



No injuries reported in Franklin fire

Crews from nine towns respond to Franklin house fire

No one was injured in a two-alarm fire Thursday night at a home in Franklin. Fire crews were dispatched to a reported building fire Thursday at 7:15 p.m. at 10 Hutchinson Street. The Tilton-Northfield Fire & EMS and Bristol fire departments were also toned as automatic aid.

As Franklin crews responded, dispatchers received a report that a garage was fully involved at the scene and that the fire was extending to the home, Franklin Deputy Fire Chief David Hall said in a statement.

Franklin Fire Captain Keith McNulty

called for a first alarm immediately, then a second alarm on arrival.

Crews entered the house with a hose and encountered heavy fire in the kitchen area, Hall said. Additional crews arrived and battled the blaze in the garage and four automobiles burning in front of the home, officials said.

Searches for trapped occupants and fire extension through the home were completed, with no additional occupants found, as the fire extended to the second floor of the home.

One of the occupants was medically

evaluated and released, Hall said. No other injuries were reported.

The cause of the fire is under investigation, but Hall said it appears to be accidental. Franklin was assisted on scene by fire departments from Tilton-Northfield Fire & EMS, Sanbornton, Belmont, Hill, Boscawen, New Hampton, Laconia, Gilford, Concord, and the Lakes Regional Mutual Fire Aid.


One additional call was received and was handled by Andover Fire Department and Penacook Rescue Squad while covering Franklin's station.

Kearsarge School Budget calls for \$2,598,805.00 increase in teachers contract

The residents of Bradford, New London, Newbury, Springfield, Sutton, Warner, and Wilmot, comprising the Kearsarge Regional School District, will meet at the Kearsarge Regional High School on January 4, 2025 at 9:00 a.m.

Article 1 asks voters to raise and appropriate the Municipal Budget Committee's recommended amount of \$55,387,481 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the school district officials and agents, and for the payment for the statutory obligations of the District. The School Board recommends \$55,387,481. Article 2 seeks approval of the cost item included in the Collective **Bargaining Agreement reached** between the Kearsarge Regional School Board and the Kearsarge Regional Educators Association which calls for increases of \$2,598,805.00 in salaries and benefits:

- \$879,608
- 2027-2028
- 2027-2028 \$861,580
- And further to raise

and appropriate the sum of \$857,617 for the 2025-2026 fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits required by the new agreement over those that would be paid at current staffing levels.

Article 3 requests that up to \$100,000 to be placed in the School Buildings Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund for the purpose of repair, unanticipated utility costs, and maintaining the school buildings and equipment, with such amount to be funded from unassigned fund balance (surplus funds) remaining on hand as of June 30, 2025.

Article 4 requests up

to \$100,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Roof Fund for the purpose of replacement or major repairs to roofs in the district with such amounts to be funded from unassigned fund balance (surplus funds) remaining on hand as of June 30, 2025.

officers alike. During his stint with the United States Navy, he received seven ribbons and six medals, including the Navy Expeditionary and Humanitarian Service medal. Kenney retired at the rank of Chief Petty Officer in 1993 after 18 years of service.

After retiring from the United States Navy, Kenney taught computer technology for 25 years at various private and technical schools including Boston University. His focus was workforce development training for adults who lost their jobs. Since 2008, Kenney has served as a part-time adjunct professor at NHTI, where he specializes in teaching literacy. He currently serves on the board for the Hillsboro-Deering Cooperative School District (SAU 34).

In addition to his professional career, Kenney served in the Civil Air Patrol for 17 years after his tenure with the United States Navy. He retired as a major earlier this year.

Kenney belongs to three national veteran organizations: Life Member of Veterans of Foreign Wars - Post 483 in Nashua, New Hampshire; American Legion - Young and Richardson Post 59 in Hillsborough, New Hampshire; and La Societe des Quarante Hommes et Huit Chevaux 40/8 American Legion Honor Society in Concord, New Hampshire.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Coming off antidepressants is known to trigger physical symptoms, such as restlessness, fatigue, and excessive sweating, but new research published in the journal *Health Expectations* suggests people can also experience emotional and social difficulties, and changes in their thinking patterns when they stop taking antidepressants like Prozac. This is especially true when people don't 'taper' their medication but instead stop taking it suddenly,

and when the process is not adequately supervised by a doctor. Challenges reported by study participants included feeling overwhelmed by their emotions, finding social situations less enjoyable, and feeling detached and less empathetic towards others. The participants also reported that withdrawal affected their cognitive functioning.

