



Hillsboro Police to service Deering - dispatch Hancock

Starting immediately, Hillsboro Police will provide all law enforcement services for Deering, 24/7.

This partnership follows Chief Philibert's resignation from Deering to accept the Chief's position in Franconstown.

For general in-person inquiries, offender registrations, or pistol permit applications, please stop by Hillsboro Police Headquarters at 22 Municipal Drive, Hillsboro, NH. The station is open 24/7. This agreement is currently in effect through April.

Also effective immediately, the Hillsboro Police Communications Center will provide dispatching services for the Town of Hancock. There is no change to the phone numbers Hancock residents use to contact their police department.

Turmoil at Franklin's new Veterans' Center

Four members of the new veterans campus's leadership team, including its head, former Manchester Police Chief Allen Aldenberg, have resigned in protest in recent days, citing a range of concerns, including mismanagement and poor treatment by Easterseals. Meanwhile, several of the two dozen veterans who have moved to the campus this year told NHPR

they feel like Easterseals is putting their needs secondary to conference center guests and financial supporters.

In a statement, Maureen Beauregard, CEO for Easterseals in New Hampshire, defended Easterseals' management of the facility, and said the leadership team that has now resigned failed to address issues despite being repeatedly asked to do so.

Young Washington woman killed in Newport DWI accident

On December 5th, the Newport Police Department and Newport Fire Department responded to a reported motor vehicle rollover with injuries on Maple Street.

Upon arrival at the scene, first responders discovered two vehicles involved in the collision. The driver of one of the vehicles, Ashley Wendt, 25, of Washington, NH, was pronounced deceased at the scene.

Initial investigation at the scene revealed that a Chevrolet Silverado pickup truck, which was traveling eastbound on Maple Street, crossed over the centerline into the westbound lane and struck a Jeep Wrangler head-on. The Jeep Wrangler then

rolled over, resulting in fatal injuries to its driver.

The operator of the Chevrolet Silverado pickup truck was identified as Dylan Galland, 49, of East Windsor, CT.

Officers at the scene determined that Galland was impaired, and he was arrested for Aggravated Driving While Intoxicated. He was transported to Valley Regional Hospital in Claremont, where he was treated for non-life-threatening injuries.

He faces an additional charge of Negligent Homicide.

The Newport Police Department was assisted in this investigation by the Sullivan County Sheriff's Office and the New Hampshire State Police Collision Analysis and Reconstruction Unit.

This investigation is in its very early stages, so no further information can be released at this time.

TYPES AND DEGREES OF GUM DISEASE



Q: Are there different kinds of gum disease?

A: Gum disease, also called periodontal disease or periodontitis, comes in different forms and degrees:

- Gingivitis is the mildest form. Gingivitis sufferers will experience red, swollen gums that bleed easily, often just from the act of brushing your teeth. Gingivitis usually causes no discomfort and can be reversed with professional care and good oral hygiene at home.
- Chronic periodontitis causes inflammation in the tissue that supports the teeth. Infection forms in the pockets between the gum and the teeth and leads to bone loss and detachment of the teeth.
- Aggressive periodontitis is a more severe form. It causes rapid bone destruction and loss of teeth.
- Necrotizing periodontal disease is an infection that actually kills tissue, ligaments and bone and can spread, causing damage to cheeks and jaw. The disease is commonly associated with people who have a systemic disease like HIV infection or diabetes.

Among treatments for gum disease is periodontal surgery, which removes unhealthy tissue around teeth. The best way to avoid gum disease is to visit your dentist regularly – at least twice a year – and to brush and floss regularly. Ask your dentist about other ways to keep your gums healthy.

In a study of first-time mothers published in *JAMA Network Open* hormonal contraceptive (HC) initiation post partum was associated with a 1.49 times higher instantaneous risk of depression compared with no HC use, and this was consistent across HC types, except for progestogen-only pills, for which it was initially reduced and subsequently increased late post partum. The earlier combined oral contraceptive use was initiated post partum the higher the associated rate ratio of depression.

Topically applied products containing human platelet extract or vitamin C provide similar improvements in age spots (photoaging) of the hands, as reported in a clinical trial within the November issue of *Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery*®, the official medical journal of the American Society of Plastic Surgeons (ASPS). Brown spots on the hands, sometimes referred to as age spots or liver spots, are a common cosmetic issue caused by sun damage to the skin. Treatments for skin rejuvenation and resurfacing — such as chemical peels, injectables, and intense pulsed light or laser treatments — have primarily focused on the face, with less attention to the hands and other visible parts of the body.

