Deering Author's Book Release




Deering man dies in single-vehicle accident

On October 21st, Chief Philibert of the Deering Police Department was notified of a 911 open line call. The GPS location of the cellphone placed the call in the area of Deering Center Road and East Deering Road.

While responding, dispatch received an update that it was a single motor vehicle that crashed into a tree at the intersection of Deering Center Road and Bartlett Hill Road with one occupant still in the vehicle.

Once on scene Chief Philibert and Deering Fire Chief Rich-

ards closed Deering Center Road to all non-emergency traffic. Deering Fire and EMS were able to remove the operator from the vehicle.

After lifesaving efforts, the operator was declared deceased. Police identified the operator as 20-year-old Damien Laporte, a resident of Deering.

The Medical Examiner's office was notified and responded to the scene. At this time the high rate of speed and failure to negotiate the curve in the roadway led to the accident.

Three teens injured in Hillsborough accident



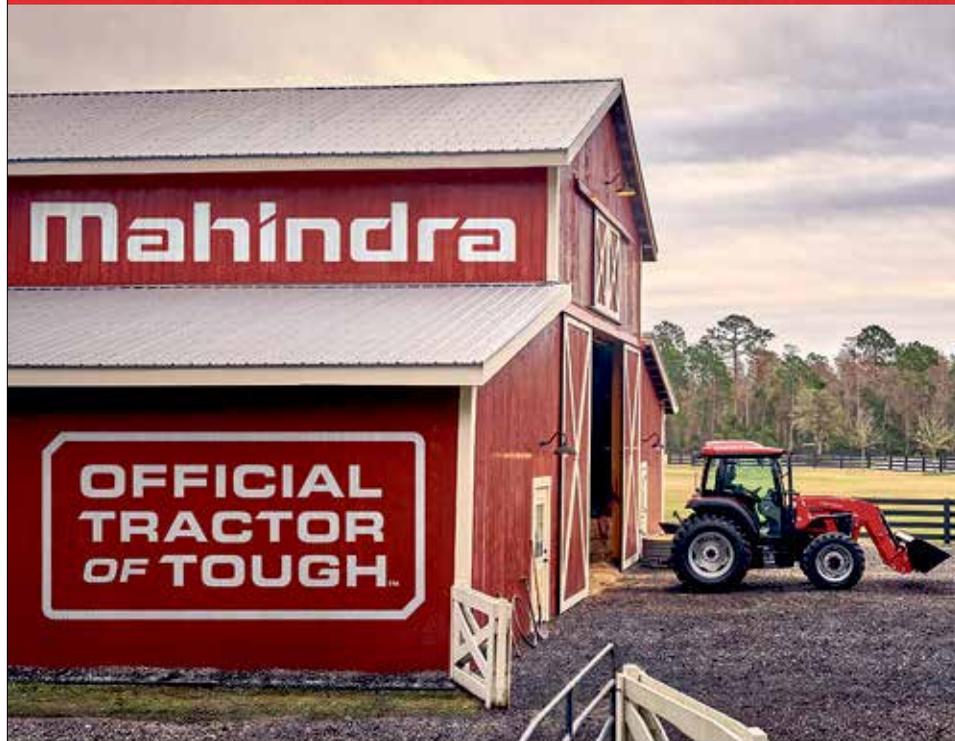
On October 26th, Hillsboro Police and Fire responded to Shedd Road for a motor vehicle accident. The front right passenger was still trapped in the vehicle, and a very technical extrication was performed by the Hillsboro Fire and Rescue members. Two other occupants were able to get out of the vehicle, but also sustained injuries.

All three teenagers were transported to Concord Hospital for non-life-threatening injuries.

Officers determined that speed and reckless driving were factors in the cause of the accident.

The operator, Cailyb Levy, 19, of Manchester was found to be operating the vehicle without a valid license. He was issued a Summons for Operating a Vehicle Without a Valid License, Negligent Driving, Reckless Operation, and Transporting Alcohol By a Minor. The owner and passenger of the vehicle, Lucian Pheanis, 18, of Weare was also issued a Summons for Allowing Improper Person to Operate a Motor Vehicle, and Possession of Alcohol By a Minor.

Hillsboro-Deering DECA Team qualifies for International Competition

Competing for ten days against other high schools in a global competition, one team of students from Hillsboro-Deering High School has qualified for the DECA International Conference in late April 2026.