A new study published in *Psychopharmacology* found that propranolol, a medication that treats high blood pressure, can also help lower anxiety for kids and young adults with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Given that some individuals with ASD tend to struggle with anxiety at a far greater rate than their neurotypical peers, the new finding can significantly help such individuals with ASD.

In a comparative effectiveness trial of behavioral activation psychotherapy (BA) and antidepressant medication management (MEDS), both treatments significantly reduced depressive symptoms by nearly 50% with no statistically significant differences between treatments. BA recipients experienced better physical health-related quality of life, fewer emergency department visits, and fewer days hospitalized. The study findings, published in *JAMA Network Open*, suggest that patients with heart failure could be given the choice between BA or MEDS to ameliorate depression.

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PRIMER ON IMPLANTS



Q: What is a dental implant?

A: Dentistry has come a long way from the days of George Washington and his wooden choppers. One of the best ways to replace a missing tooth or teeth these days is with a dental implant. What's implanted is a pin, usually made of titanium, and it

goes into your jaw. It acts as a replacement root to support an artificial tooth. Implants are generally preferable to dentures in that they don't slip. That makes talking and chewing easier.

Inserting the pin is a procedure normally done under local anesthesia. Not everyone, however, is a candidate for an implant. For one thing, you have to have enough bone in the jaw to support the implant. If you don't have enough bone, under some conditions the dentist might be able to graft bone.

Gum condition is also a consideration when determining if some one is a viable candidate for an implant. Even if you have implants, you'll want to continue regular visits to the dentist. For one thing, the dentist will want to check regularly on the condition of the implant and of the tissue in the immediate area of the work. For instance, tissue near the implant might not have has much blood flow as tissue elsewhere in your mouth, and therefore could be more susceptible to infection.

Talk with your dentist about whether you're a candidate for an implant.

The Merrimack helps fund White Birch Center's Expansion Project

CDFA tax credits allow businesses to fund qualifying economic or community development projects in exchange for a tax credit that can be applied against state business tax payments. The tax credits are administered by the New

Hampshire CDFA. Any business with operations in New Hampshire that contributes to a CDFA tax credit project receives a New Hampshire state tax credit worth 75 percent of their contribution. The credit can be used over a period of five years to reduce the business' state tax liability (business profits, business enterprise, or insurance premium taxes). The tax credit program allows New Hampshire businesses to use their state tax dollars to support local projects that they care about. CDFA reviews many project applications each year, and awards tax credits to those they determine are feasible and will make the biggest impact on economic development in the state. 

New London Budget Committee reviewing the budget

After several weeks of meeting with department heads, the Selectmen have completed their fiscal year 2026 budget and have submitted it to the Budget Committee. The Selectmen made numerous adjustments to the budget requests submitted and ended their work with a 4.1% increase in the operating budget. With transfers to capital reserves and warrant articles known so far, the increase is 4.60%. This is the increase that will impact the tax rate. Included in the increases noted above are two warrant articles the Selectmen intend to include on the Warrant:

(1) Creation of an expendable trust fund with a deposit of \$10,000. This fund will be a non-lapsing fund for the payment of leave time owed to employees when they are separated from employment with the town and

(2) \$25,000 for town website improvements. The deadline for petitioned warrant articles is Tuesday, February 4, 2025. A group of New London residents approached the Selectmen to ask for funding to restore the 16 historical markers that were installed between 1963 and 1978 to mark the town's bicentennial in 1979.