All patients who have had a heart attack are typically treated using beta blockers. According to a study conducted last year, this drug is unlikely to be needed for those heart patients who have a normal pumping ability. Now a new study published in *European Heart Journal* shows that there is also a risk that these patients will become depressed by the treatment. Beta blockers are drugs that block the effects of adrenaline on the heart and have been used for decades as a basic treatment for all heart attack patients. In recent years, their importance has started to be questioned as new, successful treatments have begun to be developed. This is mainly the case for heart attack patients whose hearts have a normal pumping function even after the attack, i.e. people who do not suffer from heart failure.



Attorneys for H-D School District claim student consented to glove box search

Attorneys for the Hillsboro-Deering School District have responded in federal court to a lawsuit filed by a gun-rights organization, denying it conducted an unconstitutional search of an 18-year-old high school senior's vehicle "based solely on the knowledge that he is a legal gun owner." The Second Amendment Foundation (SAF) filed the lawsuit, *Harrington v. Crawford*, in U.S. District Court in October. It involves a search in April of Hillsboro-Deering High School student Jack Harrington's vehicle, which was parked on school grounds.

The lawsuit names the school district and SAU 34 Superintendent Jennifer Crawford, Hillsboro-Deering High School Principal James O'Rourke, Vice Principal Brian McGinn and Hillsboro Police Department School Resource Officer Michael DeTurris.

The lawsuit claims school officials searched Harrington's vehicle without his consent following an "aggressive interrogation" by district employees after they learned he is a legal gun owner. Harrington owns a Glock 43 handgun, court documents show.

"Being public about exercising your

private rights cannot be grounds for being harassed and searched on campus," SAF Director of Legal Operations Bill Sack said in a statement. "If simply being a gun owner is legal justification to be harassed and searched by authorities, what would stop them from submitting gun owners like Jack to searches every day? And what's their proposed solution to avoid that abuse, that he sells his privately owned firearm?"

According to court documents, sometime in April Harrington had a conversation with another student about legally owning a gun while on a bus ride to a varsity baseball game. Harrington described an experience in which he had been pulled over by police while driving on a public road, during which he told the officer he had his handgun lawfully stored in the glove box of the vehicle he was driving. "At no time during the bus conversation did Jack make any threats, violate any laws, or speak inappropriately," court documents state.

Sometime prior to April 24, Crawford, O'Rourke, and McGinn became aware of the bus conversation, "or at least became aware of fragments of the conversation,"

after one or more of the athletes on the bus reported to coaches what Harrington said, court documents state.

"Notably, at no time did Jack tell anyone, including teammates or coaches, that he intended to bring his handgun to the HDHS campus, that he had ever brought his handgun to the HDHS campus, that he intended to use his handgun in an unlawful manner, or that the interaction with the police officer occurred on the school campus or anywhere near the campus (it did not)," court paperwork reads.

On April 24, the lawsuit claims, the defendants removed Harrington from class based on their knowledge that he is a gun owner and "subjected Jack to a coercive interrogation without his parents or an attorney present, in which they demanded permission to search his truck, which was then parked in the HDHS campus parking lot, for firearms."


As noted in the complaint, "... after the Interrogation in which Jack repeatedly refused to consent to a search and after Jack's parents were contacted by phone and similarly refused to consent to a search, Defendants searched the Subject Vehicle anyway, finding no firearm."

In a response to the lawsuit filed on behalf of the Hillsboro-Deering School District by Attorney Christine Friedman, school officials deny their actions on April 24 were "based solely upon Plaintiff's status as a firearm owner."

"Defendants admit that they removed Plaintiff from class," the response states. "Defendants deny that they subjected Plaintiff to a 'coercive interrogation.' Defendants admit that Plaintiff's parents and attorney were not present when they questioned Plaintiff about whether he had a firearm in his vehicle located on school property and their request to search the glove box." School officials deny Harrington did not consent to a limited search of the glove box of his vehicle to determine if it contained a firearm.

School officials deny the claim their search of Harrington's glove box was illegal, and say in their response they "lack knowledge or information" on where Harrington's firearm was at the time of the search (at his residence).

The lawsuit seeks declaratory relief and judgment that the interrogation and the search were unconstitutional, along with nominal damages.

“The average age of the world's greatest civilizations from the beginning of history, has been about 200 years. During those 200 years, these nations always progressed through the following sequence:

2. From spiritual faith to great courage;
3. From courage to liberty;
4. From liberty to abundance;
5. From abundance to complacency;
6. From complacency to apathy;
7. From apathy to dependence;
8. From dependence back into bondage.”

America is quickly approaching step 7. The trend must be reversed!

Hillsborough’s Tax Rate is set at \$21.05/\$1,000

Hillsborough’s 2025 tax rate has been set at \$21.05 (2024 was \$33.44). ELVD rate is \$2.31 (2024 was \$4.56).