In the Virtual Business Retail Competition, two students, senior Noah Harrington, and Freshman Jahcobi Hibbert finished in the second qualifying spot in the competitive North Atlantic region of DECA and also fourth worldwide. They

will join teams from Georgia, Texas, Minnesota, North Dakota, California, and Ontario, Canada.

These first-round competitors will be combined with the winners of the January qualifier into a field of 16 teams competing for top world honors next spring at the International CDC in Atlanta, Georgia.

“The DECA Virtual Business Challenge is one of the most exciting times of the year, and simultaneously the most

stressful.

Students love competing against and connecting with competitors from around the country and world to do this. The competition is intense, and the students do a great job.

Our Fashion team, Restaurant team, Personal Finance team, Hotel Management team, and Sports Management team were all competitive and each of them earned first place in New Hampshire. The fall competi-

tion is more time-consuming as it coincides with the end of the fall sport season. So the kids really have to manage their time. I am proud of them all.” said H-D DECA advisor Marc Payeur.



Newbury Fire Rescue Engine 4 and Rescue 1, along with Newbury Police, and New London Ambulance were dispatched to a reported vehicle crash on Cheney Road. Authorities reopen case of 1978 murder of Sunapee woman in New London

A new search was launched in New London in connection with the decades-old unsolved murder of a 27-year-old Sunapee woman, the Attorney General's Office said.

Members of the New Hampshire Cold Case Unit and New Hampshire Fish and Game combed the area of the Esther Currier Wildlife Management Area in New London, looking for clues in the 1978 unsolved homicide of Catherine "Cathy" Millican. "The search poses no danger to the public and is focused on locating physical evidence," the Attorney General's Office said in a news release.

The search coincides with the 47th anniversary of Millican's death. In an effort to generate new leads, the Cold Case Unit also released several previously

unreleased photographs of the victim. On Wednesday, Oct. 25, 1978, at approximately 11:30 p.m., the body of 27-year-old Millican was discovered in a wooded area off Route 11 in what is now known as a wildlife management area, officials said. An autopsy determined she died as a result of multiple stab wounds.

Millican was last seen on the afternoon of Tuesday, Oct. 24, 1978, when she told others she planned to go birdwatching. Her vehicle, a brown Volkswagen Rabbit, was observed by several witnesses parked at the entrance to the wetlands. Her body was found the following night, located several hundred yards into the woods. Millican's family released a statement, describing her as "an artist, a photographer, an ornithologist, and a national sailing champion."

"We remain ever hopeful that her case will be solved and that closure will ease the pain of everyone who knew her," the



statement says. "We are encouraged to know that her case has not been abandoned but continues to be worked." Officials expected the search to continue throughout the day.

"To preserve the integrity of the investigation, no further details will be released at this time," the Attorney General's Office said in a statement. "The New Hampshire Department of Justice urges the public to avoid speculation and to respect the

privacy of residents and private property in and around the search area."

Millican is one of seven women found stabbed to death not far from one another between 1978 and 1987, cases some have been dubbed the Connecticut River Valley killings.

Millican was found in October 1978 in New London. Mary Elizabeth Critchley's remains were found in Unity in August 1981, and Ellen Fried's body was

discovered in September 1985 in Newport. Three victims were found during a 10-day stretch in April 1986. Lynda Moore was found dead with more than 20 stab wounds in her home in Westminster, Vermont, on April 15. Bernie Courtemanche's remains were discovered off Cat Hole Road in Newport four days later; an autopsy determined she was stabbed to death.

The body of Eva Morse was discovered six days later in West Unity. She was also stabbed to death, officials said. Barbara Agnew was found dead in Hartland, Vermont, in March 1987. Investigators at the New Hampshire Attorney General's Office have never officially connected all the killings.

WATCH THE WHITE WINE THIS HOLIDAY SEASON



Q: As far as my teeth are concerned, is white wine better than red?

A: Red wine has long had a well-deserved reputation for staining teeth. But studies have found that white wine is not totally without sin in its impact on teeth.

A German study conducted in 2009 found that white wine is more likely to damage tooth enamel than red wine. German researchers, using teeth removed from men and women aged between 40 and 65 and soaked in various wines, found a significant increase in the loss of minerals in the teeth soaked in white wine. The study also recommended not brushing immediately after white wine drinking, as it could contribute to the damage. The good news may be that the researchers recommended eating cheese, which is high in calcium, while drinking white wine, to temper the damage.

