy. Studies have shown that 50%-65% of women in North America and Europe take acetaminophen during pregnancy. A new study reported in the journal *Pediatric Research* found that acetaminophen use in the second and third trimesters of pregnancy led to modest but significant delays in early language development.

On the positive side, a recent study published in Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) found that acetaminophen (Tylenol) use during pregnancy did not increase children's risk of autism, ADHD, and intellectual disability.

New research published in Neuropsychopharmacology Reports now indicates that taking probiotics plus vitamin D supplements may improve cognitive function in individuals with schizophrenia.

A new study published in the journal Diabetes demonstrates that liraglutide, a glucagon-like peptide-1 receptor (GLP-1R) agonist, and a member of a class of medication used to treat Type 2 diabetes and obesity, can lead to a rapid improvement in insulin sensitivity. Insulin sensitivity is how responsive cells are to insulin, an essential hormone that controls blood glucose levels. An increase in insulin sensitivity means insulin can more effectively lower the blood glucose. Reduced insulin sensitivity or insulin resistance is a feature of Type 2 diabetes. Thus, improved insulin sensitivity can reduce the risk of developing Type 2 diabetes or improve its treatment. GLP-1R agonists are medications that influence metabolism, such as decreasing blood sugar levels by promoting insulin secretion.


Madi Lamothe led the Generals with 3 goals.