To calculate the difference in your 2025 annual tax amount compared to 2024, take your 2024 valuation divided by 1,000 and

multiply that by \$33.44. Then divide your 2025 valuation by 1,000 and multiply it by \$21.05. The difference between those two numbers is the change in your annual tax bill. (ELVD rates are \$38.00 for 2024 & \$23.36 for 2025).

Antrim’s Tax Rate increases to \$23.11/\$1,000

The Town of Antrim has set its property tax rate at \$23.11 per \$1000 of property value, compared to \$20.79 in 2024.

Antrim’s 2024 tax rate was lower after a townwide valuation resulted in higher property values.

Weare’s Tax Rate increases 6.1% to \$21.64/\$1,000

The Weare Board of Selectmen set the 2025 tax rate at \$21.64 per thousand, representing a 6.1% increase over the 2024

rate. The total rate breaks down as follows: town \$3.90; schools \$15.00; state education tax \$1.44; and county \$1.30.

Warner’s Tax Rate reduced to \$17.55/\$1,000

The Department of Revenue has set the tax rate for the Town of Warner at \$17.55

per \$1,000 of assessed value. The current tax rate is \$30.89.

Stone Fund Scholarships available in Weare



Police ask for help in finding vandals who shot at Christmas display

Police are asking for the public's help to track down the person or persons responsible for the gunshots fired at a home's outdoor holiday decorations early Tuesday morning.

Police said around 1 a.m. Tuesday, several inflatable Christmas displays were shot at outside a home on Risingwood Drive in Bow.

"I heard the shots and then woke my husband, and there was a second set of shots," homeowner Alicia Paul said.

The Pauls said they were confused at first and went back to bed. In the morning, neighbors told them they had heard the shots as well. That's when the couple took a closer look and found shell casings on the ground.

"It wasn't just the one, it was two snowmen, and the gingerbread has a hole through its head," Alicia Paul said.

Police said they believe the shots were fired from the roadway, which suggests to investigators that the alleged

perpetrator or perpetrators were either inside a vehicle or standing in the road when the shots were fired.

"This act of vandalism is not only destructive to private property but, more importantly, poses a serious and reckless danger to the residents of this neighborhood," police wrote in a press release.

The damaged decorations are part of the family's collection of 28 inflatables.

"It's sad. The inflatables have been out for many years, and they're supposed to bring joy for the season, and this kind of feels like it's tainted that," Alicia Paul said.

Charges of criminal mischief and reckless conduct involving a firearm could potentially be filed in this case if a suspect or suspects are arrested, police said.

No one was injured in connection with the shots.

"Obviously, it's a stupid thing that someone did. It's immature, it's not great, and if they get caught, it would



ruin their right to have that rifle or pistol or whatever it was," homeowner David Paul said.

Police have increased patrols in the area and are actively investigating.

Authorities are asking residents who live in the area

or along any adjacent streets to review home surveillance camera footage from between 1 a.m. and 2 a.m. Tuesday. They are looking for images or videos of suspicious vehicles or potential suspects.

"They are hoping that people will call in tips. Somebody

might brag about doing it, and hopefully, if it's a young kid, they need to learn that it's not safe," Alicia Paul said.

IMPROVE HOME VALUE AND SAFETY BY LEVELING UNEVEN FLOORS: PART I

Do you have a basement or other room with unlevel flooring? This can make the space difficult to use, detracting from your home's overall value. Change this problem into opportunity by exploring how you can fix the surface and prepare it for tile, carpet or another finished flooring.

Fast-setting, self-leveling floor resurfacers are cementitious mixtures that are mixed with water, poured onto a floor, and allowed to flow and level themselves out, creating a smooth surface. They are designed to fill in cracks and unevenness, preparing the floor for the installation of new flooring. Unlike traditional concrete, they set up much faster, often within hours, and can be used as a wear surface or underlayment.

Here's a more detailed look at how they work:

1. **Mixing:** The resurfacer is mixed with the correct amount of water, typically using a drill with a mixing paddle. The mixture should be of a pourable consistency.
2. **Pouring:** The mixed material is poured onto the floor surface in strips, allowing it to flow and level itself. For larger areas, pumping equipment can be used for continuous application.
3. **Leveling:** As the material flows, it fills in any cracks, dips, and low spots, creating a smooth, level surface. No troweling or screeding is typically needed.
4. **Setting and Curing:** Fast-setting resurfacers set up relatively quickly, often within 90 minutes, and can be walked on within four hours. The product may need to be allowed to cure for a longer period before applying tiles or other finished flooring.