The enamel erosion that can come with drinking white wine also can leave teeth vulnerable to stains from drinking tea, among other things. This was the finding of a New York University College of Dentistry study. As with many aspects of life, the moral of the story is "all things in moderation." Ask your dentist about which foods and drinks are good or bad for your teeth.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Many cancer patients go on to develop heart failure — because of the cancer itself and also due to chemotherapy. This can lead to a reduced quality of life, multiple admissions to hospital or even death. But a new study published in the *European Journal of Preventive Cardiology* shows that a type of diabetes medication, called an SGLT2 inhibitor, may help protect the heart during and after cancer treatment. This is the first time that any medication has been shown to be beneficial in reducing heart failure or heart failure hospitalization in cancer patients and survivors. The medication appears to lower the risk of heart failure and unplanned hospital visits related to heart failure by more than 50 per cent. And the benefits were found to be particularly promising for breast cancer patients receiving a common chemotherapy type called anthracycline chemotherapy, which can affect heart health.

Past research has suggested that inflammation may contribute to the development and progression of dementia and that non-steroidal anti-inflammatory (NSAID) medications may help protect against dementia due to their anti-inflammatory effects. A new large prospective study published in the *Journal of the American Geriatrics Society* provides additional evidence, showing that long-term NSAID use is linked to a decreased risk of developing dementia. Non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) are a group of medications that treat pain, fever, and inflammation. Note: Tylenol is not a non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug (NSAID). Tylenol contains acetaminophen, which is a pain reliever and fever reducer. NSAIDs include ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin) and naproxen (Aleve, Anaprox). Long-term NSAID use was associated with a 12% reduced risk of developing dementia. The findings suggest that prolonged, rather than intensive, use of anti-inflammatory medications may help protect against dementia.

New Boston's Dan McDonald Fire Station nearing completion

New Boston Fire Chief Brian Dubreuil asked the Select Board to review and approve a grant for emergency operations equipment. Chief Dubreuil explained that the Department applied for and received the first notice for moving ahead with emergency operations equipment through the Emergency Management Performance Grant. The intention is to outfit the emergency operations center at the new fire station with equipment to

be functional in the event of any major town catastrophe. The Department submitted for IT infrastructure upgrades along with furniture, chairs, etc.

This is a 50/50 match grant, which means that for up to \$80,000 of the total cost of the project, the Department's share would come from soft costs which have been accumulated over the course of the last several years. There will be no taxation impact to the town of New Bos-

ton whatsoever.

Of the total expected to be awarded, \$75,199.97, the Town's share is \$37,599.99. This funding will be used to outfit the training room/EOC. The Board approved the terms of the Emer-

gency Management.

Chief Dubreuil stated that he will examine other options for the sign which has been noted to be potentially too large. He explained that all funds for the project have been allocated at this time. He

suggested tabling this sign to the end of the project. There was discussion regarding how to fund a sign dedicating the building as the Dan McDonald 86 Fire Station. A mural or painting may be created to be installed in the lobby.

How can today's younger generation get a true a sense of what War is like? Imagine for a moment you are a track athlete and you can go home after running in 100 meets. Trouble is most runners die by the 33rd meet. That's what fighter pilots faced in Vietnam. They could

go home after flying 100 combat missions, but the odds were they would be shot down before the 33rd.

We have a special mission for members of the Student Council. The only problem is that for every ten of you who go on this mission, eight will be killed. That's what happened to the Rangers who took the cliff's over Normandy, or the bomber pilots who flew the raids over the German oil fields during WWII.

The Soccer team will suffer only 20-30% casualties on their next mission, the best odds yet. But, the reward for surviving that mission is that you get to go on another with the same odds, and then another and another. Just like the Marines who fought at Guadalcanal, Korea, Viet Nam, Iraq or Afghanistan. They knew the odds before they went but they went anyway. Could you do the same? Would you? If you survive that experience you are a different person. Your whole outlook and philosophy of life changes in ways others will never understand. With luck and God's grace, you will never have to experience that, but you can still honor those who have.

Soon the future of America will be in your hands. When your turn comes, honor it, improve it and pass along a better life to your kids. That's all the thanks any veteran could ask.