The markers celebrate important people, places and events in the town's history. The Selectmen will include an article in the amount of \$40,000 for the restoration project, with funds to come from a previously established trust fund and thus will not impact the tax rate. See page 5 of the September 2024 edition of Municipal Matters for more on this topic. The operating budget also includes \$50,000 for the first debt payment on a \$2 million dollar bond. The Selectmen plan to seek funding in the amount of \$2 million dollars for land purchase, design and engineering for

a future police station. The Police Facilities Advisory Committee met several times from May until December to evaluate the needs of the police and dispatching departments. They reviewed potential building layouts as provided by Lavallee/ Brensinger Architects (LBA) to advise the Selectmen on the best path forward. Colliers Project Leaders is providing project management services.

The question of whether the police and communications should leave its current facility on Seamans Road has been debated by the town for many years, even before the Selectmen's offices left to move into the renovated Academy Building (the current location of the Selectmen's offices and town clerk/tax collector) and the police department was moved from the basement into the vacated Selectmen's office space. Some feel that renovations to the existing Seamans Road facility could achieve what is needed for the police department while others feel that a new facility in a new location is critical to meet the needs of the police department well into the future. While several potential sites were discussed during the search for a viable location for a new police station, two properties became the main focus of the committee and the Selectmen: (1) land owned by New London Realty Trust (the former Bewley property) on Newport Road, across from Hannaford and the Post Office and abutting Hilltop Place Road, Map 59-10, and (2) a portion of a lot owned by John B. Garvey Trust on Seamans Road, abutting the Colby-Sawyer College parking lot, Map 86-27. Colliers and LBA, consultants hired by the town, provided cost estimates for both properties and offered their thoughts on the challenges presented in developing each site.

NHDES recognizes Hancock Water Works with its asset Management Award

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) recently presented the 2024 John Jackman Asset Management Award to Hancock Water Works during the annual NHDES Asset Management Workshop held October 30. This award is named after John Jackman, the "grandfather of asset management" who has been a pioneer and industry leader of asset management in New Hampshire and was established to promote and encourage communities to develop and implement Asset Management Programs (AMPs). AMPs are a holistic approach to managing water infrastructure to be cost-effective over the life cycle of assets.

NHDES believes that by providing funding and technical assistance to communities for the development and implementation of AMPs, New Hampshire communities and residents will benefit from more reliable and sustainable drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater systems throughout the state. In 2019, the NHDES Asset Management Award was established by the NHDES Drinking Water and Groundwater Bureau (DWGB), Wastewater Engineering Bureau (WWEB), and Watershed Management Bureau (WMB). The award recognizes exemplary AMPs within the State.

NHDES recognizes that Hancock Water Works, under the direction of the Hancock Board of Water Commissioners, rose to the challenge of managing aging distribution infrastructure, additional regulations, and changing environmental conditions by implementing a comprehensive asset management program.

This work was supported by a \$70,000 American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant by NHDES in 2021. Hancock Water Works optimized their system and ensured a strategy for its long-term sustainability for years to come. Hancock Water Works actively worked to increase public communication. Through public engagement, level of service goals were developed to prioritize water system assets based on data and input from the community, customers, and regulators.

As NHDES continues with the journey of promoting asset management throughout the State of New Hampshire, exemplary work like that of the Hancock Water Works will showcase the benefits of establishing and utilizing AMPs to better manage water systems. NHDES urges communities throughout New Hampshire to build upon and continue their asset management work or to contact NHDES to find out how to get started.

Dear Editor:

The voters of the Kearsarge School District will again see the same very large budget number recommended by both the school board and the municipal budget committee. Voters may wonder how the budget has risen to over 55 million dollars for an enrollment that has dropped to about 1670 students per year.

The local school district is the largest part of a property tax bill in NH. Local tax equals local control. The reality is that taxpayers and voters do not have an unlimited ability to pay whatever is charged.

There is now an option to vote in a school district budget cap tied to enrollment and adjusted for inflation, but voters must show up at the deliberative session at the Kearsarge Regional High School on Saturday, January 4, 2025 starting at 9 am to vote in favor of the voter petition.

If passed at the January 4 meeting, the measure will appear on the March 11 ballot for all voters in the school district and will require a 3/5 majority vote to take effect in October 2025.

Several other NH school districts and towns will be considering similar proposals in 2025. I encourage all voters in Bradford, Warner, Sutton, Newbury, Springfield, Wilmot, and New London to participate in the process to take control of their local property tax bill.

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


